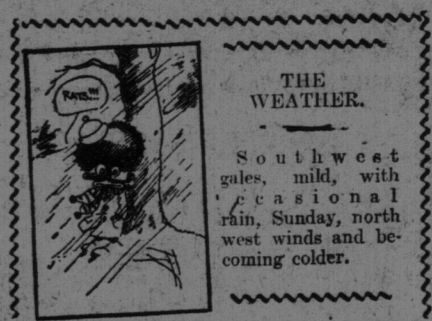

CITY MEDICAL OFFICER IS ONE OF ST. JOHN'S NEEDS

Conditions Show That the City Should Appoint a Physician Who Shall Regularly Examine All School Children and Undertake the Especial Supervision of the Public Health—The Sale of Anti-Toxin and Recent Diphtheria Cases.

"I sold more than double the quantity of anti-toxin in January than I sold in any two months before since I have been in business," said a well known druggist to the Times in answer to a query as to what his sales of this diphtheria antidote had been. The sales made by this one druggist during the month just past, amounted to 35 packages of 1,000, 2,000 and 3,000 units.

It is contended also that the board of health should issue this anti-toxin should be perfectly sanitary in every particular, and that all comports or other unsanitary conditions should be removed.

It is stated that some physicians do not report cases which are of a mild type, but it is contended that the affection can be spread by the mild cases as well as the more malignant.

Speaking of the use of anti-toxin, he said, it was used largely as a preventative and not as a cure.

HAZEN'S ROAD ACT RENEDED ONCE MORE

St. John County Council Has Considered It and Has Recommended a Number of Improvements.

County Secretary Vincent has forwarded to the following report of the committee of the county council on the provisions of the new highway act.

Section 2. Amended by reducing the span of bridges from 20 feet to 8 feet.

Section 4, sub-section 1, amended as follows: In all parishes where there are three county councillors they shall constitute the highway board, and in parishes where there are only two councillors, the third member of the board should be appointed by the County Council.

Section 8, sub-section 1: That the poll tax be reduced from \$2 to \$1.50, and that the minimum rate for taxation for highway purposes should be not less than four cents per hundred dollars.

Section 28: That the work for the second line thereof be struck out and the word month be inserted in lieu thereof.

Section 30, sub-section 3: Penalties and teams shall be paid the rate prevailing in the respective local districts of parishes.

Section 14, sub-section 3: That an amending bill be introduced in any parish be at the discretion of the highway board.

