Work to be Resumed in Southampton Shipyards

Peace will Not Relax Pressure on Germany---Church Union will be a Political Issue Next Election---Duke and Duchess of York to Visit Ulster---Peace May Settle in the Balkans.

SMILING TROUBLE IN STORM CENTRE.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, April 19. The negotiations recently concluded, or now approaching conclusion, are successful, the danger of war in the Balkans will be averted for years, declared Foreign Minister today. The latest of these events, that with Rumania, will be in two or three days. The treaty agreement, already signed, provides for joint action to prevent aggression across the Rumanian border, with two mixed commissions. A blanket agreement covers all points of possible dispute, in payment by Bulgaria for the railways, is practically completely a few details remaining to be settled. We look forward to a time when the Balkan States shall be instead of disagree, the Minister continued.

FRANCE SKEPTICAL.

PARIS, April 19. France will give up none of the pressure on Germany which she possesses, unless the Allies agree to replace them by pre-arranged action between them, in advance and to apply automatically in case of a new default by Germany, says Le Matin, which has been particularly well informed regarding Premier Poincaré's attitude. The French Government, according to the newspaper, considers the Reparations Commission settled, until France is assured of twenty-six billion gold marks plus amounts as she may be called upon to pay on her interest war debts. The British, according to the newspaper, insist that the eventuality of a new default by Germany should come up after such default has been duly called to the attention of the Allies Reparations Commission.

WORKERS TO RESUME WORK.

SOUTHAMPTON, April 19. The engineers and other shipyard workers here decided at a meeting yesterday to return to work next Monday.

CHURCH UNION A POLITICAL ISSUE.

TORONTO, April 20. The Christian Guardian, principal organ of the Methodist Church in Canada, says that the action of the legislative committee of the legislature in connection with the church bill, has raised prospects of one of the most heated religious controversies being thrown into the political arena and fought to a finish next election. AWAITING LEADER.

SOVIET AGENT DENIES REPORT.

MONTREAL, April 18. Alexander Yashkov, the official agent in Canada of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, interviewed here to-day, denied that either he or his staff have brought any literature into Canada which might be construed as "Red Propaganda," and declared that the consignment of literature sent to him here was made up of reference books and volumes on Russia which he needs in connection with his work. He believes an investigation will dispel all suspicion.

AMENDMENT TO IMMIGRATION BILL REJECTED.

WASHINGTON, April 18. The extension of the immigration restrictions to all countries of North and South America was rejected today by the senate 69 to 13. The amendment to the pending bill seeking such extension was offered by Senator Willis, a Republican of Ohio, who declared that without it the bill would leave the "backdoor wide open." It was opposed by the administration leaders in charge of the bill as destructive to the whole theory of Pan-Americanism.

COURTMARTIALED IN FRANCE.

MAYENCE, Germany, April 19. Five of the 22 Germans who were tried by a French Court martial on charges of sabotage in the Ruhr in May and June 1923 were convicted and sentenced to-day to serve terms of 20 years each at hard labor, three were sentenced to ten years each, and three to five each. The leader of the band, Otto Horder, formerly a lieutenant of the German battleship Brestau was given 12 years. The twelve prisoners will be taken to the islands of French Guiana.

TALK OF WAR RIDICULOUS.

TOKYO, April 19. Talk of military action as a result of United States exclusion legislation is ridiculous, however much congress has wobbled the Japanese pride, Lieut General Lehtsuke Tsuno, Vice-Minister of War, said in a newspaper interview to-day.

A Clergyman and Scripts

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir—Recently there has come to my knowledge a rumour that my name has appeared on a large number of scripts for the purchase of intoxicating liquor. Indeed, the rumour goes as far as to say that so many such scripts have been presented at the Office of Control, that my name has been included in a list of the names of persons to whom no more liquor can be supplied—that is, that I have been "blacklisted." So far as those who know me in the country are concerned, I could afford to treat this matter with silent contempt. But, unfortunately, such rumours run far beyond one's friends and acquaintances, and my silence may be misinterpreted.

