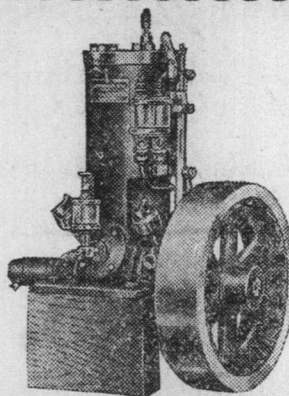

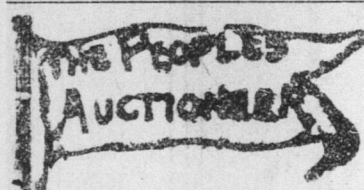

### Household Notes.

Turnips require thick peeling. An excellent cake is made with boiled raisins. A pure soup is usually served with croutons. Vinegar is a simple and good remedy for cuts. The bone in real lamb chops is very small and short. The house fern should not have the sun shining on it. Linen pillow slips are a great comfort to an invalid. A good and simple dessert is boiled rice and stewed figs.

Lack of wire is one of the troubles with domestic help. There should be a rest period in every housekeeper's schedule. A sheet of iron over a gas burner is a great saving of heat. An aluminum fork is excellent for creaming the butter for cake. Graham bread has in it three times as much iron as white bread. Hot cornmeal mush with cream is a very good winter breakfast cereal. Potatoes sprinkled with flour when frying will be a delicious brown. Insist on the tea towels being washed, scalded and sunned every day. Rancid olive oil may be sweetened by boiling with slices of raw potatoes. Fried calves' liver, cold and chipped fine, will make a very good sandwich. Warm little night slippers for baby can be made out of bathrobe material. Bacon rinds that cannot be boiled with cabbage are good to hasten a slow fire. A flour barrel in a pantry can be handled far more easily if it has rollers on it. Keep a bag of sulphur in the bird cage in summer. It will drive away the lice.

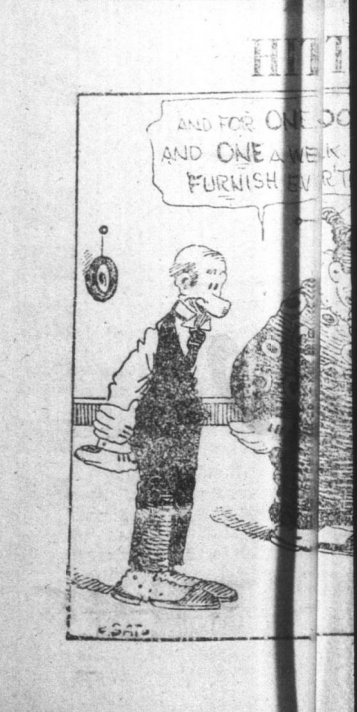

 LONDON, Feb. 19.

This statement was to have been made by Premier Lloyd George to-day, but the delivery of his speech was postponed because of the unexpected delay in the completion of the necessary negotiations with the Dominions, Allies and neutral countries.

**BRITISH GAINS.**  
 NEW YORK, Feb. 19.  
 With the British Armies in the field. The German army of Crown Prince Rupprecht received several sharp raps on the knuckles during the last thirty-six hours, following Saturday's engagement in the Miraumont region, the British having advanced further and this despite fogs, the thawing of frozen ground, and the resultant seas of mud. Officers are quite satisfied with the result. They asserted to-day the British lines now overlook Miraumont at several points. Violent counter attacks by Germans north of the Ancre yesterday at noon were bloodily repulsed. North of Armentieres British raiders penetrated 250 yards into the German second line of trenches killing 69 men. Many dugouts were cleaned out by bombs. Other minor raids yesterday and last night were also successful.

**THE NEW LOAN.**  
 LONDON, Feb. 19.  
 "I am glad, however, the Chancellor said to be able to say the loan succeeded to a greater extent than I expected, but not greater than I hoped. I hope what I have just said will not encourage exaggerated estimates which might create that strange condition which I consider the amazing financial efforts of this country might be minimized when the actual figures are known. When I was asked what amount of money I considered necessary to make the loan a success, I stated a figure which was larger than I expected, but not than I hoped."

That figure was six hundred million pounds. Without taking into account the direct contributions from the banks which it is desirable to avoid that figure already has been exceeded. The excess certainly will amount to one hundred million pounds."

