Town and County News.

PROBABLE.—It is reported that the Rev. I. B. Howard, of Port Hope, will succeed the Rev. E. B. Harper, M. A., in the pastorate of the Wesleyan Church. Mr. Harper will probably go to Port Hope.

The ladies of St. George's Church intend holding a strawberry festival in the Drill Shed on Wednesday evening, the 25th inst., of which due notice will be given.

FOR EUROPE.—Mr. A. W. Launder, M. P. P. for South Grey, has just sailed by the Anchor Line for Europe, on a visit to his family, where they have been staying for some time past.

AT LAST.—We were favored yesterday with a pleasant shower which has gratifiedly tempered the atmosphere and imparted fresh animation to "every green thing." The fall of rain was not heavy enough to injure the growing crops.

A WESLEYAN minister of Indianapolis having righteously got out of patience with his congregation, last Sunday proposed that hereafter instead of repeating the usual benediction, he would say, "Let us put on our overcoats, commence tittering, slip on gloves, grab our hats, look to the Lord, and be dismissed." This minister would have got mad long ago, had he lived in Guelph.

POLL BOOKS STOLEN.—Certain poll books of the Township of Normanby, relating to the late vote on the railway bonus in aid of the extension of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway from Clifford to Durham, were on Thursday last stolen from the post-office at Mount Forest, where they were mailed for the County Clerk. The matter is being investigated by the post-office authorities, and it is to be hoped the guilty parties will be discovered and punished.

THE VESCELIUS SISTERS.—The great musical trio, the Vescelius Sisters will give a vocal and instrumental concert in the Town Hall on Monday, June 9th, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. The universal success which has attended them at all points is the best criterion by which to judge of their ability. We would advise all who can to attend the concert and spare themselves the regrets which are sure follow if they fail to put in an appearance.

LAYING THE FOUNDATION STONE.—The Bishop of Toronto laid the corner stone of St. John's Episcopal Church in Elora, on Tuesday afternoon, assisted by Archdeacon Palmer, Dean Osler and several other clergymen. There was a lunch in the Drill Shed in the afternoon, and a social in the evening with a large attendance and liberal contributions. A confirmation was also held at Elora in the forenoon.

FOR THE OLD COUNTRY.—Mr. Osmund, Agent for the Allan Steamship Line, informs us that he has sold twenty tickets to parties who have left Guelph or its vicinity this week, and who take passage by the Allan Line for the old country. This is the largest number that ever left Guelph in one week, and gives one a good idea of the immense business done by this popular Canadian line of steamers, and of the number of people who are this year paying a visit to Britain.

THE NEW HIBERNIA.—Morris and Howarth's Hibernia opened last night in the Town Hall to a very fair house but merely a shadow to what it must be tonight judging from the flattering impression made on the audience. The company is certainly the most worthy of patronage that has exhibited in Guelph for some time. The paintings are good and Mr. Howarth, the lecturer, is well posted on his subject and adds materially to the interest. The drama "Kitty O'Connor" was well executed and kept the audience in roars of laughter the whole evening. All were well pleased and not a few went away determined to come again and bring their friends with them. Remember the matinee this afternoon at 3:30 p. m., and the exhibition again to-night. SIR G. E. CARTIER'S WILL.—Among other clauses said to be in Sir George Cartier's last will and testament, dated 1865, is one bequeathing a sum of £10 per annum to aid in educating some poor boy of St. Antoine parish, who may be designated by the cure; also £150 to Miss L. Cavillier, to whom is entrusted the care of his daughters; also, it is said to be provided if any one of his daughters marries a relative of his wife's family that one is to be disinherited. If either of his executors should die, they shall be replaced by one related to his wife's family by marriage. This will shortly be proved.

CHALLENGE.—George Brown, the champion sculler at Halifax, has challenged Henry Coulter to row a race at Springfield, Massachusetts, for the championship of America. Pending the acceptance of the challenge, Brown has gone into training on Bedford Basin.