If there are, or ever have been, any scripts in the Office of Control bearing my name, either as issuing or receiving them, the persons who placed my name on them, or caused my name to be placed on them, have been guilty of FORGERY, for I have never either issued or asked for a script.

A good many years ago, I did give, to a few persons who pleaded serious illness in their families, notes to the druggist or bond store notes for small quantities; but I soon found that some of these were being abused, and I ceased giving them at once. Since then I have not seen a script. I do not know the color of the paper on which they are printed.

I do not make this disclaimer for the defense of my own name so much as to wipe off a slur which this wretched rumour must cast upon the ministry of which I have the honour to be a senior member.

Canada, Crown and Commonwealth

By THOMAS GUERIN.

On March 20th, the question of Canada's relation to the Mother Country through the ties of the British North America Act was raised in the House of Commons by Mr. J. S. Woodsworth, the member for Winnipeg Centre. The ulterior motives which prompted Mr. Woodsworth's motion were but thinly veiled, nevertheless, the members of the House of Commons are destined to hear more on this topic, probably through more disinterested motives.

The status of Canada has been discussed on many occasions, it has been the happy hunting ground for many political theorists. It has been used to serve the purposes of Imperialists, Nationalists and Autonomists alike. Each has dissected it, and found in it matter to conform with his particular political bias.

The rising of the British Commonwealth of Nations has to a great extent disorganized many of the accepted theories of Canada's status, and rendered obsolete many opinions which had become regarded as facts. The vital question today is not that of Canada's relationship to the Mother Country, but that of the relationship existing between the free Nations which form the British Commonwealth.

To establish the relative ties that bind together the component Nations of the British Commonwealth is a task which might well frighten the most temerarious. The British Empire is an evolution. It set forth its way, a slow moving caterpillar. It passed through the stages of its growth and change till it burst upon the Twentieth Century with a butterfly's wings upon its wings the magic word "Commonwealth." The King has used the term.

In order that the feeling of adolescence which was permeating the little young countries might not be fettered by the weighty chains of Empire, the lighter bonds of Commonwealth were imposed.

The evolution has come so gradually that the state of Commonwealth membership has slipped unnoticed upon our national life. The King's oaths of the British Commonwealth have scarcely realized the change which has come over them, but have continued the even tenor of their way oblivious of their political manumission.

The significance of the term "Commonwealth" appears to have been overlooked. A few theorize over it and derive from it conclusions to confirm their own political views. The true significance of the word is "Wealth of the People." The Romans called it "Res Publica," but that might mean "public." The King has used the term "Commonwealth," and he can do no wrong.

Whoever invented the term seems to have played a shabby trick on the hard-Imperialists. To have substituted a Res Publica for an Empire was, to say the least, taking a little liberty; but what is the difference in name when the substance is the same?

Imperialists may quote the British North America Act to prove that Canada is still a colony. By it, they establish that she is bound by laws to Downing Street, yet, Canada is freer than India—and India is an Empire.

The chains which bind together the British Nations have this long been rusted through. They still exist, but their usefulness is gone. In their place there is the silken web spun by the bonds of common interest and common loyalty.

Recently in England members of the Radical wing of the Labour Party had become imbued with the doctrines of Internationalism, who were unable to realize the reasons which their indiscretions had caused, openly spoke of the prospect of abolishing the Crown and Monarchy, and substituting a "modern" or more "democratic" form of administration. These people were unfortunately ignorant of the fact that Great Britain is the de facto monarch of the world, and would dethrone the King and set up a republic in his stead without regard for the consequences to the other sister Nations who form the Commonwealth. Even if the people of England and Scotland were unanimous in favour of such a change, what allegiance would any Indian, Australian, or even Irishman owe to some blatant opportunist who might be chosen or proclaimed President of Britain? If such a change of affairs should ever take place—and some Englishmen do hope for it—Britain herself would have to withdraw from the Commonwealth, and return to the isolation of a fifth rate nation. The Commonwealth would continue to grow and prosper, but its selfsame King, domiciled in London, would be a mere figurehead.

