# British Premier Paints Alarming Picture.

Will Follow Disorganization--North and South Ireland Nearing Breach--Civil Strife With Foreign Complications Predicted for China.

**LLOYD GEORGE'S APPEAL.**  
GENOA, April 26. Lloyd George drew an alarming picture tonight of Europe, which he said is seeking its level might to overwhelm the nations. Europe, he said, must be equipped by Germany, Russia and America. He said that up to two thirds of the population of Europe, and there was no frontier line from the Baltic to the Black Sea. I wish America, he exclaimed, not for selfish ends, but because she exercises a moral authority. But America is not Europe and Europe must do her best to solve her problems. Urging the nations to install good will and patience, Lloyd George declared that unless Europe is reorganized, unless the Continent developed something equitable, the nations would again be in blood.

**FRUIT BETWEEN NORTH AND SOUTH POSSIBLE.**  
BELFAST, April 26. A breach between the Dublin and Belfast Governments which may end in a rupture of the London agreement is indicated by a statement of the Provisional Government in Dublin, announcing that it is unable to operate with the Belfast Government.

**CHINA IN DANGER OF CIVIL WAR.**  
PEKING, April 26. President Shih-Chang to-day issued an appeal to the Chinese declaring China was on the verge of Civil War with the dangers of foreign complications. He demanded that Generals Teo-Lin and Pei-Fu withdraw their troops and send mediators for adjustment of their differences.

**STEAMER FOUNDERS--32 LOST.**  
BREST, April 26. Thirty-two lives were lost when the French steamer Albert Fallender, 3000 tons, from Rotterdam to Brest, with coal, foundered off Brittany in a storm last night. The Cap was the sole survivor, picked up today.

**WEL COMPANY CASE BEFORE PRIVY COUNCIL.**  
LONDON, April 26. One Newfoundland appeal is entered for the Privy Council term which opens tomorrow, the Nova Scotia Wel Company vs. the Minister of Finance, concerning the Business Profits Tax.

**CANADIAN FISHERY.**  
OTTAWA, April 26. The Canadian sea fish catch on both coasts was 116,866 cwts., valued at \$515,849, compared with 100,993 cwts. valued at \$723,534 for March 1921. The lobster catch was small.

**NOTED K. C. DEAD.**  
LONDON, April 26. Sir Henry Erle Richards, K. C., who was Counsel for Canada and Newfoundland in the North Atlantic Coast Fisheries arbitration at the Hague in 1910, died to-day.

**Fire at Westminster Abbey.**  
On April 27, 1829, an alarm was raised that Westminster Abbey was on fire. At a little after ten o'clock at night, flames were seen issuing from the north transept, and as the news spread it caused a pang in many hearts. The anxiety of the moment was the difficulty of getting at the place that was burning. The Dean was out of town, but his place was well filled, and the mischief stopped. A cast of screen, used in the Westminster plays, was put away with other lumber, in a corner, and was discovered on fire, and in falling had kindled the boards. When an entrance was obtained the flames were climbing rapidly to the roof and it was considered certain that delay of half an hour would have caused the destruction of the building. There was for some time a good deal of mystery about the origin of the fire. The only thing clear at first was that is must have been done by somebody secreted among the lumber; but the finding of a mass of lead in a strange place, and traces of homalised shoes, were thought to show that some thieves had come to steal lead from the roof, and that the fire was caused by them.

**A Great Prussian General.**  
Field Marshal Count Von Moltke, one of the greatest Prussian Generals, died on April 24, 1891, aged ninety-one years. When he was 35, Moltke was sent to re-organize the Turkish Army and narrowly escaped being killed in the battle of Nisibis. In 1857 he was made chief of the Prussian General Staff, and with the help of his colleague, Van Roon, he practically trebled the fighting strength of the Prussian army by making the Landwehr (militia) an effective reserve. He also adapted the whole military system of Prussia to new conditions of war, which included perfect preparation to take the field--arrangement of the railway system for war--improvements in the constitution of the staff, and the securing of the best ability for the superior commands in the field. These improvements first bore fruit in the Danish Campaign of 1864, but were more conspicuous in the war with Austria in 1866. Moltke practically directed the operations in the field of this war, and largely contributed to the success of the Prussians. When the war with France broke out in 1870 the assembling of the hosts of

