

Kull, the Queen City and \$4 each. the Celtic-the three latter from Buffalo The Halifax crew, almost immediately after the start, showed in front and were leading one length at the quarter, two lengths at the mile and three lengths at the turning buoy. Supposing that they had to turn their own buoy, having received no instructions to the contrary they got into rough water, and it was with difficulty that they kept the boat with 84 points, Lieut, Hartt, \$5 with 82 from sinking. They fell back into fourth place, the Torontos being the only crew behind them. The Celtics came in ahead. the Nagle-Lee crew second and the F. Kull third. The Queen City retired early

in the race, having fouled with the Nagle Lee crew. The latter claimed first money on the ground that neither the Celtics nor F. Kull crew turned any buoy, and the Halifax crew protested that they were the only crew entitled to any prize, as none of the others had fol lowed the printed rules that each man should turn his own buoy. The referee decided "no race," and it will be rowed over again to-morrow. The time to-day was: Celtic crew, 19.091; Nagle-Lee crew. 19.231.