The dream of Proletariat supremacy over the British Empire is a materialist, what right would it have to choose the one who would head the former Empire? Such a change of things would be most unjust.

These radicals do not seem to realize that the British Commonwealth is not even an English Power. It is neither a Christian Power, nor a "white" Power—the vast majority of its subjects are of dark complexion, and the overwhelming religion is that of Islam.

In the Commonwealth should develop republican tendencies, the component parts would have the democratic right of jointly choosing the one to preside over them. The prerogative of choice would certainly not belong to the inhabitants of Britain. The citizen of India would have his voice in the selecting, as well as the man from Canada. The inhabitant of Zululand would be co-equal with his British brother. It is doubtful if even the British Radical Labour element would relish the sight of a "President" of the British Republic newly arrived from Central Africa, Hong Kong or Calcutta established in Buckingham Palace directing the destinies of the former far-flung Empire. Yet, one condition entails the other: in the brotherhood of Republican Democracy. There is no reason why the Caliphate of the Mohammedan world should be in Bagdad, Cairo or Angora when London is the centre of the Islamic Empire, and when it might well adorn the shoulders of the one who presides over the destinies of that Empire.

It requires an enthusiastic democrat ever to picture the British Commonwealth ruled by other than a Royal Crown. Crowns may no longer be worn in many countries, yet, they are the very life of others. In lands whose people are sorely lacking in the bonds of a common interest, the cementing of a common loyalty is necessary to bind them together. This is the case with the British Commonwealth. Outside of the bonds of common citizenship, Canada has little in common with India. New Zealand and Rhodesia are as far apart as the poles. Yet, they are all closely held together by one strong tie, the bond of loyalty to a common King.

The British North America Act was the instrument which united the Provinces of North America. It was the seal which was placed on a mutual

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agreement, and it defined the powers which the new Dominion might exercise at that time. It is broad enough to allow of liberal interpretation. When it was drafted, no British or Canadian statesman ever dreamed of a Canadian Minister to Washington or of a Canadian Plenipotentiary signing a treaty with a foreign Power. It has come through the evolution of adolescence, and still remains the certificate of Canada's liberty.

The Island of Britain is mistress of her own destinies, but she is not the mistress of the British Commonwealth. The politicians of England may talk for England, but the same moral obligation rests upon them as rests upon the smallest Country in the Commonwealth; to do nothing that would in any way injure the cohesion of the whole.

The Crown alone is the tie which binds together the sister Nations. The common interests are not great enough to hold together the British Family without the bond of common loyalty.

To-day the free Nations of the British Commonwealth from the arch upon rests Justice and Liberty. The keystone of that arch is the King. Without that stone, the arch must fall, and ruin will be where glory stood.—The Listening Post.

Holy Father's Health is Good

SAYS CARDINAL MUNDELEIN IN CORRECTING UNTRUEFUL REPORT.

ROME—Reports to the effect that the Pope is in poor health were controverted in an interview, given to the N.C.W.C. News Service by Cardinal Mundelein of Chicago after he had had a special audience with the Holy Father.

"Anyone who says that the Pope is suffering and tired, is saying something that is untrue," the Cardinal said. "I met the Pope when he had just returned from an hour and a half walk in the Vatican Gardens. He was fresh and vigorous, and spoke with youthful energy, precision and clearness, and with greatest kindness."

Further discussing his audience with the Pope, Cardinal Mundelein said: "When, about twenty years ago, I was received by Pius X., I had the deepest impression of that Pope's kindness, and I believed it would not be possible to receive a similar impression again. Now, however, that impression has been surpassed by the extraordinary kind welcome by Pius XI."