Portugal Cove, with a communication to His Honor the President relating the deplorable intelligence. The Magistrate also issued a notice offering temporary relief to the sufferers, and directions were given to the destitute to repair to the Court House for shelter. The Rev. Fathers Nowlan and Berney announced the humane offer of the Very Rev. Father Ewer, of the Roman Catholic Chapel, as a place of refuge, and the Rev. Mr. Tomkins also very promptly tendered the Methodist Chapel, for the same humane and benevolent purpose.

### RELIEF ARRIVES.

About 12 o'clock on Sunday, two boats came into the harbor, laden with provisions, forwarded by several gentlemen of Carbonear, for the relief of the unfortunate sufferers, and in the evening His Honor the President, accompanied by Lieut. Col. Oldfield, R.E., arrived from St. John's, Newfoundland. His Honor having received the intelligence sent by the Committee of the deplorable conflagration which had destroyed the town, left Government House at an early hour, after leaving directions for the forwarding of supplies and crossed the Bay in a small rowing skiff in order to make himself personally acquainted with the extent of the distress and to afford suitable directions and relief. This act of His Honor is the most prompt and paternal which we ever witnessed from so exalted an individual, and has called forth the gratitude and admiration of all hearts. After visiting the scene of desolation, His Honor, R. A. Tucker, President of His Majesty's Council and Acting Governor of the Colony, proceeded to the Court House, and remained in conference with the Magistrate and Town Committee, for upwards of two hours. His Honor embarked for Portugal Cove in the cutter Dolphin shortly afterwards. On Monday afternoon a boat with the following supplies, despatched by order of His Honor the President, arrived here to the Committee of Relief, for distribution among the sufferers by the fire, viz:—50 bags Bread, 10 lbs. Sugar, 10 barrels Flour, 2 barrels Congo Tea, 46 tents and 1000 Blankets.

### AROSE FROM ITS ASHES.

It is wonderful the energy displayed by the people of Harbor Grace in those days. In a short time the old town rose from its ashes—new houses were quickly erected—streets were widened and everything proclaimed that industry was in full swing. from the commencement of the alarm, reduced to ashes. No lives were lost, but the loss of property was great, in consequence of the rapid progress of the destructive element, and has been, as accurately as circumstances would permit, estimated at the value of \$100,000.

### SIX HUNDRED HOMELESS.

The Established Church which had been considered the pride and ornament of the town, and was certainly the most handsome edifice of the kind in the Island, was consumed at an early period. It cost about \$2,000 in building about fifteen years before

The establishments of all the supplying merchants in the town, with only three exceptions, shared the same fate together with all the goods and merchandise which they contained, besides seven retail shops. The Waterford Arms, Keefe's Hotel, and the Commercial Room, twelve public houses and upwards of sixty premises occupied by tradesmen and others were entirely destroyed. In all, at least one hundred families, forming about six hundred of the inhabitants were deprived of their dwellings in the short period we before stated, and reduced to take in the houses of such of their fellow townsmen who were beyond the reach of the destructive element and to a dependence upon public benevolence for that compassion and relief which their industrious exertions enabled them, in common with the rest of the community, promptly and generously to afford to the unfortunate upon every similar occasion.

### CARBONEAR TO THE RESCUE.

Indications of the alarming conflagration had been early perceivable at Carbonear, and much to their credit, the principal merchants and inhabitants of that town hastened promptly to the scene, and in conjunction with the terrified and distressed townsmen exerted themselves to render effectual assistance in the dreadful emergency, and prolonged their compassionate assistance until the flames became exhausted, retiring only when further efforts were unnecessary, with a promise of a speedy supply of food for the immediate subsistence of the sufferers. On this calamitous occasion, as soon as apprehensions of further danger to the remaining houses, had in some degree subsided, the Rev. J. Burt and N. Stabb, J. Stark Esqrs., the Rev. Fathers Nowlan and Berney, and Messrs. J. Fitzgerald, R. Anderson (grandfather of Sir R. A. Squires, Premier) and A. Mayo, repaired to the Court House, and proceeded to take every expedient into consideration for providing for the unfortunate, and it was immediately resolved to dispatch the cutter Dolphin to

their countenances rendered the scene truly appalling.

