

Harry Fiedalue Would Not Bury Body of His Father.

CHICAGO, Feb. 8—Admiral Robley D. Evans, who is in Chicago for a brief stop on his way across the continent, dismisses the possibility of war with Japan as a result of the agitation in California as absurd.

"There can't be any trouble between the United States and Japan," he said, "because the people of both nations are too intelligent to let the squabble in the California Legislature become an international affair.

"Of course it is a little strange, almost immediately after our fleet left Japan, with the friendliest feelings prevailing, that anything should happen to disturb that calm, but it cannot amount to anyhing.

"California has a perfect right to rass any laws it desires with regard to aliens, provided they don't conflict with any of the treaties of the nation, and if they do conflict they are null, that's all. California can pass laws with regard to aliens, provided they apply to all aliens alike.

"In the south they have scparate schools for negroes and whites, but this affair differs in that the race against which there is a prejudice is represented by a sovereign power."