**NEW BRITISH DEVICE.**  
 NEW YORK, Feb. 19.  
 An Associated Press despatch from Baltimore to-day says the Donaldson Liner Lakonia from Glasgow, provided with a new smoke device of the British Admiralty to render shipping immune from submarine attacks, arrived at this port yesterday. The ship also carried a three inch gun, mounted astern, and several trained gunners to man it. According to one of the gunners to-day the new device was perfected by British chemists and scientists and can generate enough smoke in several minutes to mask the vessel from the enemy's view for several hours. The Lakonia encountered no enemy craft on the trip to this port, but she was twice chased for several hours on her last outward bound voyage, first by a German ship thought to have been the commerce raider Vineta, and again by a submarine in the Bay of Biscay. The Lakonia escaped both times by superior speed.

**IN MESOPOTAMIA.**  
 LONDON, Feb. 19.  
 British troops on the left bank of the Tigris river in Iraq took the offensive on Saturday afternoon against the Turkish positions at Sannayat, says the British official statement issued to-day. They occupied two Turkish front lines on a frontage of 350 yards and 540 yards respectively. The Turks launched two heavy counter attacks and forced back the British right wing to the original line. The British left wing repulsed the Turkish counter attack, but when night came the troops were withdrawn from their newly-won positions. On the south bank of the Tigris, west of Shumran Bend, further progress has been made.

**GERARD ATTACKED.**  
 AMSTERDAM, Feb. 19.  
 Count von Reventlow, devotes a leading editorial in the Berlin Tages Zeitung to-day to an attack on former American Ambassador Gerard, whom he accuses of having used his official position deliberately, to transmit important war information to the Entente by way of America. "Many incidents," he writes, "have continually pointed to the theory that the uncontrolled cables service and letter service to the United States permitted to the American Embassy has also been an uncontrolled method of communication with London and Paris."

This was best illustrated in the events which led up to the capture and execution of Sir Roger Casement. Thus London learned in good time of the enterprise to the Irish coast and his capture followed. American Ambassador Gerard and his personnel were the ones who delivered the honorable Irishman to the hangman. An attack in a morning newspaper is appended, and the article closes with an expression of hearty thankfulness that Gerard has left Berlin.

**PROGRESS BY MEXICAL'S FORCES.**  
 WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.  
 Reports of progress by President Menocal's forces against the insurgent forces in Cuba increased the hopes of administration officials to-day that peace may be re-established on the Island without American intervention. It has been made plain that the full moral support of the United States government will be given to Menocal in administration circles it was said late to-day that no additional steps were in contemplation for the present.

**SUB. PRISONERS AT COPENHAGEN.**  
 LONDON, Feb. 19.  
 Capt. Jacobsen, of the Norwegian ship Thor II, with his wife and daughter were taken aboard a German submarine after the sinking of his vessel two weeks ago, arrived at Copenhagen to-day, says a despatch from the Danish capital to the Exchange Telegraph Co. The captain and his family spent eight days on board the submarine. In the course of that time the U-boat sank two British steamers and a trawler. One of the steamers, according to the captain was loaded with ammunition. As it was sunk without warning, the explosion was both so sudden and violent that the submarine was severely injured.

**WAR OFFICE ANNOUNCEMENT.**  
 PARIS, Feb. 19.  
 The following announcement was made by the war office to-day: "Patrols were active in the regions of Barnhauptledhau. The night was calm elsewhere." On Saturday night a Zeppelin flew over the French coast in the department of Pas de Calais as far as the environs of Boulogne and dropped a number of bombs without result.

**LAST WEEK OF CONGRESS.**  
 WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.  
 Congress to-day started the last week of the session with the general legislative situation somewhat as follows: In the Senate the Espionage and Anti-Conspiracy Bill was up for final action. Next the Revenue Bill and Naval Bill carrying \$553,000,000 will be pushed. Most of the legisla-

tive congestion exists in the Senate. In the House the Danish West Indies Bill was up for passage to-day and the Army Bill carrying \$27,000,000 probably will be passed to-morrow and sent to Senate. Other measures which are to be pressed in the House immediately, according to present plans, are the sundry civil and general deficiency appropriation bills and the military academy bill.

**SUCCESSFUL RAID.**  
 LONDON, Feb. 19.  
 We carried out a successful raid this morning east of Souchez, says the official report from British headquarters in France to-night. A hostile mine shaft was blown up and several occupied dugouts destroyed. We took a few prisoners. Beyond the usual artillery activity on both sides there is nothing further to report.

**MEXICO.**  
 MEXICO CITY, Feb. 19.  
 The Government of Ecuador, according to reports received here, has proposed to Latin-American countries that a meeting be held at Montevideo to decide on an answer to the Mexican note proposing cessation of shipments of supplies to European belligerents.

**PART CARGO CONFISCATED.**  
 LONDON, Feb. 19.  
 A despatch from Amsterdam states that the Hamburg Prize Court has confiscated as contraband half the cargo of the Dutch steamer Batavier II, captured by a German submarine while bound from Rotterdam to London last September.

