## THE HUDSON BAY RAILWAY IS THE PARAMOUNT ISSUE

Hon. Frank Oliver Speaks to Largest Assembly in the History of this City.

FOUR THOUSAND, PEOPLE CHEER HIS ENTRY TO RINK

He Vigorously Repells Opponents Attack on Land and Timber

He Makes the Definite Statement That The Hudson Bay Railway Will Be Built if the Liberal Government is Returned - He Effectively Contrasts the Palicy of Developmen Carried Out By the Liberal Government With the Policy of Stagnation of the Conservative Party-A Policy of Expansion As Opposed to a Policy of Slander Calumny and Obstruction.

(From Saturday's Daily.) Overwheining proof of the com-manding position Hon. Frank Oliver occupies in the eyes of the people of Edinonton and of the confidence with which the policy of the Dominion Government is regarded, was furnished by the immense audience which greeted him in the Thistle Rink last evening. The vast audience which thronged this great building made up the largest assembly of people in the history of the city. The crowd was estimated at between 4,000 and 4,500. It was composed of hundreds of people who for the first time were affordd the opportunity of hearing the Minister of the Interior speak. These people knew him only by reputation; they knew of him as the man to whom the progress of this city is in a whom the progress of this city is in a large measure due, and they knew of him as a member of the government whose policy of settling the West, and opening the Last Great West, is being successfully earried out. 




