Awful Pummelling of Kaiser's Hosts Continues, and While Progress of British-French Is Slow, It Appears Sure

(Canadian Press.)

Paris, Sept. 17 .- 5;20 p.m. - The Germans are slowly giving way in the great bat tle that continues today all along the line of the River Aisne, according to official announcement made in Paris this afternoon.

The text of the official communication is as follows:

"First-On our left wing the resistance of the enemy on the heights to the north of the River Aisne has continued, in spite of the fact that the enemy gave back slightly at certain points.

"Second-On the centre, between Berry-Au-Bac, on the River Aisne, and the Argonne, the situation shows no change. The enemy continues to fortify himself along the line previously indicated. Between the Argonne and the Meuse the Germans are entrenching themselves in the vicinity of Mont Faucon. In the Woevre district we have come in contact with several detachments of the enemy between Etant and Thiaucourt.

"Third-On the right wing in Lorraine and the Vosges, there has been no change.

GREAT FIGHT STILL IN PROGRESS

Summing up, the battle is being continued along the entire front between the River Oise and the River Meuse. The Germans occupy positions organized for defense and armed with

"Our progress is of necessity slow, but our troops are animated by a spirit of offensive action and they are giving evidence of vigor and enthusiasm. They have repulsed with success the counter attacks undertaken by the enemy both during the day and at night. The morale of the French soldiers is excellent.

The Austrian armies evacuating Galicia are in full rout Their losses in killed, wounded and prisoners are estimated at several hundred thousand men. The German army corps which went to their succor are retreating."

GERMANS ARE REINFORCING

Washington, D. C., Sept. 17.—The French embassy today announced receipt of the following dispatch from Bordeaux: On the 14th and 15th of September the rear of the enemy has been in touch with the pursuing forces of our army. "The Irish people," Mr. Redmond continues, "know and appreciate the fact fully that at last, after centuries of misunderstanding the democracy of Great Britain have finally and irrevocably decided to trust them and give them back their national liberties. "By overwhelming British majorities





[Canadian Press.] London, Sept. 17.—2:30 p.m.—Telegraphing from Maestricht, Holland, the correspondent of the Reuter Telegram Company says that dispatches received in Maestricht from Cologne, Dusseldorf, Wesel and Duisburg indicate that these points are strengthening their fortifications to meet a possible advance of the allies.

Cologne is 45 miles north northwest of Coklenz, an important military stronghold; Dusseldorf is 21 miles north northwest of Cologne; Duisburg is 15 miles north of Dusseldorf, and Wesel is 32 miles northwest of Dusseldorf. A Proclamation. Whereas, great nations of the world have taken up arms against one another and war now draws millions of men into battle whom the counsel of statesmen has not been able to save from the terrible sacrifice; and

Whereas, in this, as in all things, it is our privilege and duty to seek counsel and succor of Almighty God, humbling ourselves before Him, confessing our weakness and our lack of any wisdom equal to these things; and

Whereas, it is the especial wish and longing of the people of the United States, in prayer and counsel and all friendliness, to serve the cause of peace;

Therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do designate Sunday, the fourth day of October next a day of prayer and supplication, and do request all God-fearing persons to repair on that day to their places of worship, there to unite their petitions to Almighty God, that, overruling the counsel of men, setting straight the things they cannot govern or alter, taking pity on the nations now in the throes of conflict, in his mercy and goodness showing a way where men can see none. He vouchsafe His children healing peace again and restore once more that concord among men and nations without which there can be neither happiness nor true friendship nor any wholesome fruit of toil and thought in the world; praying also to this end that He forgive us our sins, our ignorance of His holy will, our wilfulness and many errors, and read us in the paths of obedience to places of vision and to thoughts and counsels that purge and make wise.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.







its enslavement. "On entering the Austro-Hungarian territory, I declare in the name of the emancipation of nations from the foreign yoke, only seeks the rehabili-

tation of rights and justice.

Also Brings Liberty. "Russia also brings liberty and the realization of your national vows. For many centuries the Austro-Hungarian Government planted emong you discord and enmity; for it knew that as a result of this strife its dominion over you would continue. "On the contrary, my sole aim i that each and every one of you may grow and prosper, and keep at the same time the previous inheritance of language and faith of your fathers. "Let every one of you, united to

his brothers, live in peace and harmony with your neighbors, respecting their national rights. Being convinced that you will co-operate with all your strength to realize this end, I call upon you to welcome the Russian troops as faithful friends who are fighting for the realization of your greatest ambitions.