Currents That Send Ships Ashore

Hitherto unsuspected facts about ocean currents, knowledge of which may prevent many shipwrecks along our coasts, have been brought to light in recent investigations by the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey, according to Lt.-Com. G. T. Rude, Chief of the Division of Tides and Currents of that bureau. Says Science Service's Daily Service News Bulletin (Washington): "Contrary to the belief of mariners, a local wind creates a current setting not in its own direction, but in a direction about fifteen degrees to the right of the wind on the Pacific coast and about twenty degrees to the right on the Atlantic Coast, a long series of observations have shown. The importance of this, Commander Rude explained, lies in the fact that a wind blowing parallel with the coast produces a current which may tend to set a coastwise vessel on shore. For example, a vessel bound up the Pacific coast with a following 60-mile wind will overrun her log, due to wind-driven current alone, by one and one-tenth knots per hour, and be set in toward the land fifteen degrees on the average to the right of the wind direction. While from Ekman's theory a deflection to the right in the northern hemisphere is to be expected from theoretical considerations, due to the earth's rotation on its axis, it is modified along the coasts by the configuration of the bottom friction, and the form of the coastline. Therefore, while a general law may be given of the general current produced by any given wind velocity, observations are necessary at intervals along the coast, particularly well inshore, to determine the actual velocities for that particular locality. On sailing lines for coastwise navigation, however, the general law will hold with sufficient accuracy for practical results within five to twenty miles offshore. It has been found," Commander Rude said, "that the velocity of the wind-driven current varies fairly proportionately with the wind velocity, and is about two per cent. in knots of the wind velocity in miles per hour on the Pacific coast, and one and a half per cent. on the Atlantic coast. In practice, however, it is necessary to take into consideration the combination of this wind-driven current with the periodic tidal current, the direction of which changes constantly in a rotary movement. The velocities of this type of current vary with the changing phases of the moon on the Atlantic coast, while on the Pacific coast the principal variation in velocity is due to inequalities

It Has Happened Before

STUART ENGLAND HAD OUR PROBLEMS.

Miss Mary Coate's entertaining book, "Social Life in Stuart England" proves that there is nothing new in our social troubles of to-day. They were all familiar to our forefathers under the Stuarts. Take unemployment:

A modern authority estimates the number of men thrown out of employment by enclosures from 1455 to 1637 at 34,000, and he considers the proportion, small out of a total population of about 3,000,000, but if the number was small, the bitterness was great and widespread.

Or take housing? Shortage of cottages was another very real grievance, for, in spite of frequent proclamations from the State, many landlords refused to repair their cottages. Shortage of houses and low wages helped to perpetuate the patriarchal system by which the farmer boarded the unmarried men and maids in his employ.

Or, again, take the neglect of the men "broke in our wars": As a contemporary declares, the case of maimed and destitute soldiers was hard: "Men that have ventured their limbs in our behalf. . . are thus required, when they come home to live by some labour in their natural country, every man sayeth, 'We will not be troubled with their service.'"

Miss Coate's book may be warmly recommended to all. It has some excellent illustrations, and is a work of real scholarship and research.

THOSE HIDDEN PERSONALITIES.



Do you remember the old saying that an institution is a lengthened shadow of one man?

Long ago I first heard that and thought how wonderful it would be to be great enough to have a shadow that should stretch out across the years and touch many people who had never heard of me.

It has been borne in upon me since then, that you do not have to be great to have your personality embody itself in a way that shall make many people feel you without ever having heard of you.

The Wonderful Hat Buyer.

There is a certain shop to which everyone in the big city near which I was born used to go for their hats if they could afford it. To say your hat was bought at R's meant something. Yet there were many other shops as expensive. Furthermore, there were many other departments at R's and the goods in them did not have the distinction of the hats. One day I met a woman who knew a good deal about merchandising and she told me about the wonderful buyer of hats at R's. "She has the most uncanny flair for getting the smart thing," she said to me, "there isn't another woman like her in the city." And so it was that the lengthened shadow of that personality made itself felt in the popularity of her department, despite the fact that 99 per cent. of her patrons had never heard of her and, accepting the shop in the unthinkable way most of us accept such service as if it were a sort of mechanical affair, scarcely realized that she existed.

