The first annual meeting of the shareholders of the Acadia Dairy Co. was held in Witter's Hall, this town, on Tuesday afterneon. There was a good attendance, representing every section covered by the operations of the company. C. R. H. Starr presided and Oscar Chase acted in the capacity of secretary. The report of the directors for the past year and the financial statement of the sec. treas. were read and adopted. Both gave a most treditable showing. The factory began work on June 25th, and up to the end of the year had handled 525,876 lbs of milk, and manufactured 26,314 lbs of cheese and 9457½ lbs of butter. The total value of the product up to the end of the year was \$4866.99. The factory has turned out a superfor article, which commanded a better price than that made by many of the other factories. The operations so far have been very successful, considering the season addificulties that always present themselves at the inception of an undertaking of this kind. All that is now needed is for the farmers to take hold in earnest to that the damages be haved at \$10,000 fibs kind. The enterprise has passed the experimental stage and has proved its right to exist. 
