THE NEWFOUND-LAND ELECTIONS. with an atfidavit of service, some time

The general elections in Newfoundland this month have resulted in the return of Premier Sir Edward Morris party exactly the same number of seats. After vainly trying to carry on the government, Bond resigned the premiership, and Morris formed a cabinet, but was unable to govern and was compelled to dissolve the house. A few years ago Morris was a member of Bond's cabinet. In religion the Newfoundlanders are about equally divided between Anglicans, Methodists. and Roman Catholics, and until lately religion had a very great influence on elec-tions.
