

And if we could do anything which would induce more people, not only to spend money in London, but to advertise London wherever they go, it would be a big thing for the city." 



Inspector V. K. Greer Calls Them "One and Strongest Canadianizing Factor."

Inspector V. K. Greer has sent out circular to the principals and teachers of the public schools suggesting to them that occasion be taken during Canadian Authors' Week, Nov. 20-26 to direct the attention of pupils, and parents, if possible, to Canadian writers and their books. Pupils might be encouraged, he states, to find out all they can about Canadian books and writers, and to bring their respective contributions of information to the class room for the benefit of all. "As Canadians," says Mr. Greer in his circular, 'We have been modest in our ap-

preciation of our own literature. In fact we have cultivated the habit of looking outside of our own boundaries for our reading. It is not sufficiently well known that we have a Canadian School of Literature and Art of high merit; and through lack of interest and patriotism we have been ignoring a very considerable and noteworthy company of literary men and women in our own land. These writers have been seeking recognition, but have not yet obtained it fully from their own fel-Canadians. They may become lost to us through being forced to seek recognition outside Canada.





TORONTO, Nov. 16 .- According Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, in a statement during his visit here to-
