

GUNS AT THE FAIR. Objects of Special Interest to the Visitors.

BIG KRUPP GUN DISAPPOINTING.

When You See It You Do Not See What You Expected, but Still It Is the Largest Piece of Ordnance in the World and Fires a Shell Weighing More Than s

On this day we can find nothing better to write about than the big guns of the fair. A vast crowd is on the exposition grounds today, and when the tickets of admission are counted up at midnight probably the total attendance for the day will be found to exceed anything in the history of international expositions. It is a great day, sure enough; a day to be remembered by pate in this unparalleled celebration in this unpercedented spot. To many thousands of visitors the big guns have been objects of special interest today. It is in America a day of guns, of gunpowder, of noise, of martial spirit. Every Fourth of July we feel as if we could lick all creation, and every other day of the year we are quite sure we don't want to lick anyone or anything except Columbian postage stamps, and that is task enough for the

najority of us. When it comes to big guns we are not a far behind the world as some people think we are. Of course the biggest guns here are those shown by Herr Krupp, the fa-mous German iron founder. You have mous German iron founder. You have read so much in the papers about his mammoth gun, and, no doubt, have seen so many pictures of it, that I don't feel called upon to give you a very careful description of the monster. To tell the truth, it is not as big as I thought it was, and when you come to the fair I dare say you will experience a distinct sense of disappointment in the magnitude of this famous shooting iron. This is largely due to mous shooting iron. This is largely due to the fact that the gun is mounted. If it the fact that the gun is mounted. If it were lying on the ground, where you could stand beside it and note that its thickness at its thickest part is a foot greater than your hight, you would be less disappointed in its size. Mounted on its great earriage the big gun is high in the air. It stands in the center of a huge structure, and is surrounded by other great guns, enormous castings and forgings, steamer shafts and screws, steam hammers, etc. The effect of these surroundings is to dwarf even the greatest piece of ordnance in the world.

The truth of course is that this gun is monstrous. Just comprehend the significance of these figures, if you can: Greatest thickness, 6 feet 6 inches; length, 47 feet; bore, 1614 inches; weight, 270,000 pounds. Krupp had some big guns at the Philadelphia exposition, and though they were not nearly as large as this monster they were more sensational. While Herr Krupp makes the greatest guns in the world, so far as size is concerned, it is disputed that he makes the best guns. The constant tendency of modern gun-building is not toward great rize, but to lightness and ease of manipulation and, above all, rapid fire. Only a certain percentage of discharges from ordnance can be expected to be effective, at best. The necessity for repeating is obvious, if much damage is to be inflicted upon the enemy. A single shot from Krupp's monster might cripple an approaching battleship, at a distance of eight or ten nailes, but the chances are it would fire three or four times without once hitting the target. At a somewhat shorter range a number of rapid-firing

The British have carried gun-making to a higher degree of perfection, probably, than any other nation. Today they make no larger gun than the 65-ton Armstrong, and very few as heavy as that. Uncle Sam had his plans prepared for the manufacture of a large number of these 12-inch guns, and a smaller number of 15-inch guns, to weigh 110 tons each. I understand the latter have been abandoned, and that the 12-inch rifle is the largest ordnance our government will make. This gun firez a projectile weighing 1,100 pounds, and has an effective range of about eight miles.

As I have already indicated, the rapid fire, high-power gun is thought by experts to be the most useful type of modern ordnance. We see here an English Armstrong weighing 6½ tons, with a 6-inch bore, throwing a hundred pound projectile and firing by electricity. The best trials of this gun show a speed of five nimed shots in fifty-five seconds, four of them striking the target at a distance of a little more than half a mile. The powder used is called cordite, and it is a high-power explosive. This, therefore, may be regarded as the very highest type of modern rapid-fire ordnance. Our own government is rapidly improving the Hotchkiss gun, and is besides perfecting other types, so that in a few years at most Uncle Sam will be abreast of the English in this form of ordnance, as he is already in the forging of heavier pieces.

In rapidity of fire the French are ahead of both the English and Americans. They show a gun here known as the Canet rapid-fire gun, of 5½ inches caliber and 11,000 pounds weight. It throws a 70-pound shell with 24 pounds of smokeless powder, and at a recent trial seven shots were fired in fifty-four seconds, while a smaller gun of the same model fired five shots in twenty-four seconds. The Russian naval authorities have adopted this gun for service on their cruisers and battleships.
