Although the company officials have so far shown no inclination to compromise, local union officials at Allentown expressed optimism over the prospect of a strike being averted.

Officials Declare Prison Is No Fit Place For Him.

BURWASH REFUSES HIM

So Does Ontario Hospital, But Parents Would Undertake His Care.

poor health and weak-minded, is incar- at midnight. cerated in a cell at the local jail, with his condition gradually becoming worse each day. Medland was sentenced by Police Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon in police court recently to serve not less than three months, and not more than two years in the Ontario Reformatory, than three months, and not more than two years in the Ontario Reformatory, after he was convicted on a charge of forging the name of W. S. Walker, a local merchant, to a check for \$10.

Upon an examination by local physicians prior, to sentence being pronounced, Medland was recommended for the Ontario Hospital here, and strong efforts were made to achieve this end, but in vain, Dr. Robinson, in charge of this institution, declining to accept the prisoner for treatment, although he admitted that "Medland" was simple. The parents of this unfortunate youth, informing the magistrate that their son was getting beyond their control, the court had no alternative but to send him to prison, as he was refused admittance to the Ontario Hospital.

Refused at Burwash.

After sentence was pronounced Medland was taken to the county jail here and held pending transportation to the reformatory at Burwash. However, when Provincial Bailiff Ryan arrived here one week ago to take local offenders to Burwash to finish their sentences, he declined to take Medland, stating that only prisoners fit to undergo punishment at the reformatory were taken by film. He took nine prisoners and left Medland, who at that time was in a slightly better condition than at the present time.

"A few days later," he continued, "Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain asked me what I had decided. I replied: 'France made Paris; Paris made France. I would burn Paris to save France.'"

BALTIC EXPECTED

TO DOCK TODAY

Royal George and Carmania

Will Arrive On Monday.

Halifax, N. S., Sept. 26.—The White Star liner Baltic is expected to arrive at Halifax late this afternoon with returning soldiers and dependents. She has about 900 soldiers and families.

The Royal George is due on Sunday with a large number, and on Monday the line of his address in the assembly recently, when he exhorted South Africa to come together, and the white races to more closely unite. "Our white population in South Africa," he stated, "is too small to be divided."

He also urged more toleration, more conciliation and more brotherly love.

The premier laid emphasis on South Africa's immense potentialities, which he claimed made it the richest mining country in the world. He said: "There is one continuous coal field here and in Rhodesia, which will not be exhausted in a thousand years, and in the long run will prove more valuable than gold or diamonds."

Premier Smuts uttered a warning against too much politics, and appealed for a new spirit in the development of a greater united South Africa. The meeting terminated with the singing of the National Anthem amidst scenes of enthusiasm and an ovation for the premier.

A distinct ennovation at Western University Medical School will have been instituted on Tuesday next, when the doors of that institution are thrown wide open, and lectures commence for all students, including two freshmen classes. Registration will take place on Monday, and for the first time in the history of the school two first year classes will be in attendance, with one of these classes in reality a second-year class. The medical course has been drawn out one year by those in authority, and several extra subjects are now included in the curriculum. There is the regular first year class this fall, successful members of which will graduate in 1925, while there is a special class inaugurated for all men who can prove that enlistment during the war prevented them from studying medicine previously, and this class will finish the course in five years, being the last class in the medical school to enjoy this privilege.

Enrollment for this latter class is unusually heavy, according to the number of applications received from prospective students. In all about 50 veterans including several who served in the trenches have applied for admittance to this class, making the largest ever started at the medical school, and beating the unusual soldier-civilian freshman body of last year. Applications for admittance to the six-year course number about fifteen, according

year, it is hoped by the faculty that when another year rolls around the new school to be erected at Waterloo street and Ottaway avenue, will be available, or failing this that construction will be well under way. OTTAWA, Sept. 25.—When the House assembled this afternoon Mr. Pedlow's bill regarding Thanksgiving Day came up for third reading and an amendment by Mr. McMaster and Mr. McKay to restore the original intention of the bill and make Thanksgiving Day the second Monday in November instead of November 11 was carried by 76 to 64 on a nonparty vote. Then Dr. Michael Steele moved a six months' hoist for the bill as amended and that carried by 78 to 73.