The Man Behind.

A public speaker, whom I know, always seems to have the cleverest and most whimsical little jests to fit in at the right spot. One day he told me that he got a good many of them from the C. R., naming a religious paper. "There's something about their exchange column," he said, "that's entirely different from other exchange columns. I don't know just why it is." The answer to that is simple enough. The editor of that column is not satisfied to clip just carelessly. He has the same material to draw from as other exchange editors, but he evidently has a very keen sense of humor, and that part of his personality has made itself felt in spite of the fact that his name is unknown and his existence only vaguely apprehended by those who read his column.

He Creates the Atmosphere.

There is a certain hotel to which I always like to go when I go to the big city because there is an atmosphere of friendliness and welcome. Back of the staff of that hotel is a man with a friendly genial personality, and it makes itself felt in the atmosphere that fills his house.

"If a man can write a better book, preach a better sermon, or make a better mousetrap than his neighbor, though his hut be in the forest, the world will make a beaten path to his door," said Emerson. I don't know about the world making a beaten path to his door. The world generally prefers to follow beaten paths rather than make them. But I do believe that any such force of personality, any such struggle toward perfection, will make itself felt, even if the world doesn't ever trace out the individuality behind the force.

Perhaps even now your personality is throwing such a far reaching and beneficent shadow.

VIEWING WITH ALARM.

These are truly perilous times and forever worse they grow, still we read of sins and crimes in the places high and low; bandits shoot us for a cent; in the halls of government every day some weeping gentleman springs another tale of woe. Drearly we read our hair as we read the daily news, and we cry in our despair, "Does the race its conscience lose? Is there any guy on deck having name without a speck, having fame that's not a wreck, scented not with oil on hooves?" Let's remember as we read that our fears are often vain; let no hallyho stamped people claiming to be sane; there is just as much worth on this good old priceless earth as there was before the birth of this present oily rain. There are statesmen just as white as the world has ever known, public conscience shines as bright as the blamed thing ever shone; righteousness is still alive, though some seven skates or five in their moral blindness strive to acquire the easy bone. If a robber piles a gun for a gullider on a street of honest men; if a grafter plays with oil, breaking all the rules of Hoyle, scores adhere to honest toil and restore our faith again.



Mr. B. B. Stalord who was present offered a belt to be

competed for on the same conditions, for heavyweight wrestling. This generous offer was gratefully received. During the absence from the city of Padre Nangle, Capt. F. Marshall will attend to all the details in connection with the tournament. It is known that there are many in the city training hard for the event and some hard fought contests are anticipated.

CRIGUI ASKED WIFE FOR PERMISSION TO CHALLENGE DUNDEE.

PARIS, April 4.—Madame Etienne Crigui is responsible for the decision of the former featherweight champion of the world to return to the ring. She it was who, last August, after the defeat of her husband at the hands of Johnny Dundee, ruled that he would never fight again. Seven months of the life led by the members of the Paris bourgeoisie worked the change in her attitude toward the ring.

When Gene returned from the Polo Grounds after losing the world's featherweight title to Johnny Dundee and sustaining 35 of the most

punishing rounds ever administered to a fighter, Madame Crigui gave one look at her husband's battered face and shouted "Never again! We will return to Paris and live a retired life."

Crigui had accumulated 2,000,000 francs in Australia and America. He invested the money, rented a little flat and settled down. He met Hobans, the Belgian boxer, as he had given his word he would. All he got out of it was a badly broken hand.

Recently Crigui decided to see the Ledoux-Mascart bout. He took Madame along. At the conclusion of the 20 rounds which brought the title back to the veteran Ledoux, Madame Crigui turned to her husband and said: "My word, Gene, I don't know anything about the fighting game, but I am sure you could beat the two of them a certain night." Crigui replied with slight interest. "I am quite certain I could give Dundee a real fight too. Do you want me to do it?"

