Plan of Japs Is Too Encompass Kuropatkin's Position. St. Petersburg, May 17. - No official dispatches were given out this morning on account of the delay occasioned by the Emperor's journey. His majesty arrived at Kharkoff this morning, whither all dispatches have been transmitted. A special force of operators has been detailed for this purpose, in the absence of advices the general staff is continuing its special action based on the latest reports of the appearance of considerable bodies of the enemy in the northwest section of Manchuria. The opinion prevails that this is an indication of the intention of the Japanese to make an attempt to stop Gen. 

LEGISLATIVE NOTES.

Makes Remarkable Ship-to- But Third Reading of Measure Shore Experiments On the Atlantic.

New York, May 17. - The arrival of Signor Marconi, the wireless wizard, on the Campania, marked another epoch in atmospheric telegraphy. Signor Marconi, with his assistants, engaged special facilities on the Campania for the voyage with the intention of maintaining a "ship to shore" com-munication throughout the entire jour-

Apparatus at present on board the thirty ships equipped with the Marconi wireles system, has an efficient range of only 100 miles. Under favorable conditions, communication has been maintained at sea for 150 miles, while 212 miles is the record.

The mechanism for sending messages long distances from ships does not require more space, but more power, the the limit for the construction of the Marconi people say. The inventor had to install on the Campania mechanism the most important. powerful enough to transmit and receive to and from Poldhu and Cape

To increase this sending power, Mr. Marconi installed the "alternating current generator." The current of the "alternator," by means of a "step-up transformer," is raised to the required voltage. The longer the "spark" or discharge across the break in the secondary circuit, the higher the voltage. In Marconi's long-distance work, which he used the "alternating current generator," the secondary current was raised to about 100,000 volts. On Mr. Marconi's trip from England to America on the Philadelphia in February of 1902, he received messages from Poldhu for 1,151 miles.

Aboard the Lucania in October, 1903 he received daily messages from Cape Breton from the Associated Press for 1,700 miles. Messages from the Poldhu station were also received for the same distance, but he could not reply to

CZAR'S OLDEST SOLDIER

Is 122 Years Old and Fought Against Napoleon.

St. Petersburg, May 17.-The Czar has granted an increased pension to Russia's oldest soldier, retired Major-Sergt. Andreas Nicolaievitch Schmidt, has recently celebrated his 122nd

The old soldier was born at Kawno in 1782. At the age of 14 he enlisted in the army and took part in Russia's wars against Napoleon the Great. As sergeant he was present at the battle of Borodino, and was a witness greater in proportion to the number of projectiles fired than from shrapnel, of the conflagration in Moscow. Later he participated in the campaign against Persia in 1827, took part in the capture of Warsaw in 1832 and fought during the defense of Sebastopol in

His military papers show accounts of many feats of personal bravery, one of these being the act by which he saved the life of Vice-Admiral Makhimoff, when the Malakoff fort was taken by the allied forces. In 1858 he was presented to Alexander II., who decorated him with the great

Russion gold medal. His military career was cut short by an unfortunate incident. In 1867 the striking power of the Japanese forces, old sergeant-major was in charge of a body of soldiers escorting to Siberia their points of vantage. London Times Man Tells of Splendid A Russian Force Attacks the British Strategy and Courage of Japs.

London, May 17.—The Times today has the followisg: On the Yalu, May 8.-Today I examined the trophies captured from the Russians. The field guns number 21, all of the latest pattern and dated 1901 and 1902. The total of 29, originally telegraphed, is made up by the addition of eight Maxims. There was also a. great quantity of gun and rifle ammunition, a number of ammunition wagons, 2,600 rifles, saddlery, entrenchment tools, clothing and brass band instruments riddled by bullets.
