If You Live in Waterdown Why Shop in New York?

That question is not so absurd as it may seem, for many people right here in this community and who earn their money here, actually spend a part of it in New York.

"But," you say, 'I have never been in New York." You don't need to go there in person to spend your money there. Whenever you buy goods made in the United States it is just the same as shopping in New York, for those goods have to be paid for in "New York funds," as the bankers call it.

What does it mean? It means that while the Canadian dollar is worth 100 cents in Canada it shrinks to around 85 cents if spent for U. S. goods, and the more you spend on U. S. goods the less value your dollar will possess. There is no mysterious reason for this. It is simply because we Canadians, as a people have been importing from the United States far more than we have been exporting to that country. For the year ending November 1920. ported goods valued at \$927,564,711 while the United States bought from us goods valued at \$545,283,365. that is, we bought from them almost twice as much as we sold them. Therefore our Canadian money is at a discount over there

The safe and sane thing for all of us is to spend every cent we can for Canadian made goods, and spend it with our local merchants. Thus our trade will not only help to build up Canada by providing employment for Canadian workman, but it will help to build up our own community, the community in which we live and 75% on subjects written. have something at stake. And in the long run we will all be money in pocket by following this policy.







A Painter of History.

Mr. Robert Harris, C.M.G., who died in Montreal recently, had a long and distinguished career, chiefy as a figure and portrait painter. One of his best known works was "The Fathers of Confederation," executed under a commission from the Dominion Government. It contained the figures of thirty-three Canadian statesmen, and was regarded as an accurate representation of them and of great historical value. Unfortunately this painting, which hung for many years in the lobby at the main entrance to the House of Parliament, Ottawa, was destroyed in the fire. Among the offices which he held were President of the Royal Canadian Academy, 1893-1906; president of the Ontario Society of Artists and Director of the Art School, Montreal Art Association, 1883-87. He was created a C.M.G. in 1902.

LIVE STOCK REPORTS

Sales during the week consisted of 6,162 cattle, 538 calves, 3,229 sheep and 4,807 hogs, whilst 409 hogs were received on through billing. With approximately 3,700 cattle on sale on Monday, trading opening very draggy and before much of the cattle had and before much of the cattle had passed over the scales, prices had dropped a good 50 cents per hundred, A few choice heavy steers sold from \$10 to \$10.50, choice butchers from \$9 to \$10, good from \$8 to \$8.50, and \$8 to \$9. good cows from \$7 to \$8 and fair from \$5 to \$6.50. About Canada.

Germany has captured all the United States and a part of Canada, startlingly announces the Rocky Mountain News. The conquest took place ten years ago, all on the quiet and unknown to the inhabitants. The Kaiser at the time admitted the occupation and subjection of this territory and insued maps for the edification of the little Huns in the public schools of the fatherland, whose guilibility left them believing that the select and rich parts of the world belonged "by divine right" to the German people, and all the rest was inhabited by swine and heathen.

He knew Germany, for he had seen the great pompous dignity of its emperor reviewing the imperial troops, Germany was a reality to the child. But about the rest of the world, Bah! They were heathen and "low brows." And then the teacher came to page 5 of the lesson and then to map No. 1. It is titled "Verteilung der Menschenrassen," or the division of the human race. In great, stirring red ink the pupil was at once attracted to a vast area covering the whole of the United States and almost half of Canada.

And across the whole was written "Germanen." meaning Germans. To the north was a strip of green designating that there was the home of the "Noramericanische Indianer," meaning the North American Indians. But the skillful art of lying, even in the face of an untruth, because they thought they could get away with it, led the authorities of Germany to step farther, and, behold, the race that gave to Germany the first knowledge of telephones and telegraphs, the submarine and airplane, through American inventions, was transformed into "heathen."

Map No. 2 on page 5 shows the western hemisphere in another light—that of the division of religions. ESTIMATES OF YIELD.

Detail of Figures on Canadian Field Crops Show Decline.

Crops Show Decline.

Following is the detailed statement of Canadian crop yields, as issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, from reports of correspondents at the end of September: The total yield of wheat in Canada is acw pieced at 193,688,800 bushels, including 174,687,000 bushels of spring wheat and 19,001,800 bushels of fall wheat. Upon the acreage sown the average yield per acre is 10½ bushels for spring wheat, 23½ bushels for fall wheat and 11½ bushels for all wheat and 11½ bushels for all wheat in 1918 the total yield of wheat was 189,075,250 bushels, or 11 bushels per acre. For cata the average yield per acre for Canada is 27 bushels, representing a total of 399,368,000 bushels as compared with last year's average of 28½ bushels and a total of 426,312,500 bushels, as against last year's average of 24½ bushels and a total of 426,312,500 bushels, as against last year's average of 24½ bushels and total of 77,287,240 bushels. Rye with an average yield per acre of 14½ bushels signed of 284,400 bushels in 1918 The yields the total of 8,234,100 bushels as against 15½ bushels and 8,504,400 bushels in 1918 The yields in 1919 for the three pratrie provinces are estimated at 161,419,900 bushels of oats, 46,412,000 bushels of barley, and 5,954,000 bushels of the clinicial area for the contents of the con

The quality at harvest time of the principal grain crops for Canada expressed in percentages of the previous ten years was as follows: Fall wheat, 96 (89); spring wheat, 91 (98); fall wheat, 92 (98); oats, 90 (94); barley, 89 (97); rye, 92 (92); peas, 91 (95); beans, 95 (82); buckwheat, 96 (86); mixed grains, 94 (98); flax, 93 (92), and corn for husking, 94 (89). The figures within parenthesis represent the quality of the crops in 1918.

The average condition of root and fodder crops in Canada at the end of September, expressed in percentages of the decennial average was as followed.

September, expressed in percentages of the decennial average, was as follows, with last year's figures for comparison placed within parenthesis: Potatoes, 95 (93); turnips, mangolds, etc., 91 (96); sugar beets, 85 (97); fodder corn, 95 (92); alfalfa, 91 (89). By provinces potatoes appear to be best in Quebec, 103, the other provinces ranging as follows: Saskatchewan, 97; New Brunswick and Alberta, 96; Nova Scotia, 94; Prince Edward Island, 93; British Columbia, 90; Manitoba, 89, and Ontario 81.
