Sabbath Service, at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. Sabbath School at 3 p.m.; quarterly service for the young at 3 p.m. on the last Sabbath of March, June, September and December. Young people's prayer meeting every Sabbath morning at 10:15. Mission Sabbath School in Grant's Sail Loft every Sunday morning at 9:30.

The Pastor's Class, every Monday at 7:30 p.m. in winter and 8 p.m. in summer.

The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor meets every Monday evening at the close of the above class.

Opportunities for Conversation with the Pastor at his residence every Tuesday evening.

Stated Meetings of Session are held in the Session Room, on the second Tuesday of every month at 8 p.m.

Stated Meetings of Managers are held in their room on the second Tuesday of every month at 8 p.m., and a committee meets in the church on the same evening at 7:30 for the purpose of allocating pews.

A Joint Meeting of the Session and Managers is held at the first regular meeting after each communion.

Weekly Prayer Meeting every Wednesday at 8 p.m.

Sabbath School Teachers' Meeting every Wednesday at the close of the prayer meeting for the study of the lesson.

The Executive Committee of the Missionary Association meets on the first Thursday evening of February, May, August and November.

The Regular Business Meetings of the Sabbath School Association are held on the last Thursday of every month.

The Ladies' Association meets every Thursday at 2:30 p.m.

The Ordinance of Baptism is dispensed on the first Sabbath of every month, at the commencement of the morning service, and on the first Wednesday of every month at the commencement of the prayer meeting.

OF THE
Annual Congregational Meeting of Knox Church,
HAMILTON, ONT.,
HELD ON WEDNESDAY EV'G, JAN. 16th, 1889.

The pastor, Rev. Mungo Fraser, D.D., occupied the chair, and, on motion of Ald. McLellan, seconded by E. Bethune, W. H. McLaren was elected secretary.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and confirmed on motion of J. G. McIntyre, seconded by Jas. Ogilvie. The minutes of a special meeting, held April 25th, were read and, on motion of E. Bethune, seconded by Jas. Kilgour, confirmed.

The report of the special committee on presentation to H. Martin was read by Ald. McLaren, and on motion, proposed by Wm. Givin and seconded by F. H. Ross, it was adopted.

The manager's report was then presented by the chairman of the board, J. G. McIntyre, which, on motion of Jas. Ogilvie, seconded by A. McPherson, was adopted.

The financial statement was presented by the treasurer, F. H. Ross, which was adopted on motion of H. S. Wallace, seconded by Wm. Givin.

The Sunday School report was read by the secretary, W. J. Cunningham, which was adopted on motion of Ald. McLellan, seconded by J. G. McIntyre.

The Mission Sunday School report was read by the secretary, A. McPherson, on whose motion, seconded by M. Brennen, it was adopted.

Moved by W. H. McLaren, seconded by E. Bethune, that \$500 be appropriated out of the ordinary revenue of the church, as soon as the managers shall have that amount on hand over and above the amount necessary for ordinary expenditure, for the purpose of assisting in the purchase of a lot and the erection of a building suitable for a Mission Sunday School.—Carried.

The report of the Mission Society was read by Wm. Givin, on whose motion, seconded by M. Brennen, it was adopted.

W. H. McLaren read the report of the Women's Mission Band and moved its adoption. This was seconded by Ald. McLellan and carried.

J. A. Moffat read the report of the Ladies' Aid. The adoption of this was moved by J. A. Moffat and seconded by F. H. Ross.

The report of the Session was read by the session clerk, Ald. McLellan, when it was moved by W. H. McLaren, seconded by J. G. McIntyre, that it be printed in the year book as usual.—Carried.

The chairman then called on the congregation to elect managers in place of the three whose term of office has just expired, when it was moved by F. H. Ross and seconded by W. H. McLaren, that in the event of more than three being nominated the election be by ballot.—Carried.

Messrs. McPherson and Cunningham were appointed scrutineers, who, after counting the ballots, declared Messrs. A. Richardson, M. Brennen and John Scott duly elected.

Moved by Ald. McLellan, seconded by J. G. McIntyre, that the hearty thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the Managers, Trustees, Auditors, Sabbath School Superintendents, Officers and Teachers, Missionary Association, Mission Band, Ladies' Aid Association, Choir, Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, and all other workers in connection with the congregation, for their valuable services during the past year.—Carried.