### INEFFECTUAL EFFORTS.

At the very first alarm such of the inhabitants, whose property was not immediately endangered, collected in great force, with the two fire engines belonging to the town, and after a fruitless attempt to subdue the flames upon the spot where they broke out, directed their attentions to the preservation of the extensive mercantile establishment belonging to the estate of Mr. H. W. Danson (now Munn & Co.'s premises), which was in its immediate vicinity to the westward, for which purpose the engines were brought to play upon various points, but the fire had got such a head before they arrived, and the materials were so inflammable, as to render all their exertions to check the progress ineffectual. A quantity of gunpowder was deposited here also, and in several other stores that destructive article had been imprudently lodged, which exploded from time to time, terrifying the people and paralyzing their exertions, and fatally increasing the conflagration by hurling the burning fragments, accelerated by the wind, to an astounding distance. The before-mentioned premises were now reluctantly abandoned, and the crowd retreated to the dock between them and Mr. Peter Brown's premises—here the contiguous houses were covered with blankets which were constantly saturated with water by the engines—the neighboring fences and pallings were immediately cut down, and by these combined efforts the fire first received a check, and the wind providentially veering at this time to W. by N., co-operated and at length happily prevented the flames from extending to the west part of the town—all the buildings, however, in the contrary direction, as far as before stated, except a few in the rear, amongst which were Mr. Parkins', the Parsonage, and the Newfoundland School were totally consumed. Entirely built of wood, containing great quantities of pitch, tar, resin and other combustible articles, besides being thickly interspersed with large manufactories of oil, they were in the short period of two hours

**Penalising the Trade**

We direct attention to-day to a communication appearing on this page signed Importer, the subject of which is one that most vitally affects the future of this Colony so far as trade conditions have to be reckoned with. If it is the studied intention of the Government to extort the last cent from business men under the Profits Tax Act, such a determination is not calculated to produce good results in the way of carrying on the general business of the Colony: nor can it be argued that the cutting of the pound of flesh from off the body commercial will promote the prosperity that every true Newfoundland desires to see restored. Conditions to-day are far from normal. Everybody is facing circumstances without precedent in the every-day life of the whole population. To extract then the last cent from a trade already overtaxed and overloaded with expense will have a most deterrent and disastrous effect on the business community. Trade like every thing else thrives on reasonable protection, and if that measure of protection be not forthcoming up go the shutters with the inevitable aftermath of employees being thrown out of situations, and either becoming charges on the state, or shaking the dust of an ungrateful country off their feet and emigrating to other lands in their search for work, thereby becoming irrevocably lost to their native soil, and by their loss precipitating the crisis which must follow their departure.

Good fortune cannot follow any penalization of trade. This Colony has experienced instances of this all too recently. The motto of the hour should be stabilize conditions, not demoralize them by insisting upon the payment of the uttermost farthing. Assist the trade of the Colony legitimately. Enable the business men to employ the population, thus making all classes producers. It is not for the Government to usurp the prerogatives of the commercial body and to become the employer of nonproductive labor at a cost which will reduce the country to irretrievable bankruptcy. But it is the duty of the Government to assist by doing everything possible, and consistent with economy in the maintenance of the public services, in lightening the burden of taxation, and cutting down correspondingly the load of expenditure. Persecuting the trade with a demand for arrears of taxes that should be remitted is not the quality of encouragement to offer under present circumstances. When firms through the stress of the times have to reduce their staffs of employees, surely that is not the opportune hour to take advantage of their misfortunes and insist that they must dig down still further in an already depleted trade treasury for money which can-

not be found there, but which has to be forthcoming under penalty of the law. Such conduct on the part of Government is but adding to misfortune and driving the men who form the business centre of the Colony's trade into the deeper waters of insolvency, the end of which is the cessation of employment and ultimate ruin for both country and people.