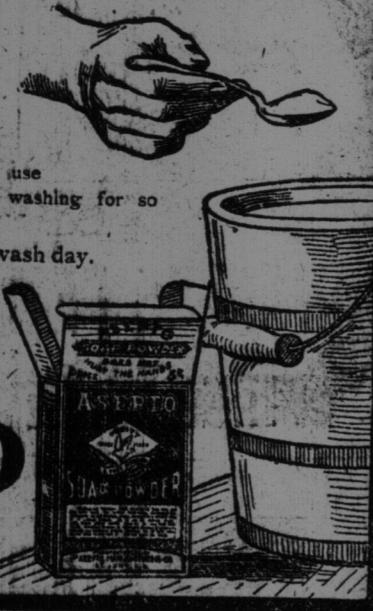

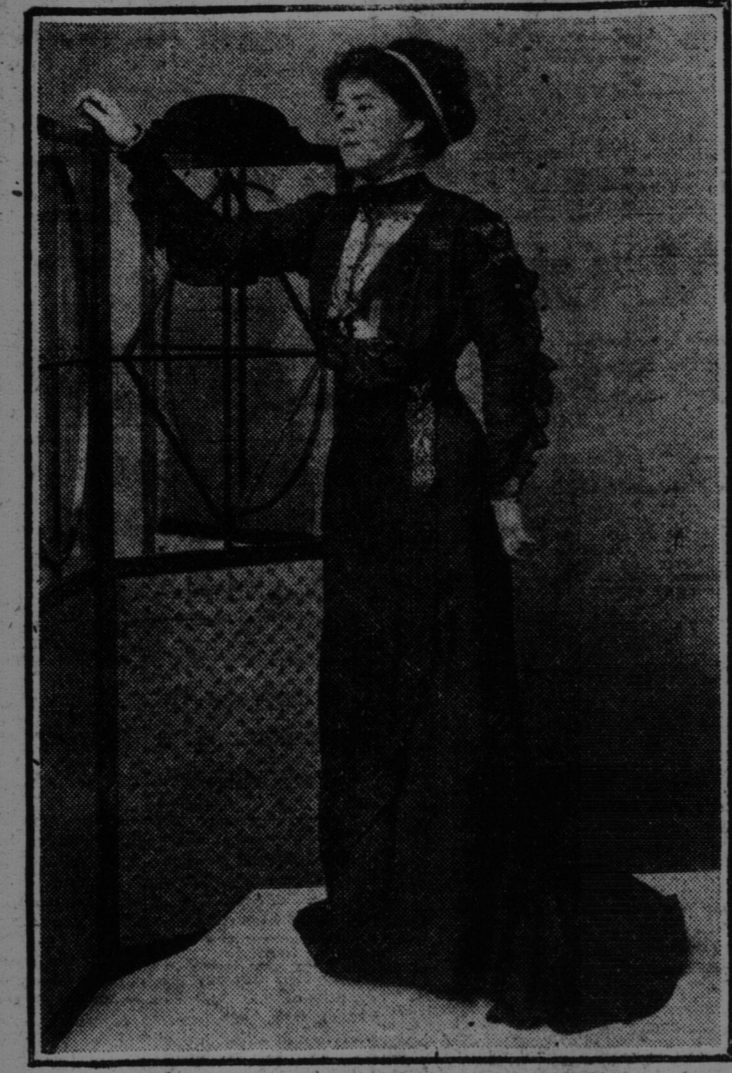

AMERICAN SENATORS ARE LEARNING TO TALK

One Time Unwritten Law That They Should Be Seen and Not Heard is Being Badly Shattered—Great Road Proposed as Lincoln Memorial.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.) Washington, D. C., Jan. 28, 1909. There was one time unwritten law in the Senate that no member of that body should be like children, seen, but not heard, but the precedent has been shattered by a few roaring youngsters like La Follette and Beveridge others that there was only a mild sensation this week when Senator Cummins of Iowa delivered his maiden speech on the subject of post-offices and post-roads.

Representative Rainey, of Illinois, introduced a little sensationalism into the proceedings of the House, Tuesday, by a speech in which he accused the President of a misstatement of facts in his special message to Congress concerning the Panama Canal in 1908, and an attack on Mr. Crowell for his connection with affairs in Panama as General Counsel for the Panama Canal Company.

But the Springfield is a genuine article. It was capitalized for a quarter of a million, and the directors went to allotment on a subscription list of about \$14,000. This money has been expended, but twice the amount is necessary to develop the property properly. A call was made on the shares, but no one paid up and there is a talk of compulsory reconstruction. Believe me, money put into it will yield two hundred per cent. in dividends within twelve months."

CLAIM THEIR CANNED GOODS ARE ALL PURE

Louisville, Ky., Feb. 4.—Denial that chemicals are used in the goods put up by any member of the National Canners' Association was entered by that body at the adjournment of their annual convention in this city today in a series of strong resolutions. It was declared that newspapers have misled the public into the belief that canned goods are poisonous and the convention created a publicity bureau to correct this alleged misunderstanding.

Another resolution denouncing the Canning Machinery and Supplies Association to hold no moving exhibit until 1911. Upon motion of the next, Louisville withdrew as a candidate for the next convention and this convention is said to be likely to fall at Atlantic City or Rochester.

Chas. S. Cray of Hoopesdown, Ill., was selected president. In the resolutions the convention declared in favor of state pure food legislation, if modeled on national pure food laws, and endorsed Dr. H. W. Wiley, government chemistry chief.

