Washington, D. C., April 25.—To learn why a nearby steamer did not offer aid to the sinking Titanic and to fix the exact hour at which the lost liner was warned that she was in the vicinity of dangerous ice, Senator Wm. Alden Smith, chairman of the senate committee investigating the disaster today summoned three important witnesses. They are J. P. Moore, captain of the steamer Mount Temple, which passed within a shorf distance of the Titanic when she was in an extremely had plight, and the captain and wireless operator of the lifter Californian which sent the warning. All will be put on the stand tomorrow.Summoness were issued for the master and operator of the Californian, while the announcement that Capt. Moore would appear was contained in a telegram from Acting Premier Foster, of Canada. Capt. Moore's story probably will be heard first, for his ship is due to sail from St. John, N. B., Friday.
Virtually the entire day was given over to questioning G. Marconi, inventor of the wireless telegraph, and head of the company bearing his name. Both the Titanic and the Carpathia were equipped with the Marconi apparatus. Harold T. Cottam, the wireless operator on the Carpathia, also was re-examined.

Gigitico Marconi, chairman of the senate committee investigating the Titanic disaster that he authorized the wireless operators of the Carpathia and Titanic to sell their story of the great catastrophe for publication. Mr. Marconi explained that in giving consent for the sale of these stories, he had not attempted to suppress general information of the wreck.

Probably the best pea seed to grow now is the wrinkled kind, which

quality. There are three varieties of peas—the dwarf, the half-dwarf and the tail. For the small garden the dwarf is the best, for it matures early, requires no other support than the nearby vines, and gives way to something else later on.

It should be planted in a double row in a furrow about six inches.

d rich, if it is the pea will run to vine, k which may, however, be guarded against by pinching back the vine.
Use no manure at the time of spading or sowing.

Over the seed about two inches of soil should be placed in the early season, later on seed should be plant.