**An Open Letter on Railway Matters.**

To R. C. Morgan, Esq., C.E., of Winnipeg, in the Dominion of Canada, and of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, City.

Dear Sir,—The Contract for the construction of the Branch Line Railways was entered into on the 7th day of December, 1909, and it was confirmed by the Legislature during the next ensuing session. The contract price was at the rate of Fifteen Thousand Dollars per mile, but, contrary to precedent, this amount had to be paid in cash, on the completion of each five mile section. Under previous contracts, the contractor was paid in four per cent. Debentures, which he had to convert into cash at his own cost. The difference meant nearly a Million Dollars to the taxpayers of this country, for that is what it cost the Colony to convert its Debentures into cash. In other words, the Contractors received a gift of that sum of money from the Government, which, according to their own admission, they "financed" into power. I say a gift, because in my opinion under Section 13 of the 1901 Contract the Reid Newfoundland Company were bound to construct such branch lines, as were necessary, at Fifteen Thousand Dollars per mile payable in Debentures of the Colony. That position was argued in the House of Assembly by Sir Robert Bond. In reply to that gentleman's contention, Sir Edward Morris, Prime Minister and Attorney General, said he had consulted learned Counsel in England, who had advised him to the contrary. In rejoinder, Sir Robert Bond reminded him, that when before the Lyttelton Arbitration Court in 1902 the Reid Newfoundland Company's own learned Counsel advanced the plea, that under Section 13 of the Railway Contract of 1901, the contractors had to provide such branch lines "as were necessary to accommodate the Industries of the country," and he added that as lawyers differed on the question, the clear duty of the Government was to submit the question to the Judge of the Supreme Court. That was not done. (See Speech Sir Robert Bond in Evening Telegram of 9th February, 1910). Had it been done, in my opinion, a Million of money would have been saved for the country, which was the difference that resulted from payment in gold, instead of in Debentures of the Colony. Further, this remarkable Contract of 1909, provided that the Contractor shall construct at least fifty miles of railway during "every year of the period during which the Contract shall continue." You will observe, that it fixed a minimum of work to be performed in any one year, and left it to the Contractor, if he found it to his advantage, to double or treble the amount, no matter what it cost the Government to provide funds to pay him. It was a clear demonstration of the game,—

**Remit the Tax.**

Editor Evening Telegrams.  
Dear Sir,—I notice by the newspapers that the Business Profits Tax Act is now before the Legislature, and that the object of the new Act is to compel the payment of the Tax on the "paper" profits made a few years ago.  
There could be no objection to this during normal times, but under present conditions the question may be asked, is this a wise policy? It is interesting to note the attitude of the British Government towards business concerns during the past two years. The Government knew that if the last pound of the Profits Tax was extracted many firms who made heavy losses in 1920 and 1921 would be forced to suspend and their employees would be added to the ranks of the unemployed which would mean a further drain on the Government.  
The decision therefore was that any firm whose statement showed heavy losses on their 1920-21 business should have their unpaid taxes cancelled and if the tax for 1919 was paid it was returned in full. In this manner millions of pounds were returned, and so offset some of the losses. This enabled many firms to keep their doors open and employ as many of their staff as possible.  
Many Newfoundland firms are reducing their staffs who would otherwise be able to keep their employees if they had the Profits Tax returned or cancelled as in England.  
The most important question at this time is, which is the better policy; to force the payment of a tax on profits which no longer exist, or to help keep business concerns on their feet and enable them as far as possible to employ the rank and file. A closed business is of no advantage to the country.