The canners called for an absolute abolition of the tariff on tin-plate and sugar and asked government standards for tin-plate material.

A tomato standard commission was also appointed.

Col. A. D. Kniskern of Washington, attended the convention throughout as a United States army representative. His purpose was to obtain information concerning the sources of the food supply in case of war.

NEWS FROM FREDERICTON

No Date Has Yet Been Set for the Opening of the Local House—More Supreme Court Judgments.

Fredericton, Feb. 5.—The local government got through with the business of the session this evening and adjourned to meet in St. John on Tuesday, 16th inst. The date of the meeting of the legislature will then be announced. It will probably be early in March.

The supreme court this afternoon heard a number of common motions. The proposition was made by the Carleton election case, on a return of the rule and an adjournment until Friday next was made, the police magistrate had no jurisdiction to make the conviction, on the grounds that the Canada Temperance Act did not apply to the Interregnum.

In the U. C. R. liquor seizure case, the court, on the application of P. J. Hughes, counsel for Station Master Walker, granted rule nisi returnable at the Easter term. The following common motions were made:

Ex parte Melanson—Barry, K. C., moves for rule nisi to quash conviction made by Police Magistrate Kay, of Moncton, for keeping liquor for sale contrary to the Canada Temperance Act. Rule nisi granted.

Ex parte R. Z. Walker—Hughes moved for rule nisi to quash conviction made by Police Magistrate Margo against the defendant for warehousing for delivery contrary to the Canada Temperance Act. He contended that the police magistrate had no jurisdiction to make the conviction, on the grounds that the Canada Temperance Act did not apply to the Interregnum, which is owned by the crown. He also contended that proving the liquor seized was for an unlawful purpose was necessary.

WHAT TORONTO SPENT FOR NEW INDUSTRIES

"Nineteen hundred and eight will, no doubt, go down in the commercial history of Toronto as a bad year," says Mr. Joseph E. Thompson, Commissioner of Industries, in his annual report to the Board of Control.

A census of the citizens would describe it as a period of tight money, and contracted enterprise, yet there would be hundreds of individual exceptions to the rule. For example, take the retail jewelry business. Before the summer had passed the largest retail jeweller in Toronto published a statement that sales were in excess of those made in corresponding monthly periods for the best years of his business.

The commissioner states that one feature of the year was the absence of labor disputes. Extensions, he says, were out of the question in view of the attitude assumed by the banks.

"When the construction of the Hydro-Electric Power Line is completed from Niagara Falls to Toronto, says the Commissioner, Toronto will be the largest city in the power zone in Canada, and a proposition from the Otis-Pensom Elevator Company, which was at present before the Board of Control.

The expenditure on the department last year was as follows:—Salary of Commissioner, \$2,500; salary of secretary, \$628; extra assistance, \$78; labor bureau, \$480; information bureau, \$438.45; illustrated Toronto, \$2,900; advertising, \$306.42; office supplies, postage, etc., \$333.97; cab hire, \$99.50; convention matter, buttons, printing, etc., \$297; subscriptions, \$23.25; photo graphs, half-tone cuts, etc., \$23.25; traveling expenses, \$36.40. Total, \$8,449.

Following are the estimates for 1909: Toronto Illustrated, \$2,700; Toronto hangs, \$1,000; information bureau, \$450; postage, \$300; Convention matter, \$180; convention matter, buttons, printing, etc., \$300; miscellaneous, office supplies, cab hire, etc., \$380; salary of Commissioner, \$2,500; salary of secretary, \$720. Total, \$8,449.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH

"What is the use of fumigating the schools?" asks a citizen. "Why does not the Board of Health get down into the bowels and fumigate them? Why does not the city clean up? Why are there any cess pools instead of proper drains?"

Why, it may also be asked, is there not a medical inspector in this city? There is good reason to believe that all cases of diphtheria are not reported to the Board of Health, and thus the public health is menaced; and by the careless spread of the disease citizens who really are careful, but whose children attend the public schools, are put to great inconvenience, subjected to quarantine and involved in a large unnecessary expense.

