



IN GRASSHOPPERS

Maine Man Takes a "Tip" From a Fisher

man and Lays in a Big Stock.

LEE, Me., Feb. 4—What he believed to be a new road to riches has been discovered by James Ludgate, a farmer living north of here. If it doesn't pan out Mr. Ludgate will be extremely disappointed, particularly as the experiment has already cost him \$14.

Last spring a city boarder, who had come here trout fishing, declared that if he could only get some grasshoppers he would be willing to pay liberally for them, as he believed they would prove great bait along the trout streams. He pointed out the fact that trout could always obtain plenty of worms and flies when the season opened, but that they had to wait until August for grasshoppers. He would be willing to pay two cents each for some, and he knew scores of other fishermen who would give as much, he said.

This set Mr. Ludgate to thinking, and when grasshopper time came he hired all the boys in the neighborhood to catch the insects at the rate of one cent for fifty. He sent his own children out in the fields, and when the crop had been gathered he possessed about seventy-five thousand hoppers of all kinds, ages and sizes. As fast as the insects were taken they were placed in a corncrib, which had been made air tight by pasting paper over the cracks. The crib was then filled with

No Liberal Expression of Sympathy With Their Aims — Balfour on

LONDON, Feb. 4—Right-Hon. Arthus Balfour, speaking at Hull, said that monthly bulletins of his opinions were not needed, as they were not subject to monthly variations. Further, he thought that study of the fiscal question but confirmed the opinions he had long held and expressed. QUAKES CAUSED BY SUN AND MOON

Theory Advanced by Noted **English Meterologists**

Predicts Scismic Disturbances of Varying Violence Over Europe in

February.

LONDON, Feb. 5—"There will be seismic and volcanic action of varying violence over Europe in February," said Hugh Clements, the meteorologist, who successfully predicted some of the recent terrestrial disturbances. His statement was in response to a question asked him lately as to the earthquake probabilities for February. "Earth tremors," he continued, "are likely to be felt about Feb. 21 in the eastern counties of England and along the Anglo-Scottish border. These will spring from solar and lunar effects exactly like those which caused the devastating volcanic eruptions and earthquakes in the Island of Krakatoa in August, 1883. The high gales now sweeping over Great Britain are the forerunners of coming disturbances of the earth's crust.

ARE MORE READY TO USE PISTOLS

Growing Tendency Shown by Recent Crimes in Britain

Inferences Drawn From Murder of Mr. Whitely Following a Long Series of Similar Outrages.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—The murder of the well-known merchant, Mr. Whiteley, a few days ago, coming on top of a long series of revolver crimes, calls attention to what seems to be a growing tendency in England to resort to the pistol for purposes of revenge and the indulgence of other violent impulses. The tendency of the age, it is contended, is undoubtedly towards quick decisions. The old-time deliberate, non-impulsive habit of the Briton has been influenced by the restless energy of the day. Many deeds of violence have been reported which never would have taken place if the perpetrator had had patience to calmly consider whether or not his method of righting his wrong, real or fancied, was in proportion to the offence. In many murder cases tried recently it has been shown that the deed had not been deliberately premeditated. The murderer seems to have provided himself with a revolver so as to be ready for any emergency, just in the way an Italian seems to carry a stilletto. If it is true that this sort of use of the revolver is becoming a craze, as some infer, it is a curious sequel to the law passed in 1902 requiring the intending buyer of a pistol to produce a license for the inspection of the seller, who is himself compelled to keep a careful record of his sales.

Enquiries of many gunsmiths show that since the law became effective the sale of revolvers has fallen off by at least two-thirds. Undoubtedly the law has resulted in lessening reckless shooting outrages by hoodlums in large cities, but apparently it has not checked suicides and passion-impelled crimes. 
