# EUTON ARMIES COMPLETELY CRUSHED DOBRUDJA, RETREATING BEFORE ROUMANIANS

CARLETON COUNTY ELECTS HON, B. FRANK SMITH FIGHTING ON AND W. S. SUTTON BY LARGE MAJORITIES 12-MILE FRONT

Government Candidates Sweep the County Despite Vile Campaign of Slander Waged by the Opposition—"eople of Carleton Co. in No Uncertain Tone Voice Their Appreciation of Honest Administration of the Clarke Government.

### YESTERDAY'S RESULT SPELLS DOWNFALL OF FRANK B. CARVELL

Carvell Makes Barefaced Attempt to Personate Voter-Opposition a Disheartened Crowd—Carvell-Veniot-Carter Gang Too Well Known to Fool Electors with their "Purity" Talk.

Woodstock, Sep. 21.—The bitterest political campaign the county of Carleton has ever known is over. Hon. B. Frank Smith and W. S. Sutton, the Government candidates, have been elected by a splendid majority over Andrew Mc-Cain and George W. Upham, the vote standing as follows:

SMITH, 2,828, a majority of 570. SUTTON, 2,753, a majority of 495.

McCain, 2,258.

Upham, 2,211. Frank B. Carvell, who made the fight his own, has been given his political quietus and the Liberals tonight realize that his career as the inisrepresentative of this county will come to an inglorious end at the next federal election.

Today's result was practically a straight party vote. 75 votes separated Hon. Mr. Smith and his colleague, while the opposition candidates ran within 47 of each other. The Overnment candidates received their majorities in Simonds, West Florenceville, Foreston, East Florenceville, Hartland, Lower Woodstock, Upper Woodstock, Woodstock Town, Grafton, Rockland, Harman School House, Victoria, Lakeville, Centreville, Glassville, Bath and Summerfield. The showing in Bath, East Florenceville, Hartland and Woodstock Town was particularly good.

The opposition candidates won in Richmond Corner, Tracey Mills, Debec, Jacksonville, Johnville and Greenfield. Johnville gave them a majority of 86 votes but in the other polls mentioned the opposition majorities were negligible. The weather was fine and the vote was large for a by-election. Opposition money and rum were in evidence but could not stem the tide of disapproval against the slanderous campaign indulged in by their speakers or the determination of the voters of Carleton to endorse the Clarke Government and at the same time teach the Dark Lantern Brigader "Purity" Carter a well mented lesson.

The successful candidates have received scores of meses of congratulation on their success as the contest attracted keen interest all over Canada.

Carvell a Sad Man.

London, Sept. 22.—The latest official communication from Bucharest confirms the Entente reports that the great battle in Dobrudja has ended in the defeat of the Central Powers, after six days' fighting. The battle began last Friday, gradually increased in scope and intensity until Tuesday evening, with the result that

day evening, with the result that on Wednesday, the Germans, Bulgars and Turks, crushed, were forced to withdraw, burning villages in their line of retreat, in an effort to retard their pursuers. One fourth of Transylvania is now in Roumanian hands.



ork in Both Cases to be Done this Year and Arrangement for Payment

The committee of the Common Council at their meeting yesterday, at poon, decided to recommend that the work on Main street between Simonds street and Douglas avenue be done this year, the expenditure to be met out of next year's assessment.

Commissioner Fisher recommended that Main street between Simonds street and Douglas avenue be paved, a concrete base being put down and the surface to be of an asphalite nature at an estimated cost of \$3,740. This recommendation was adopted.

He reported that the cost of doing the necessary work on Clarendon St. would be about \$3,844, which included an estimate of \$400 for retaining walls and recommended that no action be taken in this matter at the present time. The commissioner of public works also pointed out that he could not find any record of the city having taken over the street but the common clerk informed him that the city having taken over the street but the common clerk informed him that the city having laready done some work on the street had by that action accepted it. The commissioner also said that he had so much work on hand in his department at present that he would be unable to do the work if the committee voted in favor of it.

The mayor was not in favor of an overdraft for this work as he considered it bad financing.

Commissioner McLellan moved, seconded by Commissioner Wigmore, that the work on Clarendon street be done by tender and provision for the payment be made later. This was carried, the mayor and Commissioner Fisher voting against it.

It was decided to have the committee meet at 11.30 instead of 12 o'clock. A petition that the city pay a claim of \$800 which William Morrish had against Thomas Williams, a sontractor for the city, was referred to the mayor, recorder and commissioner of water and sewerage.



