

THE VISIT OF MR. GUTELIUS.

From the statements made yesterday by Mr. F. P. Gutelius, of the I. C. R., it must be quite apparent that politics had absolutely no bearing on the agreement made between the Intercolonial and Canadian Pacific Railways whereby C. P. R. through freight will be hauled between St. John and the mail steamers at the Port of Halifax. Aside from clearing up this fact the statement leaves a great deal to be desired.

doubt it is true, that, under the agree-ment, the rates the I. C. R. will re-ceive for through freight from St. John to Halifax are better than the rates for the same class of freight from Montreal to Halifax, but that is not the

question. Mr. Gutelius was distinctly asked yesterday, would the C. P. R. not have to pay more for the hauling of freight from St. John to Halifax if the agreement were not in existence,

and he evaded an answer.

The agreement, as it stands, may be good business for the I. C. R., but, unless it can be clearly shown that the C. P. R. would have been obliged to go to Halifax, whether the agree-ment was made or not, the present situation is decidedly not satisfactory and we must continue to press for the ights of St. John. At the same tim ailing lists provide for 123 sailings of all lines for the season of 1913-14, as compared with 128 last season, a decrease of five. If, as now seems likely, the Canadian Northern mail steamers, Royal Edward and Royal George, should be transferred from Halifax to St. John, the number will be materialyear and as much business as we can properly care for.
