Turks, Angry at Inhumanity of Kurds, Have Lynched Some.

[Canadian Press.] Tabriz, Persia, Friday, April 16, via Petrograd, April 17, and London, 1:20 p.m.-Engagements between Armenians and Kurds are frequent in the vicinity of Van, in Turkish Armenia, according to reliable information reaching Tabriz, and a general massacre of Christians is expected in the province of Bashata. The Armenians of Van are hurriedly trying to raise unteers in Azerbaijan province, Persia, to help them against the Turks and Kurds.

After several stubborn engagements between Russians and Turks to the north of Dilman, in Persia, the Turks retreated to the south of Dilman. From the district of the Choruk

River it is reported that after an unsuccessful defence of Khopa the Turks retreated beyond Archava, vhere they have occupied fortified heights from which they are making

There is said to be growing hos tility between the Turks and the Kurds, the former deprecating the inhumanity of the latter. In cases where Turks and Kurds are serving together, this disaffection has at times approached the mutinous Turkish soldiers and even stage. the younger of the Turkish officers are protesting against the countenancing by higher Turkish officers of the outrages committed by the Kurds. There are several instances of Turkish soldiers having lynched Kurds guilty of ususual atrocities.

FARMERS ARE HOLDING LESS WHEAT THAN USUAL

OTTAWA, April 16 .- A press bulletin ssued today by the census and statistics office gives the results of the usual inquiry as to the stocks of grain and other crops remaining in the hands of farmers on March 31, and the proportion of the crops harvested in the pre-vious year, which turned out to be of merchantable quality.

The returns received from crop-reporting correspondents show that of the total estimated yield of wheat in 1914. twelve and one-half per cent, or 20.247,000 bushels, remained in farmers' hands at the end of March. At the rate of 1% bushels per acre this quantity should allow of the sowing this spring of about 11,570,000 acres, or 1,-522,000 acres more than were sown in the spring of 1914, independently of quantities of wheat stored in elevators which may be returned to farmers for seeding purposes. The quantity of wheat remaining this year in the hands wheat remaining this year in the hands wheat remaining this year in the hands of farmers is, however, smaller than in any previous year on record, the light crop and the high price being together responsible for the result. In gether responsible for the result. In 1914 the quantity of wheat estimated to be in farmers' hands at March 31 was 38,353,000 bushels, or sixteen and one-half per cent of the large harvest of 1913; in 1913 at March 31 the proportion was twenty-two per cent, or 50,tion was twenty-two per cent, or 50,-234,000 bushels, and at March 31, 1912, it was 27 per cent, or 62,188,000 bushels.



Butcher Trade Is Disappointing for Holders of Supplies.

Toronto, April 16.—Receipts at the Union Stockyards for this week, as compared with those of last week, are as follows: Cars, this week 391, last week 321; cattle, this week 3,935, last week 3,915; calves, this week 1,180, last week 1,343; hogs, this week 10,416, last week 8,715; sheep, this week 391, last week 350; horses, this week 1,211, last week 332.

As is shown by the above figures, the receipts of cattle for the two weeks are practically the same. Calves did not come on the market quite so liberally this week as last, while hogs show an increase of almost 200 head this week. Horses, too, were more plentiful, whereas receipts of sheep and lambs show little difference, the balance being in favor of this week.

As compared to some weeks earlier in the year, the receipts of this week and a few weeks back are extremely light. Not so very long ago the run on a Monday alone would equal the total receipts for a week like this last one. Despite this smallness of supplies there are pienty to satisfy the wants of the beef packers who buy at the local market, and as has been amply proven on several occasions, a at the local market, and as has been amply proven on several occasions, a real heavy run would cause prices to slump badly. It is well known that the retail butcher trade is not nearly so good as formerly, on account of war times, and the demands of local beef firms are necessarily limited.

Trade at the market this week has been very disappointing for holders of cattle. On Monday the market opened with trade dull, and prices for classes of cattle from ten to fifteen cents lower. Deals dragged, and there did not seem to be any life in the trade. At the end of the day quite a few of the day's offerings were left over. There was little or no improvement the next day. Wednesday a little firmer tone was felt, although prices were not affected to any appreciable extent. The discouraging reports of the market probably convinced the shippers that there was nothing to be gained by sending further supplies to the yards this ing further supplies to the yards this week, and on Thursday there was only a handful of offerings. These were all cleaned up quickly, but at no advance The run of calves has been heavy and of uniformly poor quality. There have been very few choice calves offered at all. Trade has been barely

ZEPP RAIDS MAY BE THE BEGINNING OF GREAT ATTACK

London Inclined To Think Kaiser's Aerial Fleet Are Merely Looking Over the Ground-Suffolk and Essex Scene of Third Visit.

LONDON, April 16 .- 10:30 p.m .- England this afternoon experienced its third hostile air raid within 48 hours, but the last, like those immediately preceding it, resulted in no loss of life and no serious damage to property.

Taking advantage of fine flying weather, which enabled a Zeppelin airship to visit the vicinity of the Tyne Wednesday night and the coasts of Suffolk and Essex early this morning, a German aeroplane having crossed the North Sea this afternoon flew over the county of Kent dropping bombs. In all, four Only One Slight Success For missiles were dropped—in the vicinity of the towns of Faversham and Sitting-bourne, the latter just across the bugle from the Isle of Sheppey, which is the birthplace of the British Royal Naval Flying Corps. 