After being rebuilt, the schooner sailed from St. John, N. B., on Friday, August 11, for Las Palmas, with a cargo of pine and a few days later encountered a storm. Captain Birnle said he and his crew were forced to seek refuge on the afterdeck house and had about exhausted their limited food supply when the British tramp steamer Knight of the Garter picked them up on her voyage from Norfolk for Italy and landed them at Gibraltar. gain if I have to start on that day."

# RAILWAYS REQUIRED TO STEEL OF CANADA ST. JOHN MARKET SHOW WHY AND WHEREFORE

Classification of Freight Common Dividend - Will Rates - Railway Board's Approval Witheld in Mean-

An epidemic of nightmare has been sweeping over business houses from end of Canada to the other, ever since the distribution of the proposed new freight classification, known in official parlance as Classification No. 17. On A few shippers are still enjoying the sweet dreams that are inspired by fancied security; either they have not heard of the surprise package the railways had in store for them, or they have not taken the trouble to look for jokers. Many shippers to their sorrow have found the jokers, hence the nightmare, for they have felt they were beaten. Other shippers, comparatively few in number, are able to look back upon their alarm with a smile, for they know the danger is passed, for the present at least. Classification No. 16, with its numerous supplements, was far from gretect,—so far in fact that shippers and carriers were both dissatisfied with it, and insisted on a thorough overhauling. Naturally business houses expected that through their trade associations, they would be consulted when the time came for drafting the necessary changes. The railways, however, could not or would not see it that way; they preferred to do the overhauling themselves. Apparently when they tackled the job they decided it would be easier, quicker, and more satisfactory, to themselves of course, to work out a new classification No. 17 has its predecessor disfigured beyond recognition.

Since its appearance shippers everywhere have been busy with pencil and paper, trying to figure out where they were at. The farther they proceeded, the clearer it became that they had been done.

And now, after they have given themselves endless worry, it transfer

And now, after they have given themselves endless worry, it transpires that they are not done after all,—not yet, at any rate. At the instance of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, the Board of Railway Commissioners has issued a judgment requiring the railways to furnish a statement showing all the changes in the rules of the proposed new classification, the grounds upon which they are sought to be justified, and the results which such changes would make on traffic in eastern and western Canada. Meanwhile, of course, the board is withholding its approval, in consequence of which Classification No. 16 and supplements are still effective.

Scrip certificates, non-negotiable or payable to bearer in accordance with the choice of the applicant for registered or bearer bonds, will be issued, after allotment, in exchange for the provisional receipts.

When the scrip certificates have been paid in full and payment endorsed thereon by the bank receiving the money, they may be exchanged for bonds, when prepared, with coupons attached, payable to bearer or registered as

to principal, or for fully registered bonds, when prepared, without coupons, in accordance with the application.

Delivery of scrip certificates and of bonds will be made through the chartered banks.

The issue will be exempt from taxes—including any income tax—imposed in pursuance of legislation enacted by the Parliament of Canada.

The bonds with coupons will be issued in denominations of \$100, \$500, \$1,000. Fully registered bonds without coupons will be issued in denominations of \$1,000, \$5,000 or any authorized multiple of \$5,000. The bonds will be paid at maturity at par at the office of the Minister of Finance and Receiver General at Ottawa, or at the office of the Assistant Receiver General at Halifax, St. John, Charlottetown, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg,

Regina, Calgary, or Victoria. The interest on the fully registered bonds will be paid by cheque, which will be remitted by post. Interest on bonds with coupons will be paid on surrender of coupons. Both cheques and coupons will be payable free of exchange at any branch in Canada of any chartered bank.

Subject to the payment of twenty-five cents for each new bond issued, holders of fully registered bonds without coupons will have the right to convert into bonds of the denomination of \$1,000 with coupons, and holders of bonds with coupons will have the right to convert into fully registered bonds of authorized denominations without coupons at any time on application to the Minister of Finance.

The books of the loan will be kept at the Department, of Finance, Ottawa.

Application will be made in due course for the listing of the issue on the Montreal and Toronto Stock Exchanges.

Recognized bond and stock brokers will be allowed a commission of one-quarter of one per cent on allotments made in respect of applications bearing their stamp, provided, however, that no commission will be allowed in respect of the amount of any allotment paid for by the surrender of bonds issued under the War Loan prospectus of 22nd November, 1915. No commission will be allowed in respect of applications on forms which have not been printed by the King's Printer.