The Times commends to its readers the article which appears on the first page of this issue. In the interests of all citizens, the Board of Health should be more active and there should be a medical inspector.

GIVE THEM WORK

A number of able-bodied men have applied at this office during the past week for assistance. Some of them were men of the city and some were not. They wanted work and had been looking for it in vain. Not one of them desired to eat the bread of charity if he could get an opportunity to earn his living. No matter what may have brought these men to their present condition, there ought to be in this city some means provided by which they could at least earn a bare subsistence. It is true that there are quite a large number of men who do not desire work, and who simply prey upon the public. It would be greatly to the advantage of the public if there were some kind of work to which even this class of men could be directed. If they declined to avail themselves of it, they should be invited to leave town without an hour's delay; but for the industrious man who is willing to work and who really needs it to keep body and soul together, provision ought to be made.

This paper has returned to this subject many times, and will return to it again as long as the present do-nothing system prevails. The members of the Associated Charities are constantly at their wits-end to meet the demands made upon them, to tell men where to find work. This is a matter which should receive the attention of the city council.

A SERIOUS CHARGE

A correspondent who does not sign his name sends the Times a letter, asking why the provincial government does not enforce the present liquor law as far as it goes. This correspondent refers particularly to the county, and makes the charge that at road-houses liquor is sold from dark to daylight, on Sunday and every day, without law or license, and further states that the roads are scarcely safe for a man and his family after dark, on account of teams driven recklessly by half-drunk men and women, going to and from these dens. It is further declared that a foreigner recently went into Simonds with rum and women and opened a night ranch that is running full blast. The parishes of Simonds and Lancaster, he says, have been cursed with such places for years, with no attempt made to close them. A small fine imposed once or twice a year, this writer says, is simply a form of license, and is a lasting disgrace to those in authority. The Times correspondent calls upon Hon. Mr. Maxwell and Premier Hazen to see that the law is enforced in St. John county, to prove to the people that they are sincere in their professions that they desire to minimize the evils of intemperance.

future of the lumber markets, but these cannot well be duller than they have been, and with a reduced cut there ought to be considerable improvement later in the year. If, for example, the British lumber market should take a turn upward during next summer, it would make an immense difference to the general trade interests of this province for the year. So many people are interested in the lumber trade in the lumber trade that an increase in price and a larger demand would infuse benefits throughout the commercial circles of the province. There will, of course, be great activity in railway construction work during the year, and this will put in general circulation large sums of money paid out for wages and supplies. The prospects for building operations are said to be good in some towns in the province, although as a matter of fact we never experience building booms in this part of the country. Progress is slow and steady. Looking over the whole field, there seems no reason to doubt that we will have a fairly prosperous year in New Brunswick.

"Our greatest national asset" is what the Maritime Merchant calls the health of the citizens. Since health has a commercial value, it argues that business men should seek to promote every means of eliminating disease from the community. This, of course, is supplementary to the statement that every man should really labor to this end on purely humanitarian grounds. Dealing strictly with the business aspect of the question the editor of the Merchant states that he listened recently to a lecture in which the speaker declared that the people of Canada lose \$81,000,000 every year through needless illness, and that in the Maritime Provinces we suffer an annual industrial loss of \$2,350,000 because of tuberculosis. The Merchant contends that in the effort to prevent this enormous loss it is the duty of business men to lead. A strong public opinion must be built up in favor of the campaign against disease, and both federal and provincial governments must spend money under a centralized authority with branches everywhere for the promotion of health and the education of the people to that end.

CITY AND C. P. R. CLASH OVER WEST SIDE LANDS

Railway Corporation Demands Exclusive Rights to Land for Yards and Facilities in Exchange for That 1600 Foot Strip.

Word reached the city last evening from Ottawa that the result of the negotiations between the St. John delegation and the C. P. R. with regard to the exchange of the 1600 foot strip to the Beacon Bar for the above rights which the company requires for yard room behind Sand Point have not proved as satisfactory as the delegation hoped for.

