She emphatically declares that the burden of her debt shall fall upon Upper and Lower Canada—and upon Upper and Lower Canada alone, It is proposed to consolidate the debts of the several Provinces, the Confederation as-

cal governments are, as I have said, all questions of property and civil rights, all questions of property and civil rights, all questions concerning the advancement of agriculture, all questions affecting the education of the people. Each section shall have control over the public land, and prisons and hospitals, and charities in that section. All questions of municipal interest will be subject to the local government. The local works simply for the localities will of course belong to it; and all questions of the incorporation of private companies will be referred to it. In fact all matters of general importance and interest, affecting all the Provinces, will go to the general government; and all matters of a local character, affecting only one section, will go to the local government; and the powers of all these and each separate portion have to be defined and secured by an act of the British Parliment—so that the two bodies shall not come into collision.