**U-BOAT REPORTED SUNK.**  
 NEW YORK, Feb. 19.  
 In a 40-minute battle between a German U-boat and the French line steamer Guyane, off the coast of France, Jan. 22, the submarine was sunk, according to officers of the freighter which arrived here to-day from Bordeaux.

**CANADIAN WHEAT CROP.**  
 OTTAWA, Feb. 19.  
 The latest Government figures place the Canadian wheat crop at 220,000,000 bushels, or 45 millions higher than the original estimate.

**CREW MISSING.**  
 LONDON, Feb. 19.  
 Eleven of the crew of the British steamer Romsdalen, reported sunk yesterday, are missing.

**THE SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN.**

 Lord Marmaduke Furness, Earl of Granley, and head of the Furness Withy Line of steamers, on an inspection trip to the Baltimore shipping terminals to-day, declared that Germany's new submarine policy is having no more effect upon English shipping than her old policy had. 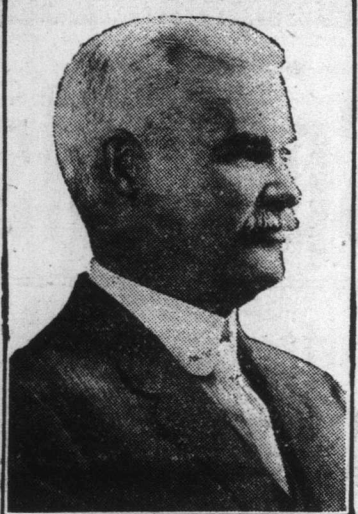
HOW REFORMS ARE MADE.

A despatch from Zurich to-day says the Austrian Emperor has given a long audience to Count Czernin, Minister of Foreign Affairs, who previously had a conference with Frederick C. Penfield, American Ambassador.

**POLAND NOT FERVIDLY PRO-GERMAN.**

**GENEVA, To-day.**  
The appeal to Poles in the newly proclaimed kingdom to enlist in the Polish army and fight under the Austro-German banners for the new state has fallen on deaf ears, according to recent information brought from Warsaw by neutral and German visitors.

The Cadres of the new army have been formed and a considerable number of officers and men from the old Austrian Polish Legion and from Polish troops of the German army has been brought to the occupied districts of Poland to instruct Polish volunteers, but only a few hundred troops, most of them students in Warsaw University who volunteered in the first flush of enthusiasm following the proclamation of the kingdom, are said to have come forward.

The two Polish army corps of which German advocates of the establishment of the new Poland spoke as a probable contribution from the Kingdom to the armies of the Central Powers are declared to show no signs of ever coming into existence.

**THE SUB. WARFARE.**

**LONDON, To-day.**  
Two of the crew of the Iolo made prisoners, and others landed. The captain of the British steamer Hope-moor, which was sent to bottom on Feb. 16, was taken prisoner, the others being landed.

**WAR REVIEW.**

**LONDON, To-day.**  
On the Irak front in Asiatic Turkey, the British and Turks have been engaged in hard fighting at Sannaiyat, about 12 miles northeast of Katal-Amara. Aside from this engagement, no fighting of importance is reported in any of the latest official statements. Operations on all fronts have been carried out by small raiding parties, sappers and artillery wings of the belligerent armies.

London reports that on the front in France the British carried out a successful raid east of Souchez, while Berlin reports that attempted British advances southwest of Messines, north of Arrmentieres, resulted in failure. Artillery duels between the French and Germans on several sectors of the Verdun front, have again become quite severe. On the line running from the Baltic Sea to Roumania there have been no developments anywhere. The usual artillery actions and minor skirmishes continue in the Austro-Italian theatre and on the Macedonian front. The Teutons' submarines continue their sinking of both Entente Allied and neutral ships. Monday's report from London shows that two more British steamers of an aggregate tonnage of 8,242 have been sent down.

**NO GERMAN INFLUENCE IN CUBA.**


**PARIS, To-day.**  
The Cuban Consul at Havre has issued a statement denying the reports that the troubles in Cuba are due to German intrigue, according to a Havre report from that city. The statement says that the disturbances in Cuba are due solely to the bitter nature of the presidential election. Not only have the Germans no influence in Cuba, says the Consul, but they have still less power to create difficulties between Cuba and the United States, to which latter country Cubans are bound by great interests and a lively sense of gratitude.

Vice-Chairman Mr. W. A. O'D. Kelly presided at last night's meeting of the Citizens' Committee. Considerable discussion as to why carpenters and others engaged about buildings should not be licensed as well as plumbers, brought forth some excellent views. It was their opinion that this plan would protect the carpenter and safeguard those who employed skilled men against the inferior work of handy men.