"Heads I win, tails you lose." In every essential particular the Contract tended to the advantage of the Contractor, and the disadvantage of the public. And this monstrously, you now seriously propose should be immediately abandoned, "unless maintained as a public charge." Neither justice, or reason, can find place in your proposal. I submit, there would be equal justice and reason, were a Judge to say to a prisoner at the Bar,—My good fellow, you clear out with the swag, and your unfortunate victim shall pay the penalty. *Ratio est anima legis!* Let us come down then to reason. "W. D. Reid" President of the Reid Newfoundland Company—this fact cannot be emphasized too much,—has declared over his own signature, that he "financed" the Political Party that framed and carried into effect, the Branch Line Railway Contract of 1909, and I believe, in the case of Coaker vs. Reid, swore his statement to be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth. If such it be, then, I submit, it is a matter that must, in justice to this people, be inquired into by a Court of Law, for his statement is true, then he "financed" a body of Public Trustees whose public act—"The Railway Operating and Construction Contract of 1909"—is now under review. It would be for the Court to say what effect that "financing" had upon the validity of the Act, or the pecuniary obligations of the operation of the Act, in view of the fact that the Reid Newfoundland Company were at the time—public Contractors; and it would also be for the Court to determine, whether or not Lord Chancellor Lyndhurst's decision in the case of Charter vs. Trevelyan, to which I have previously referred, applies in any way to the submission I have suggested. The law of England is very clear in respect to the influence of public contractors upon legislation, and it runs back as far as the reign of George III. Many Millions of Dollars, wrung by taxation from this people already almost bled white, is involved, and no Government, unless under the influence of the Reid Newfoundland Company, would dare shirk the duty and responsibility of putting the issue to the test before the Supreme Court. Justice demands that it be done. Then let it be done, though the heavens fall. I make no accusation in this matter. I state only a case for the hearing of the Court. I would say further, that I entirely exonerate the majority of the Government Party of 1909 of knowing complicity in any possible wrong-doing, for I believe they knew not what they did; and as for the others,—I would leave them under the clear White Light of God, which never seen itself, makes all things visible.



**S. S. Mary at Catalina.**

**REPORTED DISABLED.**

Last night a message was received by Messrs. George Neal Ltd. from Mr. J. Colbourne, stating that S. S. Mary had arrived at Catalina in a disabled condition. The message requested that immediate assistance be sent. The Mary left Bell Island over two weeks ago on a sealing expedition, having on board a crew of ten men, including Mr. J. Colbourne, a shareholder in the Steamship Company. The ship was reported from Cape St. Francis on Tuesday evening last, and since then her whereabouts were unknown. Some anxiety was felt for her safety, as it had been feared that she had been caught in the ice floes. The Mary was in charge of Captain Bourne, and was well provisioned and coalled. Arrangements have been made to have the ship towed to St. John's for repairs.

**A Tragedy Recalled.**

**RUSSIAN PRINCESS SHOT WRONG MAN.**

GENEVA. (Associated Press) — A tragedy that attracted the attention of Europe and America fifteen years ago has been recalled with the death, in an asylum near Berne, of Princess Leontieff, a Russian nihilist. The Russian Princess, who was known on two hemispheres for her revolutionary activities, shot and killed under dramatic circumstances a Paris millionaire named Muller, whom she had mistaken for M. Durnovo, then Russian Minister of the Interior, who was alleged to have sent thousands of Russian political prisoners to death in Siberia. M. Muller was lurching alone at a hotel in Interlaken when Princess Leontieff, who was only 20, approached his table and fired seventy shots. Her innocent victim fell lifeless to the floor, the Princess exclaiming, "Thank God, I've rid Russia of the greatest murderer on earth." The Princess was unaware that the real object of her vengeance, M. Durnovo, had left for Berlin two days before. She was sentenced to four years' penal servitude and twenty years' expulsion from Switzerland. After two years in prison the unfortunate woman became insane, and was removed to an asylum at Munsinger, near Berne, where she died.

After the ceremony the happy couple drove to New Gower Street, the residence of the bride parents, where a reception was held. Over 70 guests were present at the feast, and happy speeches were made, one being by Mr. John Noah, cousin of the bride. Amongst the numerous presents received was a purse of gold. Many valuable pieces of silverware were also included which testified to the esteem in which the happy couple are held. The Telegram wishes Mr. and Mrs. Faour many years of wedded bliss.