"All right, go ahead," she permitted, and then Crigui sought Robert Eugeline, his manager, and told him he was ready to go back to the ring. He already has started training.

"My hand is all right again. I intend to ask Dundee to give me that return match he promised me before we sailed. I think I gave him a good enough battle for the American public to wish to see me get another chance at him." Crigui told the correspondent. "I made no bones about taking him on right after I won the title. I feel I am entitled to another crack at him."

The Passing Hour

USED THE TOE HOLD.

Gardini, the Boston wrestler, won the second fall against Evan (Strangler) Lewis at Philadelphia, by his punishing application of the toe hold. He applied the hold more than a dozen times, and had Lewis in such pain at times that the champion dragged himself out of bounds for protection. When Gardini finally pinned him down with the toe hold, it was five minutes before Lewis could get to his feet. An examination showed that he had been injured, and had to be carried to the dressing-room, a ten minute truce being called meanwhile.

GERMANS WANT DEMPSEY.

Director Wolf, of Berlin, has called Jack Dempsey an offer of \$450,000, plus \$15,000 expenses, for three bouts, one in Berlin, one in London, and the other in Vienna. Dempsey's opponent in Berlin would be the German champion, Samson. Wolf plans to match Dempsey against the British champion in London, while Vienna would see the world's champion against Spalla. There is no opponent in Germany who could stay three rounds with the champion, but Wolf hopes to attract a crowd who would pay big prices merely to see Dempsey in action.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES

EASTER HOLIDAY MAKERS IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, April 21.

Brilliant weather prevailed throughout England for Easter travel records for the last ten years were broken. Transportation companies report twenty thousand persons went to France alone for the holidays.

8,000 EMIGRANTS IN A MONTH.

LONDON, April 21.

Liners sailing from the Clyde in the next fortnight for Canada will carry three thousand emigrants, making over eight thousand sailing from the Clyde ports for Canada since March 15.

AGITATION AGAINST IRAK TREATY.

BAGHDAD, April 21.

Agitation against the acceptance of the Anglo-Irak Treaty, and the subsidiary agreement between Great Britain and Iraq indicates that the constituent assembly will refuse to ratify all pacts, unless they are substantially modified. One main point of the agitators is that Great Britain fails to guarantee Mosul Vilayet will not be surrendered to Turkey.

NO THREAT INTENDED.

WASHINGTON, April 21.

A specific disclaimer of any intent to convey a veiled threat in the use of the phrase "Grave Consequences," in his recent communication to Secretary Hughes, protesting against the Japanese exclusion features of the Immigration Bill as made by Ambassador Hanthorn in his second letter to the secretary were made public by the State Department. Mr. Hughes' letter says in the light of the contents of the original letter and the prevailing friendship, and understanding, between two countries, he had no doubt that the words "Grave Consequences" were to be taken in the same sense "as you have stated, and I was quite sure that it was far from your thoughts to express or imply any other thought."

ARCHBISHOP ROCHE IN MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, April 21.

Returning from New York to Newfoundland, the Right Rev. E. P. Roche, Archbishop of St. John's, arrived in Montreal by motor to-day and will spend two or three days in the city.

ROBBERY OF \$12,000 IN BRONX.

NEW YORK, April 21.

Five nattily dressed young men walked into the back room of Bronx Cigar Store late to-night and held up forty card players, robbed them of money and jewelry, totalling \$12,000, and escaped in a motor car which they found at the curb. The car was the property of one of the card players. Four customers who entered the store to purchase tobacco were also robbed.

PRIME MINISTER SUGGESTS GENERAL ABANDONMENT.

YORK, England, April 21.

Taking Reparation 'Expert' report as a whole and putting it into operation all at once with everybody back of it was the course advocated by Prime Minister Macdonald in addressing a crowded Labor meeting in the Theatre Royal here Saturday. He urged that the Allies should accept Germany's word and advocated her admission into the League of Nations, as another step for bringing peace on the Continent.

