"I, Wiliam Johnson, a natural born ci-tizen of Upper Canada as commander in chief of the navai forces and flotilla. I commanded of the navar forces and flottifa. I commanded the expeniition that captured and destroyed the Sir Bobert. Peel. The men under my com-mand in that expedition were tearly all na-turel born English subjects—the exceptions were volunteers for the expedition.—My were volunters for the expedition.—My Head Quarters was on an Island in the St. Lawrence, without the jurisdiction of the Latter States, at a place named by me Fort Wallace. I am well acquainted with the boundary line, and know which of the Islands do, and which do not, belong to the United States; and in the selection of the Island I wished to be positive and not locate within the jurisdiction of the United States, and had repursidetion of the United States, and had re-cremee to the decision of the Commissioners under the 6th article of the treaty of Ghent, done at Utica, in the state of New York, 13th June, 1822. I know the number of the Island, and by that decision it was British territory. I yet held possession of that station, and we also occupy a station some twenty or more miles from the boundary line of the United States, in what was Her Majesty's dominions was occupied by us. I act under orders. The object of my movements is the independance of the Canadas. I am not at war with the commerce or property of the ci-

tizens of the United States. " Signed this tenth day of June, in the ear of our Lord one thousand eight hundred

and thirty-eight. WILLIAM JOHNSON."