**At the House.**

**PETITION RE HERRING FISHERY—MR. HIGGINS IN HUMOROUS MOOD.**

Several votes passed the Committee of the Whole on Supply at the House yesterday afternoon. The session was very dull and was confined altogether to consideration of the Estimates.

**PREVENTING HERRING WASTE.**

The member for St. George's, Mr. MacDonnell, presented a petition with reference to the herring fishery on the West Coast. He said that a public meeting had been called at Bay of Islands some ten days ago with Magistrate March as chairman for the purpose of discussing the tremendous waste of herring which occurred every year. It was decided to ask that legislation be introduced with the object of preventing the use of less than 2 1/2 inch mesh. He suggested that the large quantity of herring caught which was not available for use as Scotch Pack be used for the manufacture of lubricating oil, and that the residue be sold as cattle feed. The machinery for extracting the oil from the herring was inexpensive and easy to operate. The Government might consider giving a bounty to such men as would undertake to start a factory for the purpose of manufacturing the oil. Mr. MacDonnell also referred to the fact that there did not appear to be any standard pack for herring in his district. He hoped that the Prime Minister would appoint a committee to confer with experts in the herring fishery with a view to remedying the matters to which he had referred.

The Prime Minister agreed with Mr. MacDonnell that there was an enormous waste of herring and said that the Government would be glad to confer with him and get acquainted with the facts so that such ideas might be suggested as would benefit conditions.

**CONTRACTS FOR SUPPLIES.**

During questions, the Prime Minister had a busy time. He quickly disposed of a bulky Order Paper, however. With reference to the much discussed Mr. Moran, he said that he had been engaged as Railway adviser to the Government after he had resigned from his position as Chairman of the Railway Management Committee of the Newfoundland Company. Sir Richard believed that the Government had paid Mr. Morgan at the rate of \$15,000 a year.

The Minister of Posts told Sir Michael Cashin that the answer to his question would be found in the resolutions which will be tabled tomorrow for the purpose of ratifying an agreement between the Government and the Commercial Cable Company.

The Prime Minister did not think it advisable to make any comment on expressions of opinion that had been passed at the meeting between the Government and the Board of Trade Committee. He told Mr. Higgins that he did not think the Government could see their way clear to assist the School for the Blind with a grant this year. When the House went into Committee on Supply, Sir Richard took occasion to refer to the paragraph in the Auditor General's Report about contracts for supplies which had formed the subject of an acrid discussion on the preceding day. He said that both the Auditor General and the Minister of Public Works had been right. Mr. Berteau had referred to specific supplies, coal, milk, meat and flour. Sir Richard quoted from a letter received from Mr. Berteau in connection with the matter. The Minister of Public Works added a few words of explanation with which the matter was dismissed.

**A PERTINENT QUESTION.**

Mr. Moore asked if there were any truth in the report that Mr. W. H. Rennie who was secretary of the Hospital Board of Governors was also secretary of the Gas Company. He said that there is also a report current that Mr. Rennie goes to the Hospital for only an hour each day and that bills are collected by the nurses. The Prime Minister said that the appointment of Mr. Rennie was made by the Governors of the Hospital and in all probability, if the matter were in the hands of the Government, the post would have gone to someone else.

Mr. Walsh asked for a statement concerning the status of Dr. Keegan but obtained no satisfaction beyond a defence of the acceptance of private fees by the doctor.

A brief discussion of the question of roads and bridges resulted in a divergence of opinion over the proposed trenchment in this connection and ended in the matter being again dropped.

**THE POOR OLD MOUNTED.**

The vote for the Justice Department having been taken up, the Minister, Hon. W. B. Warren, entered into an explanation of the necessity for the much abused mounted police. He said that the establishment of the mounted troop had been found to be more economical than to increase the police force by the number of infantry required. Their services would be invaluable in patrolling the country roads. There were fewer men in the police force today than there were thirty years ago.

Mr. Higgins again poured forth a flow of humour and ridicule at the expense of the poor old mounted force. His witty remarks caused considerable amusement in the House. He suggested that the Minister should further consider the matter. He asked for certain information which the Minister promised to obtain.



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


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