Moved by Ald. McLellan, seconded by J. G. McIntyre, that Messrs. Wm. McAulay, D. A. McNab and Capt. Samuel Malcolmson be Trustees for 1889.—Carried.

Moved by Ald. McLellan, seconded by W. H. McLaren, that Messrs. H. S. Wallace and W. J. McFadden be Auditors.—Carried.

FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Managing Committee of Knox Church,

For the Year ending 31st December, 1888.

.....

In submitting their Annual Report, the Managers do so with increased thankfulness to God for the many evidences of prosperity which the congregation has enjoyed during the past year.

The Treasurer's statement shows that \$5,355.84 by envelope and \$1,028.98 by loose collections were received, an increase of \$200.87 over last year. The special collection for reducing the mortgage debt amounted to \$659.25. Your committee are pleased to report that the liberality of the congregation has enabled them to pay off \$2,000.00 of mortgage debt, and after meeting all current liabilities a surplus of \$190.32 remains.

There are now upon the Manager's books 433 subscribers by envelope, giving the sum of \$106.75 per Sabbath, an increase over last year of 28 subscribers and \$1.45 per Sabbath. The arrears due by envelope are \$125.25, all of which is considered good.

Your committee would recommend, as in former years, that special collections for reducing the mortgage debt be taken up on the third Sabbaths of June and October.

The faithful and courteous manner in which the committee of ushers, appointed at the last congregational meeting, has discharged its duties induces your committee to recommend their re-appointment for the ensuing year.

About two months ago your committee were asked by the Sabbath School Association for a special collection to be devoted to the procuring of a library for the school. On consideration they thought it best to defer the matter until the annual meeting, and they now recommend that this year's surplus of \$190.32 be devoted to that purpose.

The Managers who retire by rotation this year are Messrs. J. G. McIntyre, W. Scott and A. Richardson, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

In conclusion, your committee would unite with the congregation in thanking God for past favors and asking for a continuation of His presence and blessing upon us as a people.

FIFTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

OF

Knox Church Sabbath School Association.

For the Year ending 31st December, 1888.

The Sabbath School Association takes pleasure in presenting the following report:

The roll for the past year has been very carefully gone over, and the names of all scholars who have not been present once in the last six months, as well as those who have left the school since, have been struck off. The total number on the roll is, therefore, as follows: Boys, 245; girls, 275; officers and male teachers, 21; female teachers, 30; in all, 571. This, as compared with last year, would show a large decrease; but as last year's roll was not thoroughly gone over, it is safe to say that at present we are quite equal to, if not ahead of last year's standing.

The average attendance for the past year has been 467, as follows: Officers and male teachers, 19; female teachers, 27; boys, 198; girls, 223.

We thought last year that we would not be able to increase our average attendance, but this report shows that we have gained 26 on last year's average; so that our present record in that line is the best in the history of our school. The smallest attendance of any Sabbath during the year was 327, on September 16, while the largest was 541, on February 26th—an increase of 5 over last year's largest attendance.

As an inducement towards keeping up the attendance, we have been presenting prize banners each quarter to the classes having the best average attendance, and we find the scholars are more anxious than formerly to attend regularly.

Every scholar bringing a new pupil to the school receives a prize card; and, after two year's trial, we have found this scheme to work very successfully, as quite a few that might not otherwise be reached are thus brought to the school.

Early in the year the ground floor of the school was fitted up with new seats, which have improved the appearance of the

room greatly, and have added to the comfort of the scholars and teachers. We might here refer to the beautiful scripture texts that adorn the walls of our school. These were presented to the Sabbath School by our friend Wm. McAulay, who brought them from the old country when there this summer. The scholars and teachers all fully appreciate his kindness and admire the texts very much. At the end of 1887 we added two branches to our school work in the shape of a normal and a catechism class. The former was not attended as well as was at first expected, and was accordingly discontinued in May. The catechism class, however, flourished so well that it was found necessary to divide it into two, making a junior and an advance class. Harry Smith conducted the former, and W. H. Davis the latter, and both teachers do good work with their respective classes.

The scholars have been regularly supplied with the *Northern Messenger*, a very fine Sunday school paper, and no doubt its circulation is productive of great spiritual benefit to the scholars. The Moody & Sankey hymn books are still used and meet with more general favor than any yet used in our school. The singing is steadily improving, for which we are indebted to our worthy precentor, James Johnson, who takes every pains in teaching the scholars.