BOYCOTT DECLARED.

TOKIO, April 21.

The Japanese Printing Association at a general meeting here has decided to place a boycott on all goods from the state of California.

HONOLULU, April 21.

The Nippon Jiji, local Japanese language paper, received a special despatch from Tokio stating that U.S. Ambassador Woods has cabled President Coolidge asking him to veto the immigration bill.

STRATFORD-ON-AVON, April 21.

Madame Cecilia, the English author and writer of scores of popular romantic tales, died here this morning from an attack of heart trouble. She had been ill recently, but was improving when the fatal seizure came.

PITTSBURG, April 21.

Madame Eleonora Duse, the famous Italian tragedienne, died here this morning at a hotel where she had been confined for two weeks with an attack of influenza. Mme. Duse had been conducting an American tour and attempting with success a return to the stage after twenty years in retirement. She last performed on April 5th.

NEW YORK, April 21.

"Vive Voletead" was the cry among the second and third class passengers on the French liner Paris when she arrived within territorial waters of this port yesterday, and Capt. Murais, instead of throwing "overboard" the excess liquor supply, distributed free five hundred litres of wine, cordials and beer.

Portia to Ply Between Cape Breton and Ancient Colony

WEEKLY SERVICE TO AND FROM BAY OF ISLANDS IS FORECAST—LARGE FREIGHT SHIPMENTS BETWEEN PORTS EXPECTED DURING SUMMER.

NORTH SYDNEY, April 11.—A regular steamship service between this port and Humbermouth and Corner Brook, Newfoundland, will be inaugurated May first by the Newfoundland Government steamer Portia, it was announced at the local office of the Government Steamship Lines to-day.

The Portia will make regular weekly trips on this route during the coming summer and the expectation is that the service will be maintained annually during the season of open navigation in the Straits of Bell Isle and Bay of Islands.

Traffic between this port and Newfoundland, already heavy, is increasing daily, and to-day about thirty-five cars of freight are on hand for transshipment by water to Newfoundland.

S.S. Kyle, the only steamer now in the North Sydney-Newfoundland service, is capable of carrying between ten and twelve cars of freight, according to weight and bulk. The steamer has been making a round trip about every forty-eight hours, but it is not expected on account of train delays in Newfoundland to exceed her regular tri-weekly service.

At the present freight for Newfoundland is arriving by rail at the rate of thirty-five cars a day or thirty-five cars a week, an excess over what the steamer is capable of handling. As the season advances there will be a decline in rail forwardings via this port from Montreal and west, because of the steamer freight services to be inaugurated out of Bay of Islands' ports by the Armstrong, Whitworth Company. On the other hand, eastern and local consignments are expected to increase heavily between this port and Newfoundland is expected to be the largest for many years.

At the present time approximately one in every four cars of freight received here for transshipment to Newfoundland are consigned to the Corner Brook development area, and although this percentage will drop with the opening of river navigation, the present plan of the Newfoundland Government steamships and railways is to augment the traffic between North Sydney and the new port of Corner Brook, by making the port of Humbermouth the distributing point for freight, consigned to outports along the Bell Isle coast and to rail points over a restricted area in the interior.

The diversion of this amount of traffic is expected to relieve the Port aux Basques-North Sydney route of a sufficient amount of traffic to enable the Kyle to maintain a firm average traffic without delays. In addition to the government service between this port and Bay of Islands, as exclusively announced by the Post some weeks ago, the Farquhar Trading Company plans to inaugurate a similar service with their steamer Sable I.

It is not anticipated that the demand for accommodation for general freight will exceed this, but in the event of an unexpected surplus of traffic both the Newfoundland Government and the Farquhar Trading Company are prepared to augment their services to meet the requirements of the trade.—Sydney Post.

