King Edward the Seventh will be buried in the great Abbey where so many illustrious Englishmen are buried, but it was natural, on the part of his family to desire that he should be interred in the family tomb where his father and mother and mother and many of his kin are gathered in their last sleep. 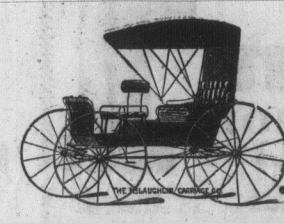

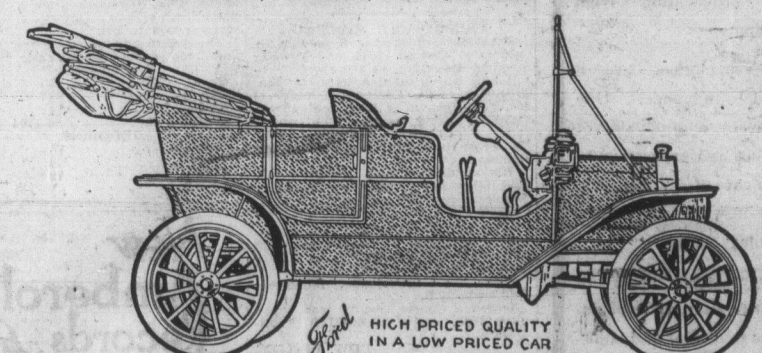

There will be services in St. Andrew's Church at both services on Sunday Rev. C. A. Hardy will occupy the pulpit.


COLONIAL STOCK COMPANY.

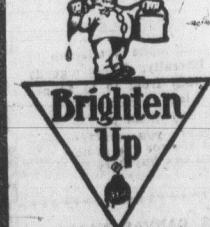