The teachers meet every Wednesday evening at the close of the prayer meeting for the purpose of studying the lessons, but we regret to say that, as a rule, these meetings have not been well attended. There are many good reasons for this, but those who are absent miss a splendid opportunity of hearing the different opinions of the teachers on the different points of the lessons. It is sincerely hoped that greater interest will be taken in this meeting during the coming year. We are pleased to say that the teachers are subscribing more largely to the *Sunday School Times* this year than formerly. It is one of the best papers on the International Sunday School lessons published on the continent, and if carefully read will be found to be of great help in the preparation of the lessons.

The quarterly services for the past year have been held in the church as usual. The children turn out well, but the parents have yet to learn that there is a great opportunity for encouraging the teachers and scholars in their work by attending these services, for comparatively few turn out. A little support in this way from the parents of the children that our teachers are so hard and so faithfully trying to do good to, would certainly cheer us all, and the teachers hope for more of it during the coming year than they have as yet been favored with. All these services have been conducted by Dr. Fraser, who delivers short, bright and instructive addresses.

The collections for the year have been even better than last year. The average collection per Sabbath is \$10.01, as compared with \$9.39 last year. In addition to this, the Young Men's Bible Class, taught by Mr. W. H. McLaren, raised \$150 during the year for missions; \$100 of this they gave to Rev. C. A. Webster, of Toronto, to help procure his missionary outfit; the balance, \$50, was donated to the Southwestern Presbyterian University, Clarksville, Tenn.

We regret to say that our library is in a totally dilapidated condition. It is altogether too small for the demand made upon it, and what books we have are nearly all in fragments; so that before any reading from it can be done next year, it will be necessary to procure a new library throughout. The books have been changed on alternate Sundays for boys and for girls. Our librarian, Mr. Chas. Kilgour, reports that books were changed 21 times for girls, with an average of 112 per Sunday; and 20 times for boys, with an average of 85 per Sunday. There are about 425 teachers and scholars who make use of the library.

In conclusion, we desire to return thanks to God for the very evident outpouring of His Holy Spirit upon our school in the past, and to pray that a still greater measure may attend the labors of the teachers and officers who may have charge of the work next year.

FIRST ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
MISSION SABBATH SCHOOL.

.....

To the Members and Adherents of Knox Church, Hamilton :

The officers and teachers of the Mission Sunday School beg leave to present their first annual report, as follows :

On Sunday, the 1st day of January, 1888, a number of the Young People's Association met at Grant's Sail Loft, foot of Bay Street, for the purpose of starting a Mission Sunday School in that part of the city, and at once organized the School, there being an attendance of 15, which increased from week to week until it reached as high as 116, the average attendance for the year being 102. The number of teachers in regular attendance is 18. They feel that they have abundant reason to thank God for the success that has attended their efforts, and pray that He may continue to smile upon them, so that they may be encouraged to go forward with renewed strength to the work of the year upon which we have entered.

During the year one scholar was removed by death, and two of our most active and useful teachers (Miss Gillespie and Miss Mitchell) have been laid aside for some months by a severe attack of typhoid fever, but we are happy to say are now quite recovered, and we hope soon to see them with their classes again.

Through the liberality of kind friends, as well as our own scholars, after paying all expenses we have a balance to our credit in the bank of about \$80.00.

We also beg to state that we are indebted to Mr. Wm. Giyin for the use of an organ for the year.

In conclusion, we beg to draw the attention of the congregation to the fact that some provision will require to be made for a suitable building to meet in. The present building can only be had until spring, and that through the kindness of some friends who have taken an interest in our work. We trust the congregation at this meeting will take some action towards the purchase of a lot on which to erect a school room, as there is no building at all suitable in that part of the city that can be obtained.

CONSTITUTION

OF

KNOX CHURCH, HAMILTON.

1st.—The Church, Manse, Burying Ground, and any other Houses or Real Estate now belonging to or which may hereafter become the property of the Congregation, shall be held in Trust by three members of the said Congregation, in full Communion, in accordance with a Deed of Trust—bearing date the Sixth Day of September, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-six.

2nd.—The members in Full Communion with the Congregation shall have the sole power of choosing a Minister or Pastor and Elders of said Congregation.