When the property was ceded to the C. P. R. it was understood by the city that it should be developed as business premises, and assurances to that effect, it is said, were obtained from Sir Thomas Shaughnessy.

Members of the committee, in speaking of the matter, said the city naturally is averse to the present situation resulting in an open disagreement with the C. P. R. and it was hoped that a solution satisfactory to both parties might be arrived at.

The obstruction on the New Brunswick Southern Railway at Dyer's Station caused by the derailment of an engine and car, was removed yesterday and the line is again open for traffic.

TREATY RIGHTS OF CANADA A SUBJECT OF DISCUSSION IN PARLIAMENT YESTERDAY

Both Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Borden Hold the View That the Canadian People Should Know the Provisions of International Agreements Before They Are Ratified—Open Discussion in the Press One Way to Achieve This—McLean Again Goes for the C. P. R.

Ottawa, Feb. 5.—Another criticism of the Canadian Pacific stock issue and British diplomatic etiquette, as applied to treaties, was this afternoon again brought forward in the house of commons.

R. L. Borden, who raised the question, said the impression seemed to have been created in Great Britain and in the mind of the secretary of state for the colonies, the Earl of Crewe, that his previous remarks on the subject had been directed against the action of the imperial authorities.

He desired to say that such an impression was erroneous. He agreed with the colonial secretary that the government of Canada was responsible to the parliament of Canada for its dealings, whether in negotiation with the United States or in its relations with any other country.

Quoting from Lord Crewe's despatch the statement that treaties were considered by the United States senate in secret session, Mr. Borden said he had looked up the opinion expressed by members of the committee that the C. P. R., being fully aware of its importance, is using the possession of the strip as a lever to obtain the exclusive right to the yard room used as a dock.

Members of the committee, in speaking of the matter, said the city naturally is averse to the present situation resulting in an open disagreement with the C. P. R. and it was hoped that a solution satisfactory to both parties might be arrived at.

WENDELSSOHN THE CENTENARY OF THE FAMOUS GERMAN MUSICIAN

Profile of Mendelssohn

Cecile Mendelssohn Wife of Mendelssohn as she appeared in Death

The year 1909, a year of notable centennials, holds two that are of preeminent significance to musicians and the entire music-loving world. On February 3 occurs the centenary of Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy, known to the world at large as Mendelssohn—and a date but a few weeks later, or March 1, to be exact, marks the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Frederic Chopin. Both of these composers have by their work made deep impressions upon the history of music, but the achievements of Mendelssohn perhaps stand out as the most preeminent and the present centennial will serve to not only draw popular attention to the composer of the "Spring Song" and other masterpieces, but will also emphasize his musical personality and remarkable career.

When Mendelssohn was but 17 years of age he composed the famous overture to the "Midsummer Night's Dream," which the critics of all time have been unanimous in pronouncing the most remarkable example of musical precocity in the history of the world. A year later the boy's first opera was produced at the Grand Opera House in Berlin and met with pronounced success. When little past 20 years of age Mendelssohn was offered the chair of music at the Berlin University, but declined, and about this time undertook a concert tour of England, where he was hailed as one of the great composers and pianists of the day. This experience was followed by concert tours of Scotland, Austria, Italy, Switzerland and France.

When Mendelssohn returned to Leipzig from this English tour the effect of the culmination of years of overwork began to make itself distressingly manifest and he was obliged to resign his post as conductor of the orchestra and his position at the conservatory. There came the shock of the news of the death of Mendelssohn's favorite and very talented sister, Fanny Hensel, and this blow, coming but a few years after the death of his mother, of whom he was very fond, seemed crushing in effect and the composer went into a rapid decline, his death occurring on November 4, 1847, at the comparatively early age of 38 years.

