





Hardwood Flooring Plant Will be in end evening services on Sunday next. Operation Within a Few Days.

Mr. Harley W. Gross, manager of the Hillsboro Hardwood Flooring Mfg. Co., is in the city today and returns to Hillsboro this evening. Mr. Gross has, for the past few months, been superintending the erection of the mill put up for the new company, and says that operations will be commenced within two weeks. Steam was turned on today for the first test of the machinery. The plant, although not very large, is spoken of as one of the most up-to-date in the east. The mill proper is a wooden frame building 40 feet by 80 feet with the most modern equipment for the economical manufacture of hardwood flooring. The power house, built of store, is situated some distance from the mill. A dry-house 22 feet by 100 feet has also been completed. The plant is located at the edge of the village of Hillsboro about half a mile from the station, and a siding from the Salisbury and Harvey Railroad runs through the yard, making convenient the handling of stock of all kinds. Considerable quantities of timber have already been secured, and manufacturing will now go on without any further delay.
