Among the first is the oak, and among the latter the laurel. An investigation of this statement

led the writer to the following conclusion: 'At very high po ential electrical discharges all kinds of trees may be subject to destruction from lightning. Trees containing oils are less subject to be struck, those containing very much oil being protected the most. Lightning appears to prefer those trees which contain oil to a slight degree only in summer. The quantity of water contained in the trees has no effect on their liability of being struck. Dead limbs of trees, of those containing starch as well as of those containing oil, are particularly subject to being struck. Cambium, bark and leaves do not alter the
