London, Oct. 10 .- British Headquarters report that General Haig's army inflicted heavy defeat on enemy yesterday, captur-As a first step the Board of Health programme was rendered and every ing ten thousand prisoners and from one to two hundred guns. 





In the report of the torpedoing of the Anchor liner Cameronia with troops in the Mediterranean last summer, mention was made of the splendid conduct of the captain's bogyMuckinnon. This youngster was on the bridge with the captain when the ship was struck, and he did much to allay the excitement by shouting through the megaphone to the troops, "keep your heads, men. Dinna get excited. It's a' richt, Nae hurry," and so on. The sight of the small boy with a megaphone as big as himself advising the soldiers to keep cool made many laugh and quieted many nerves. The boy did many other things, and at the end the captain found he had disobeyed orders and was still on the bridge when everyone else had left the ship. When the captain told him to "clear out," he said, "I'll no go till you go, sir." The captain then caught him by the coat and slung him overboard into the destroyer before jumping himself. An eyewitness on the destroyer described seeing the captain and the boy on the bridge of the sinking ship.

I hear now that Mackinnon went down in the Tuscania. Probably he behaved there as he did on the Cameronia, and the death he just missed in the Mediterranean came to him off the Scottish coast. 
