





PORT AU PORT, Hayti, To-day. Four formidable explosions shook violently every house in the city and caused the population to rush into the streets. Everybody rushed towards the National Palace, where it was found that a powder magazine had blown up A for minutes afterwards blown up. A few minutes afterwards the palace itself, built of wood, was badly shattered by shock, and was destroyed. During the fire a great number of explosions succeeded one anather the street of other. All the houses around the palace were damaged, but as the palace itself was isolated, the firemen succeeded in their efforts to localize the fire. The members of the family of President Leconte, all of whom were in the palace at the time, were saved. But the President himself was not seen again, having perished in the flames. Consternation reigns among the population, but no disorders have occurred. The military authorities maintain order in the town. Both the chamber and the senate have been called together. The National Assembly will probably nominate a successor to President Leconte. The cause of the explosion of the magazine was not ascertained. Many palace attendants were killed. It is estimated the casuality list will reach four hundred persons killed or injured.




