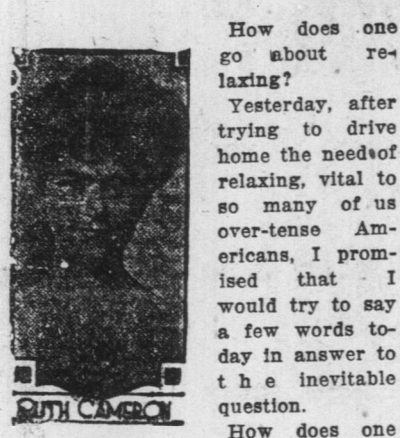

Dime and Other Novels

The St. John's (N.F.) Telegram devotes a long article to a discussion of dime novels or "penny dreadfuls," as the English say, and quite properly observes that many of the cloth-covered books which are sold by the million have no greater literary merit than the despised yellow-covered novel of our boyhood. It says further that this is a rather sorry compliment to our present-day authors, whose works almost leap at once from every newsstand.

Many of our readers will recall the days of Ned Buntline, Sylvanus Cobb and Col. Prentiss Ingraham, those wizards of the open who could spin romances that made one forget there were ever such things as school or household tasks. Crude as these writers were, when judged by the standard of the literary critic, they opened for us the very gates of romance and made us wish we were living in the midst of the stirring scenes they unfolded before our youthful imaginations.

It is not too much to say that these writers of the half-dime and dime novel moulded the characters of many a youth. They may have caused him to leave home occasionally on an Indian hunting expedition, but they filled his mind with nothing that was unclean or degrading. The same cannot be said for some of the writers of much advertised novels which grace the newsstands in every American city to-day, novels which are not literature, but prurient sensationalism appealing only to unhealthy minds.

Who would exchange a rollicking tale of the Spanish Main written by Ingraham for one of Harold Bell Wright's machine-made novels or a decadent story by Chambers? The latter always leaves a bad taste in the mouth which never happened in the case of the "penny dreadful," which the literary snobs so roundly condemn.—Charleston American.

An Outport Opinion.

(Harbor Grace Standard.)

Ultra-Partisan Politics rears its ugly head in all directions. Look for example, at the movement for inter-denominational education which the Telegram stated has the good wishes of every intelligent public-spirited citizen. We may have to stand aside in despair of any one of the parties seeking the suffrage of the electors having the courage and the enlightened look-ahead to manfully make non-sectarian (but not by any means godless but eminently godly, goodly) education one of the main planks of its platform. But we have the right, we and everyone who has faith in that way of not only providing a good education for the bulk of our people now condemned to a poor one or to practically none as in the case of our outport boys like one of our Victoria Cross lads and numerous other lads and lasses through no fault of theirs but likewise a way to promoting a good feeling towards one's fellow-citizens of all creeds and a more united working together to build up our common country—we have the right to cry hands off to those on both sides that are intent on making political capital for their own selfish ends out of it, reckless of what bitterness of feeling and other mischief they cause. Such is only one out of many proofs of the very low state to which party politics has fallen. There should be no attempt to drag in religious rancor. Our Roman Catholic fellow countrymen being as we have before now said not included in the movement owing to their known unanimous policy on the subject, as a matter of practical politics, the movement should be dealt with entirely on its merits—calmly and intelligently—by the remaining two-thirds of the population. Unscrupulous partisans would fain set the whole of this portion if not the whole population at variance to suit their vile ends. The question for this portion to settle is how to give their children all thru the Island, the Outports in particular, the very best education possible at the lowest cost. Newspaper editors and other writers that use such unpatriotic tactics should be ashamed of themselves and be frowned down upon by all decent men in any party. The using of these and other "beastly" weapons tends to make all decent people of any sense disgusted and to cast their votes against instead of for the parties employing them. Hard hits are all right, but let them be fair.

Cashin. You can trust Cashin to the limit, and he'll never betray you—the same is true when applied in the interest of his native land.

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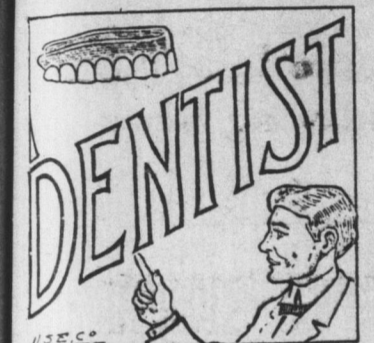

this tax removed; the opinion of the
Council is expressed in the corre-

TO THE GOVERNMENT.