In relation to Section 342, dealing with sufficient light and ventilation of dwelling houses, it was decided that 144 sq. feet for a living room be inclusive of the chimney and that the maximum height of ceilings in downstairs flats be nine feet, in upstairs eight feet.

Section 263, which states that "no dwelling shall be hereafter erected unless there is a city water supply accessible thereto, nor unless there is a public sewer in such street, and every such dwelling shall have its plumbing system connected with the city and water supply and with a public sewer before such dwelling is occupied, except in the case of suburban districts," was, in the opinion of the Committee likely to prove detrimental to the expansion of the city, and was therefore ordered to be expunged.

The committee will meet again at 8 p.m. on Friday.



## How People Spend Their Money.

By RUTH CAMERON.



RUTH CAMERON

The response to my question, "How much do you give?" has been most gratifying. Apparently I touched a chord of popular interest. Several readers have gone further than the answer and supplied me with their whole budget.

"I wish I had this whole page. I could fill it with these interesting human documents. As it is, I'm going to give you some this week and more a week from to-day. Watch for them if you are interested in knowing how people of various incomes apportion their money, especially their gift money.

"For a wedding present for some one I know well," writes a letter friend who says her income averages about ten dollars a week. "I spend from three to five dollars. For any casual friend, one to three dollars."

She Buys Presents Throughout The Year.

"I have a drawer in which I place anything I see during the year that I think would make a good present and which I can get for a reasonable figure or can make.

"We have the duplex system of envelopes in Church. I give fifteen cents for the support of the Church, and ten cents for benevolences. For Sunday School and other Church collections I give five cents at ordinary services, and ten to twenty-five at special services.

"For collections for purges for post-man, gifts, Red Cross, etc. I generally give from ten cents to one dollar according to circumstances."

How Forty Dollars a Month is Divided.

"Perhaps the way I divide my income," writes a friend who receives forty dollars a month, room and board included, "would be of interest."

"Savings bank—\$20.00; Clothes (I make most of them myself)—\$7.00; Church and charity—\$4.00; Upkeep of room at home—\$2.00; Higher Life (such as magazines, theatre, etc.)—\$2.00; Other expenses (carfare, cosmetics, etc.)—\$3.00. Christmas gifts—\$2.00. If I need the doctor I take that money out of savings."

"I am a business woman," writes another, (by the way all these answers appear to come from women, we'd like to hear from some men, too). "I get \$14.00 per week. I am a Church member and give twenty cents each Sunday for support of the Church and missions. Christmas usually costs me from \$25.00 to \$28.00 and for wedding presents I never give less than \$5.00. I might add that I board and it costs me about \$9.00 per week, including carfare. I will be grateful to have you write something on this subject, as I give too much or not enough I would like to know it."

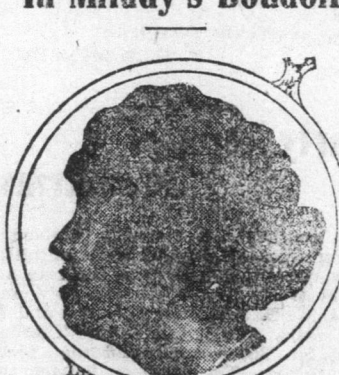

## THE BEAUTIFUL MOUTH.

If your mouth is defective, improve the shape of your lips by avoiding careless habits. Many pretty women are disgraced by careless habits of mouthing their words, of chewing their lips, of ridiculous contortions while they talk.

The time to train our mouths to beauty is in our infancy. Our mothers should begin the work, and when we have reached years of intelligence—we should carry it forward.

If the mouth is too large it can be trained to lesser size by tender pinching of the corners. This makes the line at the corners almost indeterminate, and diminishes the size. This must be most gently and tenderly done. Also train the lips to deepen their beauty cleft by pushing the middle portions together with the first fingers. This light pressure four or five times a day, when you are dressing in the morning and undressing at night, will marvellously refashion the mouth.

The lips should be lightly massaged at night just before retiring. Do not use glycerine alone on the lips nor any other surface of the body. It is too drying. It has the power to draw moisture from the skin, and that moisture should be replaced by the water with which the glycerine is mixed.

As to color—the lips should not be too red. The normal lip should be the same color as the gums. So the lips should be a deep pink or a light red. Not blood red but three shades lighter than a stream of arterial blood. Preserve the color by keeping the body healthy. If the circulation is defective the lips will be pale. If we become anaemic, pallid lips will be one of the first signs of our state. To make them healthy red improve the tone of the system.

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
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
