MAKING THE CURD.

The rennet and coloring being added to the milk, it must be well stirred or mixed, and the stirring process kept up until the milk commences to thicken.

The cream must, on no account be allowed to rise to the surface as Atlant and th lowed to rise to the surface, as the greater part of it would be lost in the whey. If the proper quantity of rennet has been added to the milk, and the milk at the proper temperature, namely, 80 degrees to 84 degrees Fahrenheit, it will commence to thicken in twenty minutes, and be stiff enough to cut in fifty minutes. The proper time to cut the curd may be ascertained by inserting the finger in it. If it breaks freely and with a smooth edge, it is ready to cut. CUTTING THE CURD.

The cutting is done with a knife made for the purpose consisting of a gang of blades from eleven to fourteen in numblades from eleven to fourteen in number. The curd is cut into blocks, care being taken not to bruise it. 'It is then left for a few minutes until the whey commences to show on the surface when it is carefully moved by the agitator. In using the agitator in some factories the handa are used in stirring the curd at this or a later period of the process. The greatest care must be taken, as the alightest bruise separates the butter from the casine, consequently the richest part of the cheese is lost. If cheese could be manufactured without any bruising the whey would be as clear as water, and fully one-fifth more cheese would be made from the milk. After being stirred the whey is again allowed to rise to the surface, and again stirred, when the 'heat is turned on, and the temperature is gradually raised to about 80°, care being taken not to allow the



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
