Last evening a number of weather-beaten citizens of St. Paul returned from a trip to the Red River country and Manitoba. The party consisted of Capts. Hawkins and C. S. Bunker, Geo. S Acker, Col. Remmy, of New York, and others

whose names have not been ascertained.

The St Paul delegation report themselves as pleased and surprised at the magnificence and fertility of the Red River country, and the trip has been a thoroughly enjoyable one in every respect.

Work on the St Vincent extention of the St Paul and Pacific road has been suspended for the season, the last mem-ber of the engineer's corps returning with the party to St Paul. The track has been laid twenty miles north west of Cooksville or Red Lake Crossing, but trains are not to be run further north than the crossing where they connect