Sir Richard Squires Interview With Toronto Globe

The following is the account of the Walker findings given by Sir R. A. Squires to the Toronto Globe. Beneath appears the Globe's comment from which it would appear that the editor has not been unduly impressed by the ex-Premier's opinions.

TORONTO, April 8.
NEWFOUNDLAND'S SHAME.
Sir Richard Squires, former Premier of Newfoundland, who was in Toronto yesterday, told an interviewer that the report of the Royal Commission finding him guilty of corruption was contrary to the evidence, and was from beginning to end "a pure political affair." He professed to be confident that he would regain his former position.

The Commissioner who conducted the investigation is Mr. T. Hollis Walker, K.C., Recorder of Derby, Eng., and his report is a startling story of jobbery and waste. His finding on the first charge throws some light on Government control of the liquor traffic. Mr. John T. Meaney, Acting Liquor Controller of the Colony, made sales of liquor and failed to keep records of all the moneys he received. Certain of these sums were handed over by him (by his own admission) to Miss J. G. Miller, private secretary to Sir Richard Squires. This lady purported to ask for and receive them as loans on his account. In all she got between Nov. 19, 1920, and March 19, 1921, the sum of \$6,905 from Mr. Meaney, who cashed cheques for this amount drawn on the account of Sir Richard Squires at the Bank of Nova Scotia and signed "R. A. Squires per J. G. Miller." In March, 1921, Miss Miller's power of attorney to sign cheques was withdrawn, but she gave IOUs instead and drew \$19,325 between March 19, 1921, and June 20, 1922. Quoting Mr. Walker's report:

These IOUs were all signed by Miss Miller in her name only. I find that the amounts for which they were given were all paid to her by Mr. Meaney in cash and were all taken out of the money of the Department, being proceeds of sales without scripts which ought to have been paid into the Treasury. Nothing has been repaid in respect to these transactions.

I find, further, that the whole of the money paid by Mr. Meaney to Miss Miller was applied by her to the purposes of Sir Richard Squires and for his benefit. Some was paid in to his banking account, some was handed to him personally, and some was used to meet pressing claims against himself or his firm.

The report goes on to say that Sir Richard's account at the Bank of Nova Scotia was withdrawn, notes on which he was personally liable to the extent of \$20,000 were falling due in a short time, and other claims were coming in, and there was a recurring difficulty over the finances of The Daily Star, a political newspaper which was not paying its way and for the upkeep of which he was making himself responsible. The Commissioner expressed the opinion that both Mr. Meaney and Miss Miller regarded the payments as of a temporary character and expected Sir Richard would return the money to the Department. He finds that Sir Richard before he left for Europe authorized Miss Miller to apply to Mr. Meaney for help; that he was kept informed of all the amounts obtained from that source, and that he accepted the use and benefit of over \$20,000 with full knowledge of the facts.

A second charge was even more serious involving the payment of \$4,000 to Sir Richard's account by the Dominion Iron and Steel Company between August and November, 1920, during his absence from the country. They were all transferred from the company's account to that of Sir Richard, chiefly in the form of eight drafts drawn by "R. A. Squires per J. G. Miller," and accepted by Miss Miller's brother, Mr. J. J. Miller, accountant of the company at Bell Island, Newfoundland. At the time negotiations were in progress between the company and the Government concerning the obligations to be imposed upon the company as from Jan. 1, 1920, in a proposed new contract. Sir Richard had told Miller that he was \$80,000 out on the Daily Star and had intimated that his friends welcome help from him or his friends. "In my view," says the commissioner, "the handing over of the Prime Minister of Newfoundland at any time material to this issue could only have been with the hope and object of furthering the prospects of the company by securing his favor, and that the recipient could not fall to realize it."

The findings on other charges, while not imputing personal corruption, reveal methods of administering the public resources—and even public relief funds—so reckless that the Commissioner is moved to indignation. Waste and extravagance in this great office of public trust, he says, are hardly less blameworthy than private dishonesty. He hopes his "sad disclosures" will do something to create a public opinion and a higher public
