



BIRDS ARE A POOR CROP Turkeys This Year Are Not Up the Standard—Are Very Hard to Raise.

The Thanksgiving turkey is soaring high. Twenty cents per pound will buy birds that are none too plump

ling high. Twenty cents per pound will buy birds that are none too plump today, but poultry dealers say that the price is likely to be several cents higher per pound on Saturday. This year's turkey crop, according to the farmers, is much smaller than last year. They will tell you that there are very few turkeys in the country. The past season was unfavorable; the little turks died young in the spring, and there are very few birds to be offered up at the festive shrine of this Thanksgiving. The commission men and poultry dealers will tell you that there are thousands upon thousands of luxty young birds will tell you that there are thousands upon thousands of luxty young birds grazing on the meadows and corn fields of Western Ontario, but they are not quite ready for market; hence the prevalence of high prices.

In other words the poultry cheaps turkeys for Christmas, but you have to come around with the price for Thanksgiving. The farmer does not try to salve your feelings. He tells you that you will have to puy both for your Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners.

However, prices are not much high-

However, prices are not much higher than last Thanksgiving. Twenty cents in London, and from 22 to 25 cents per pound in Toronto, are not unusually exorbitant prices for holiday birds. The difference between the prices on the local market and in Toronto, where the supply is even more doubtful than here, is likely to advance the local price to 22 or 23 cents per pound on Saturday.