3rd.—The election of a Minister or Pastor shall take place at a meeting of the Members of the Congregation, which shall have been called from the Pulpit of the Church by the officiating minister on each of the two Sabbaths preceding such meeting. The majority of Members present shall determine the election.

4th.—The method of the election of the Elders shall be determined, from time to time, by the Session, as occasion may require; but the election shall be by the Members of the Congregation, and notice of meeting for such election shall be given as provided in Clause Third.

5th.—The constitutional duty of the Session to superintend the Spiritual affairs and watch over all the interests of the Congregation is recognized and reserved to them.

6th.—Nine managers shall be elected to take charge of the secular affairs of the Congregation, three of whom shall retire annually in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election. In case of a vacancy occurring by resignation or otherwise, the Managers themselves shall fill the vacancy at their earliest convenience; and a Manager absenting himself from three successive regular meetings without leave shall cease to be a Manager.

7th.—The Managers shall elect their own Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary; hold regular meetings as often as their business may require, and may give notice of their meetings, either from the pulpit on Sabbaths or by the Secretary to each Manager, when demanded by any three of them. Five Managers shall constitute a quorum. When the Managers shall themselves deem it necessary, or when requested to do so by seven or more Members of the Congregation in Full Standing, they shall with concurrence of the Session call a special meeting of the Congregation, stating the object in the notice thereof; and no business shall be entertained at any Special Meeting excepting what is mentioned in the notice thereof. Should any Manager cease to be a member of the Congregation he shall cease to be a Manager. The Treasurer shall open an account with some regular Chartered Bank in the city, and deposit in his own name, as Treasurer of the Managing Committee, monies from time to time as may be convenient.

8th.—The use of the Church property for public and general purposes not connected with the Congregation shall be under the control of the Managers, with the concurrence of the Minister.

9th.—The whole revenues of the Congregation, from all sources, shall be received and disbursed by the Managers in payment of Stipend, Salaries and other expenses, including such as may be required for preserving the property and providing for the dispensation of Divine Ordinances; but no repairs, improvements or alterations exceeding the sum of One Hundred Dollars shall be gone into without the consent of the Congregation. The "Poor Fund," however shall be distributed by the Session, and contributions for Missionary and Benevolent purposes shall be distributed by the Association appointed for these special purposes.

10th.—The Members of the Congregation shall choose their Organist and Precentor, and fix their salaries, and in the discharge of their duties they shall be under the control of the Session.

11th.—The Managers shall have power to engage or dismiss, and regulate salary of any one who may act as Church Officer or Door Keeper; and appoint or pay such person or persons as may be required to keep the Church clean and comfortable.

12th.—The Managers shall be accountable to the Congregation for their acts, and shall, at each annual meeting in January, submit a full printed, audited, articulate Statement of the Income and Expenditure of the preceding year—copies of which shall be distributed in the pews on the Sabbath before the Annual Meeting; and said Managers shall be regulated as to the proportion of revenue to be applied to any particular purpose by the instructions they may receive from the Congregation at any Special or Annual Meeting.

13th.—A Committee, consisting of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Managing Committee, two members of Session, the Secretary of the Sabbath School, and Secretaries of all the organizations in connection with the Congregation, shall annually arrange for the printing—in pamphlet form—of the reports of all the different organizations in connection with the congregation, together with the list of office-bearers, members and adherents, with their residences; said pamphlet to be distributed to the congregation as early as possible after the annual business meeting and not later than March 1st. The Chairman of the Managers shall be Chairman of said committee.

14th.—The Managers or Trustees shall have no power to contract debt on property without the consent of the Congregation.

15th.—At each annual meeting the Congregation shall elect three Trustees and two Auditors to serve for one year.

16.—The foregoing rules shall be in force until altered or amended; and no motion to alter or amend said rules shall be put, unless due notice of such motion has been given at the annual meeting of the Congregation; and when notice of motion shall have been made, a special meeting of the Congregation shall be called to consider the same—not sooner than two weeks, nor later than two months, after said annual meeting.

17th.—In the foregoing rules, no one shall be held to be a member of the Congregation who is not in Full Communion with the same, and whose name does not appear on the Communion Roll of the said Congregation, and no other than members in Full Communion shall be allowed to vote at any Congregational meeting.
