



The Bishop of Chelmsford.

The Church of England has lost within two days two bishops who the last few years had been much inwere both peculiarly identified with capacitated by increasing infirmity. London, Dr. Watts-Ditchfield, the Bishop of Chelmsford, entered the Church in an unusual way, having been trained for the Wesleyan Ministhirty. He remained all his life a fervent Evangelical, and from the time smoking his pipe. of his appointment in 1907 to St. James-the-Less, Bethnal Green, he ecame a great force in the Church at the East End of London. Practical and wide-minded, unconventional in manner, and a forcible and attractive preacher, he drew crowded congregations, and at the same time worked as effectively outside his church as within its walls. One of his gifts was a great hold over men, and he made a deep impression in Australia, Canada, and New Zealand during a pastoral tour as representative of the Church of England Men's Society. Mr. Asquith's bold choice in 1914 for the new and heavy See of Chelmsford was during the rest of his life, and his example should long remain as an in-spiration to his successors and the lergy of the diocese.



Crowe had entered into an agreement with the Government to undertake operations to develop an immense pulp and paper industry at an early date, is gratifying news, and the fact that the centre of activities this winter will be in White Bay will considerably relieve the anxiety felt for the people who live along that section of the coast.

Conditions are such that the immediate need of the people must be considered regardless of anything. The first responsibility of a Government is to provide for them, through industrial channels if possible, by less economical means if absolutely necessary. If the latter course has to be adopted, the assistance given demands the greatest discretion and the most careful supervision. Otherwise while they keep alive the body of the recipient, they kill the moral tissue.

In 1921 the depression in trade was keenly felt and means had to be devised to provide many with the bare necessities of life. A measure was passed entitled An Act Respecting the Exportation of Timber, and repealing previous statutes which had wisely prohibited the exportation of pulp wood. Under the Act it is lawful for five years from August 2nd, 1921 "to export to Great Britain and Canada round timber rossed or barked" and "the Governor-in-Council whenever he deems it expedient may permit the export of round timber to the United States of America." 


