



What Alcohol Does to the System.

Alcohol has a profound effect, upon the central nervous system. There are two theories with regard to its action. By some it is considered a stimulant, by others it is thought always to cause depression. Small amounts of alcohol may bring about an increased sense of liveliness and general feeling of well-being which is most pronounced when the lights are bright, and the company congenial. Larger quantities induce incoordination of speech and movement, whereas still larger quantities result in complete anesthesia which may be fatal to the individual. For the first few minutes after taking alcohol, it has been found that a largquantity of physical work may be erformed. This is followed, howver by a period of depression during which the quantity of mechanical en ergy which may be expended by the ndividual is greatly reduced. sum total of the effect is very decided ly to reduce the amount of mechanical work which can be accomplished during the day. 





The Parliament Bill.

For some few days the House of Commons has had under consideration is around this clause that the main political battle is being waged. On clause one the fight was but perfunctory, as the protagonists of the House of Lords do not seriously contest the principle embodied in this section which renders rejections and amendments of Money Bills passed by the House of Commons and sent up to the House of Lords, at least a month before the close of the session

Under such circumstances, after the lapse of a month from the sending up to the House of Lords, the bill is to be presented to His Majesty and become an Act of Parliament, on the Royal Assent being signified, although the House of Lords has not consented

Clause II. deals with any bill not included in Clause I. This second clause purposes to place a limit of time and other circumstances on the power of the House of Lords to prevent a bill becoming a statute.

The clause does not apply to any within one month of the close of the P. G. Butler. season. In regard to these, it is not proposed to curtail the power of the Retiring Warden, Finance Committee, Lords. To take advantage of the Sidesmen, Choir and others clause when it becomes law, the Government must send bills up to the Lords at least one month before the session closes. In regard to these, if the Lords reject them for two successive sessions, a rejection will prevent the bill becoming law; but if the Lords reject a bill in a third successive session and the bill is presented to the King, it becomes law, although the Lords have not consented to it, but to give it the force of law, two years must have gone by since its first introduction into the House of Commons. It is on this clause that the main battle is being fought, but the issue of the battle is a foregone conclusion. Last fall the Bill passed the House of Commons, and on the House of Lords playing for delay in considering it, the Government dissolved and went to the country on it and came back with a big majority pledged to put it through.

This glorious and memorable achievement, coming like a broad light in the darkness, gave freely to the whole English-speaking people the right and the power to search for themselves for the truths and consolations of our Faith, and during 300 years the multiplying millions of the English-speaking races, spreading ever more widely over the surface of the globe, have turned in their need o the grand simplicity of the Authorised Version and have drawn upon its inexhaustable springs of wisdom courage and joy.

It is my confident hope, confirmed by the widespread interest your novement has aroused, that my subjects may never cease to cherish their noble inheritance in the Engish Bible, which, in secular aspect 's the first of national treasures, and s, as you truly say, in its spiritual significance the most valuable thing that this world affords.

It has sweetened home life; it as set a standard of pure speech; has permeated literature and art; it las helped to remove social wrongs and to ameliorate conditions of laour; it has modified the laws of the ealm and shaped the national charand it has fostered international comity and goodwill among

Above all, the English version of he Bible has made accessible to us he revelation of God our Father is His Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

We feel that the indebtedness of the British people to this Book is so great that the tercentenary of the version, which has been treasured through three centuries, should be observed as a national thanksgiving, specially as it happily coincides with the year of your Majesty's Corona-

We praise God not only for the benefit of the Bible to past generaions, but also because the truths, as long as they are made the standard of life, will preserve the glory of our Empire through generations to come.



Sochelier married his wife, Jeanne,

two years ago. He ill-treated her, and a month ago she left him. For the last fortnight Bochelier. who knew his wife's address, had made appeals to her by letter, and had waited at her door for her on her return from work to beg her to come ack to him. Five days ago he threatened her. This morning he roke into her room and killed her Jeanne Bochelier had a room in the Rue des Gravilliers, near the Bouleward St. Martin. At half-past seven this morning there was a knock at her door. It was too early for the post, and when, in answer to her cry "Who is there?" she heard her hus band's voice say, "Open!" Jeanne Bochelier pushed a table up against

it, and heaped chairs on it. She was mad with fear, and she had reason to be frightened. She rushed to the window. Her husband thundered on the door, and ther smashed a panel, tore out another and clambered into the room over the barricade.

the door, pushed her box underneath

He rushed straight at her, and th shrieking woman saw a butcher's knife in his upraised hand. Tha gleaming blade was the last thing she saw except her husband's furious face above her own.

The knife fell six or seven times with terrible effect, and one of the blows severed the cartoid artery the unfortunate woman. Dying though she was, Jeanne Bochelie lragged herself out of the room and called for help.

Help came, but too late for her She had only time to point downstairs and say "My husband." an

Bochelier had run down the stair and got out of the house unnoticed but the concierge and another ma who had rushed up at his wife's cal or help, now ran after the murderer shrieking, "l'assassin!" as they ran

He cut the finger o ne man, ran his knife through the shoulder of another, tripped up three er four men and women-for ever women threw themselves in his way -and doubling this way and that up and down the streets which run behind the boulevard, rushed at the Church of Notre Dame de Lorette where early Mass was being cele-

brated. In the church Bochelier knocked down two men who tried to lay hands on him, stabbed the beadle in the face, and escaped through a side door

Firemen Hold Meeting.

THEY WILL DEMAND HIGHER

A largely attended meeting of the Firemen's Protective Union was held in the British Hall last night when the question of wages of firemen who will be engaged on the Bonaventure and Bellaventure down south the coming summer was discussed. 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