Newfoundland Board of Trade,

The attention of the Council of the
Board of Trade has been called to the
fact that Fire Insurance Companies
doing business in Newfoundland pro-
pose to collect a tax of 5% on all
premiums after August 1st.
They give as the reason for this
fact that the Companies are taxed
5% on the premium collections
under the Profit Tax, 1919.
The Council of the Board of Trade
are of the opinion that this 5% tax
on the premium receipts of the Com-
panies is intended to be paid out of
the Companies' earnings, in the same
way that the Business Profits Tax
is paid by private traders from their
net earnings during the year, and
that it is both unfair and unjust to
allow the Insurance Companies to
collect this tax from the Policy-
holder.
The Council feel certain that it was
not the intention of the Government
that the Policy-holder should pay
this tax, and respectfully draw the
attention of the Executive Govern-
ment to the action of the Insurance
Companies with the hope that they
will take such steps as will prevent
any injustice being done to the Policy-
holder.

Battle of Assaye.

On Friday, September 23, 1803, Col-
onel Arthur Wellesley, created in 1814
the first and Great Duke of Wellington,
fully established his reputation for
military genius by his victory in the
battle of Assaye, which was gained un-
der every disadvantage of locality and
pre-arrangement, whereby he inflicted
a blow on the Marhatta kingdom in
the centre of India, from which it never
recovered. The great achievement
made him the hero of India, and rich
gifts poured in upon him in gratitude.
The British Inhabitants of Calcutta
voted for him a sword valued at 1,000
guineas; the army a service of plate
valued at 2,000 guineas; and the civil
authorities poured in their congratu-
lations and addresses. But what he
valued more than all the rest and ex-
hibited on many occasions in his after
life, was an address from the native
inhabitants praying "that the God of
all castes and colors would bless and
reward him for his just and equal
rule in Mysore," for he had been pre-
viously appointed civil and military
Governor of Seringapatam and Mysore
with almost a Viceroy's authority.
Subsequently circumstances compelled
Wellesley to fight a pitched battle on the
deffensive, but he was always swift to
strike when opportunity offered, as
at Salamanca, and in particular he
knew the value of the offensive against
Asiatics. Thus, when he found him-
self before the Marhatta army in
position at Assaye, earlier in the day
than he had anticipated so that his
other column under Colonel Steven-
son was yet distant, he decided to
strike. Some 60,000 men with a pow-
erful artillery faced him, and he had
about a tenth of that number all tired
by a long march. His guns, too, were
light and of little service being soon
overpowered and silenced. But a
flank attack, followed by a charge of
the cavalry, some 2,500 sabres, swept
away all opposition. The enemy broke
and fled, leaving the ground cumbered
with dead and wounded and crowded
with cannon, bullocks, caissons, and
all the material of an Indian army.
It was, in truth, a brilliant victory,
for Scindiah's army was no mere mob,
ignorant of tactics and unused to
combination, but composed of infantry,
well trained under French officers, an
efficient artillery and cavalry, excel-
lent for its kind. That they fought
well is shown by the fact that about
a third of the whole British army was
put out of action, while over 1,200 of
Scindiah's dead were left on the field,
and although another battle was nec-
essary, the confidence of the Marhat-
tas was gone. Moreover, it was made
evident that in the "Sepoy General,"
as Napoleon sardoniously called Welles-
ley later, England had found a soldier
capable of yet greater things. The
Duke was born near Dublin in 1769,
the same year as his future great mil-
itary rival, Napoleon Bonaparte, the
French Emperor, and Marshal Soult,
another of his chief French opponents,
both of whom he defeated in his crown-
ing victory at Waterloo on June 18,
1815. Wellington lived to be eighty-
three years of age, and died almost
exactly forty-nine years after his vic-
tory at Assaye, on Tuesday, Septem-
ber 14, 1852.

- 1. Thou shalt heed the call of Plain quiet wall papers and white woodwork wherever such is possible.
2. Thou shalt lighten dark rooms by the use of light-hued, yellow-tinted wall paper, that suggests the blessed sunshine.
3. Thou shalt see that thy walls and thine own personality are not to forward, but modestly retiring.
4. Thou shalt use no large-patterned wall papers against which to hang thy pictures. The one will kill the other.
5. Thou shalt have no centerpiece or cornerpieces upon thy ceiling, but only a very nearly plain expanse of light color.
6. Thou shalt have thy fill of bright tints, and delicate designs for bedrooms and boudoirs, but for drawing-rooms, dining-rooms, libraries and halls, thou shalt be compelled to use less frivolous papers.
7. Thou shalt, when the ceiling is not too high, run the paper of the side wall up to the ceiling, putting the border just below the angle.

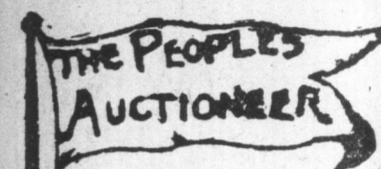
