GREAT KRUPP PLANT AT ESSEN BOMBARDED FROM THE SKY BY AN ALLIES' AVIATOR.



An aeronaut of the Allies dropped the Krupp factory at Essen, tured the famous German slege guns, as well as smaller arms and ammunition according to a despatch from The Hague. This message quotes a despatch from Berlin to the effect that the bombs were dropped on the buildings devoted to the manufacture of cannon.

It is said that the airman escaped uninjured, and that the extent of the damage has not been ascertained.

The world famous works of the Krupp firm, at Essen on the Ruhr, were founded in 1811-1812 by Frederick Krupp, who started them "for the production of English cast steel and all other products resulting therefrom." A few months later-on April 26, 1812the merchant's son, Alfred, was born and he it was who was destined to "make" the firm, to raise it, after his father's early death, from difficulties and almost from failure to the great position it holds.

LAND REGULATIONS.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency ; but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and eultivation of the land in each of three rears. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.







Kaiser's Soldiers in Flanders Reduced to Eating Grass


