(L. S.) In amendment of a (COPY,) Law relating to Public JEO. F. GREGORY Wharves, Landings, Mayor. and Anchorages. Be it enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen are commonalty of the City of Fredericton

The owner or person having charge of any raft of logs, deals, or other lumber, or raft londed with any articles or any raft of any description shall, when the same shall arrive at any public wharf or landing witnin the City, pay the sum of seventy cents to the Wharfinger and Harbour Master; and if any such raft shall remain at any such public wharpes or landings for a longer period than twenty four hours at anyone time, the owner or person having charge thereof, shall pay to the said Wharfinger or Harbor Master, the sum of forty cents for every day (sundays excepted), such raft shall remain over the said twenty-four forty cents for every day for or person having charge shall neglect of where or person having charge shall neglect to pay any such sum on demand by the Warfinger and Harbor Master, he shall for every such refusal, or for every day he shall so neglect to pay, be liable to a penalty of one dollar.




