

## MANCHURIA GOES BACK TO SAVAGERY

Says Russ Correspondent, if China Once More Rules the Province.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 16. - Mr. Alexander Briantchaninoff, correspondent of the St. Petersburg Slovo, writing render of the Eastern Chinese Railway which is being considered by the peace conference today, and also regarding the general question of the restoration of Chinese sovereignty in the province.

strictly observed regarding the sion of the peace conference, it is now known that the second article discussed concerned the question of returning Manchuria to China and that the article has been agreed upon. it is understood that Manchuria is going to be restored under the charming administration of China. For fear of Russia's enlargement she has been prevented from completing her work of civilization in that province, where she spent millions of Russian roubles retaining in return only unpleasant memories, and now they say that it is better to give Manchuria than to Russia, for to return Manchuria to China means to return that province to the state of barbarism. It is, however, asked if even the railroad which cuts this province in three portions, and which should be an instrument of civilization and of development of her riches, will be abandoned to With regard to the Chinese neglect. Harbin-Liao Tung Railway line the institution of a Chinese administration can be understood, as this line has no strategic legitimate value except for China. But it is quite different with the line uniting Vladivostok to which it is impossible for the Muscovite empire, because of its strategic value, to make dependent upon a Chinese administration. Technical re searches have shown the enormous difficulty of uniting Vladivostok and Port Arthur with Europe around the Amur. So the civilized world welcomed the decision of Russia to build a railway through Manchuria. immense effort which, considering the policy of the open door, will be of great and equal advantage to the commerce of the whole world. It is therefore just that Russia should have the material guaranty that that railway line should not run the least risk of being destroyed or cut by the brigands, or that it should suffer in case of a misunderstanding with China. #### Typhoid Fever.

The health of the city is always an important subject. An epidemic of typhoid fever in South Brooklyn and had occasion to discuss this and kindred subjects. There appears to be no doubt that typhoid fever is traceable largely to the water supply. Is the water supply of London adequate? What we have of it is good, and unquestionably many cases of typhoid fever in the past were clearly traced to the water of other places. It is advised in Brooklyn, while the epidemic lasts, that all water except distilled or bottled spring water, should be boiled; that milk should be either boiled or pasteurized. No one should bathe in waters near sewer outlets. Flies should be kept out of dining-rooms. Contaminated wells are given as the cause of Tipping-Its Victims and Its the epidemic in the places above men-

Is the water supply of London adecontaminate the springs. It is the duty the Washington Post says: of the water commissioners to investigate and ascertain if the supply is equal to the demand, and if not what can be done to increase it. Whether water has been pumped directly from the river into the reservoir or not, or whether the park injuriously affects the water, are additional questions which do not affect the first. The question to be determined is, is the supply adequate?

With the steady growth of London we believe, this to be a live question. We should prepare for the future and secure additional water. There are springs on the north branch of the river. There can be obtained by boring large quantities of water, and doubtless by a competent engineer other means will be suggested. Whatever is necessary to be done to preserve the health of the city should be done. It is poor economy that puts up with anything unfit for its purpose, and it is criminal economy that would, to save a few dollars, jeopardize the

health and lives of our citizens. We have no desire to throw a stone at the present Springbank water. It is relished by everyone, especially by strangers when they come to the city; but we want enough of it for all purposes. It is a most important factor in maintaining good health.

Wherever these difficulties occur it would be well to give the registrar power to have a plan made and the different pieces numbered as separate lots. This would avoid confusion.