From the above reference to the aptly of Berlin, it may be suspected that Mendelssohn, despite the almost uninterrupted success and his freedom from care, ancient money matters did not pass through his comparatively brief career without some heartburning. Aside from the legacy of Berlin, there was the circumstance that Mendelssohn was never successful as he desired in operatic composition and some of the criticisms which assailed his operatic attempts in the quick. No mention of Mendelssohn's life in England would be at all adequate without reference to his friendship for Jenny Lind. The famous songstress fulfilled his ideal of an artist and it was for her that he wrote his greatest work, "Elphig."

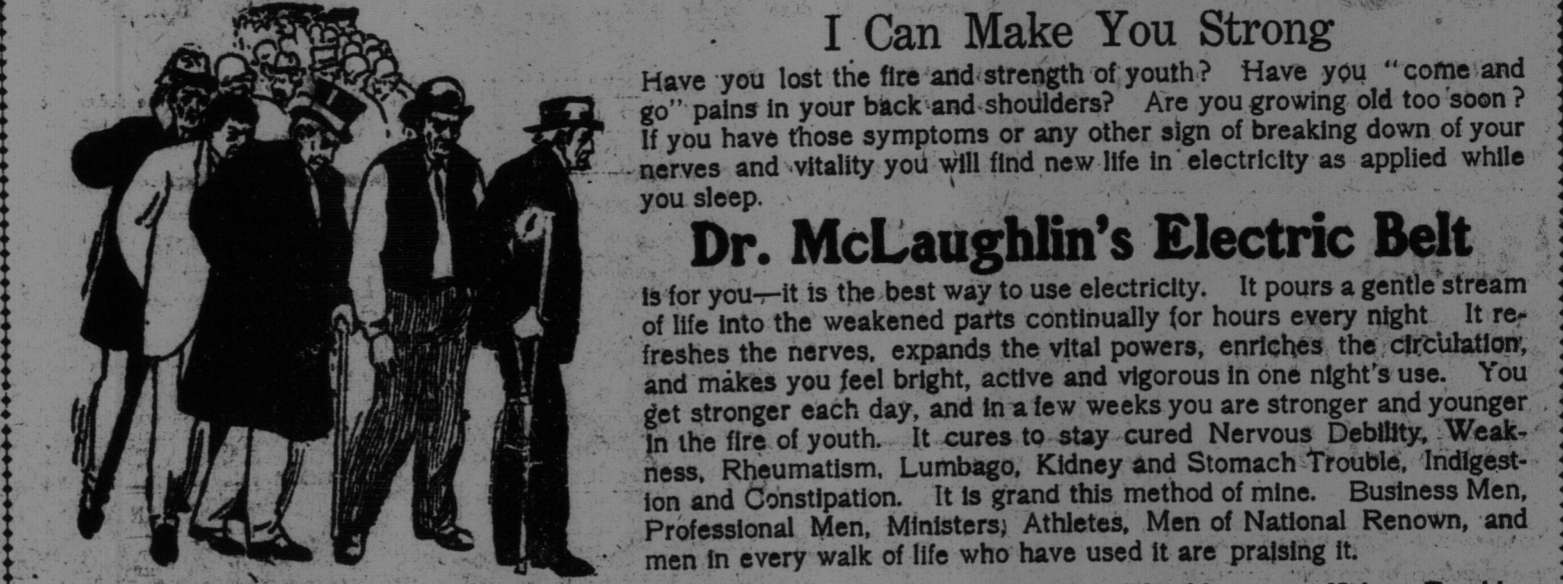

LIGHTS MUST BE PUT OUT ON TIME

William O'Keefe Charged With Violating the Liquor Law by Having Lights in His Saloon After 10 O'clock.

William O'Keefe was the defendant this morning in an information against him preferred by Night Special Lucas, for infringing on the liquor regulations by permitting lights to burn in his saloon on Union street after ten o'clock on the night of February 4. A plea of not guilty was entered, and the informant was sworn. He testified to seeing lights in the store at half-past ten on Tuesday night, and perceiving two men leave the street door. He knew one of the men. The lights continued burning until seven minutes to eleven, when they were extinguished, and subsequently, two more men came out, one of whom was the proprietor, and the other was Hugh Beck.
