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



Is Opinion of Visiting English Railway Manager--Discusses Possibilities of Future in Most Optimistic Vein.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

"You have got the jumping-off place but not the railroad facilities," said Henry Holmes, superintendent of the London & Southwestern railway this morning.

Coming from one who has evidently studied the present fight for Oriental trade, this phrase is most significant. With an unbiassed mind he has looked into the strategical position of Victoria and spoke with conviction when asked generally as to the city's future prospects.

"All your city wants is railroad connection with the mainland," he continued. "Seymour Narrows?" suggested the reporter.

"Yes, that's where I mean, the strait half way up the island," replied Mr. Holmes. "There are no engineering difficulties anywhere that cannot be met with energy, time and money. And it is certain that the final big port of the North Pacific will either be on Vancouver Island or on the mainland to the north. Though I was struck with the energy and enterprise of Vancouver, I cannot imagine that the Canadian Pacific intends ultimately to keep it as an ocean terminal. To me the channel from the open sea to that point appears most intricate. Victoria appears to me a place of tremendous possibilities." And here Mr. Holmes pointed out graphically that this city occupied with its island situation almost the same position as London, and again called Victoria "the jumping-off place."