Mr. McMaster then resumed the debate on Mr. McKenzie's motion for investigation by a parliamentary committee into the alleged manipulation of soldier votes in the last election. Mr. McMaster said that Mr. Meighen had not only denied paternity of the telegram to Sir Robert Borden, but had said that it was a perfectly proper and honorable telegram.

The telegram and the admissions made by Mr. McMaster, showed very plainly that there was a widespread system of manipulation of votes for the purpose of defeating the will of the Canadian people. He thought the telegram was illegal, improper and touched the honor of public men in the country.

How Was it Done?

Mr. McMaster asked how the Government had decided what to do with these "votes at large" to which reference had been made. Did they sit around the council table and apportion them out, or was a special committee of the cabinet formed to deal with them, and was Hon. Arthur Meighen chairman of that committee? Properly worked out, declared Mr. McMaster, this scheme of placing soldiers' votes where they were needed would have made the election absolutely sure for the Government. If there were one hundred doubtful constituencies the Government had simply to allot one hundred and twenty votes to each one. Such a suggestion turned the whole election into a veritable farce.

AGAINST DIRECT ACTION. It is reassuring to find that many of the reatest labor leaders are openly and actively opposed to extremism as a means of advancing the interests of labor. The fear that constitutional methods would be swept aside, that a minority would be enabled to ride roughshod over the rights of all others, is lessened when we know that big leaders of British and American trades unionists refuse to sanction anything that approaches the revolutionary, and in fact, in many cases are strongly conservative. Mr. Arthur Henderson, recently re-elected to the British Commons by a large majority and who during the first years of the war was labor's representative in the cabinet, is uncompromisingly hostile to the use of any but legal weapons in industrial warfare. The use of direct action, for instance, he considers foolish, and dangerous. In a recent issue of an English labor organ, he says:

When the policy of direct action is examined from the Parliamentary Labor viewpoint there do not appear to me any arguments to be advanced in its favor. country such as ours, with its broadened franchise and where representative institutions count for so much, it appears to me that such a policy is both unnecessary and dangerous. . . 





Mr. Rose's candidature was most heartly indorsed and utmost confidence is expressed in his ability to redeem the riding.

DELEGATES DECLINE TO HEAR WATTERS ON CLOSED QUESTION

Ex-President Not Given a Chance To Explain His Side of Controversy.

STORMY SCENE FOLLOWS

Chairman of Committee Declares Peace Conference Report Carried.

Hamilton, Sept. 26.—A storm of brief duration broke almost immediately upon the resumption of business by the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress this morning. Ex-President J C. Watters attempted to explain his side of the controversy regarding representation on the international peace conference.

J. W. Wilkinson, chairman of the committee on officers' reports, took exception, declaring that the report embodying the statement concerning the conference had been carried.

Mr. Watters urged that he be allowed to explain his position, but no motion requesting re-consideration was forth-coming.

"It's an absolute crime that Mr. Watters is not heard," cried on delegate.

A pandemonium followed, and it was some time before President Moore could obtain order.

Owing to the inclusion in the report of the British Columbia Federation of Labor to the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress of resolutions recommending industrial organization of the workers and principles of the one big union movement, the committee recommended reference to the committee on constitution and law. 

Delegate Brody, Vancouver, disagreed with the report. The mind of labor today, he said, was not set on the present form of organization. He declared that the worker could not afford to use the old kid gloves with the employers that were used in the past. The workers were fighting for the principle of collective bargaining, not for the overthrow of constitutional government. "And that might be a good thing, too," he added.

HAMILTON, Sept. 25.—Declaring that a new era had dawned for the laboring classes all over the world, that workers would no longer be conthat workers would no longer be content to exist under conditions that prevailed before the war, and asserting that there was no limits to the possibilities of the labor movement, Ben Tillett, Labor M.P. for North Salford and fraternal delegate from the British Trades Union Congress, aroused the delegates to the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress to a high pitch of enthusiasm in an address at this morning's session. pitch of enthusiasm in an address at this morning's session.

Mr. Tillett reviewed the progress of the trades union movement in Great Britain, declaring that organized effort had done more to secure better working conditions than all the talk of revolution prevalent during the last 30 years. The speaker embodied in his address