DEDICATION.—The Episcopal Church lately erected in Rothsay was consecrated to divine service on Wednesday by the Bishop of Toronto, several other ministers taking part in the ceremony.

Wellington County Council.

June 4.
The Council met at 9 o'clock, the Warden in the chair. Present 30 members.

The Warden read a petition from Benjamin Hillen, Turnkey of the County Goal, asking for an increase of salary.

The Warden read the following petitions:—From James Wilson, asking that the bridge across the Grand River, near Fergus, and leading into Garafraxa, which has hitherto been kept in repair by himself, be henceforth kept in repair by the County.

By the Reeve of Elora, that incorporation, asking for a grant of \$400 to repair the bridge near Elora, across the Irvine river.

By Mr. Chadwick, from Mr. Nichols, for an increase of salary as Court House keeper.

By the Reeve of Erin, from ratepayers in the Township, for aid to open a portion of the line between the Township of Erin and Caledon.

By Mr. Hamilton, from the Corporation in East Garafraxa, for aid to build a bridge on the 12th con., and cut down a hill.

By Mr. Buschlen, from ratepayers in Arthur, for aid to gravel the road from the village to the station of the T. G. & N. R.

By Mr. Waterson, from ratepayers in Minto, for aid to open up and repair roads in that Township.

By Mr. Rea, from the Township of Franconia, for aid to repair roads, for aid to improve the road between Rockwood and Eden Mills, and to repair the bridge between 6th and 7th cons.

By Mr. Sutherland, from the Township of Maryboro' and Peel, for aid to improve the town line between these Townships, and by ratepayers in Drayton, for aid to gravel a road to the station, and from ratepayers to repair the centre side road in Peel.

By Mr. Hamilton, for aid to build a bridge across the Grand River between East and West Garafraxa.

By Mr. Robb, for aid to build the centre side road in Maryboro', leading to the railway station.

By Mr. Stevenson, from ratepayers in Arthur and Luther, for aid to improve the line between these Townships and Erin.

By the Township of Pilkington, for aid to improve the road which leads from Elora and Salem to Elmira. From the same Township for aid to open the town line between Woolwich and Pilkington.

From ratepayers in West Garafraxa and Luther, for aid to improve the line between these townships. From West Garafraxa, for aid to build bridges between 5th and 6th concessions. From the same, for aid to improve the road between 2nd and 4th cons. of that township. From the same, for aid to repair the side road in between lots 2 and 6.

From the township of Nichol, for aid to reconstruct the bridge across the Grand River at Aboynce.

By Mr. Jolly, from ratepayers in Amaranth, E. Garafraxa, and Luther, for aid to rebuild the bridge leading from the village of Waldemar to the station on the Toronto, Grey & Bruce Railway, and to improve some roads in Amaranth.

By Mr. McManus, from ratepayers in Elora and Maryboro', to improve the town line between these townships.

By Mr. Golden, from the ratepayers in Amaranth, for aid to repair road in 2nd concession.

Mr. McMillan presented an account from James McArthur, of \$12 for compensation for the closing of toll gate on the Hillsboro' and Equestrian Road, by order of the Commission.

By Mr. Flahiff, from ratepayers in Arthur, for aid to complete centre side road in that township, leading into Minto.

From ratepayers in Clifford, asking the Council to incorporate that village, and asking the Council to pass a by-law to that effect.

Moved by Mr. Prain, seconded by Mr. Patterson, that Mr. Mollison be appointed commissioner to take the census of Clifford, and report at the December meeting.

The Council then adjourned till three o'clock.

The Council resumed at three o'clock. The following petitions were read:—

From ratepayers in Maryborough for a grant to improve centre side road in said township.

From ratepayers in Luther for aid to improve the road in the 7th line of said township.

From the Council of Arthur for aid to erect a lock-up in that village.

From ratepayers in Luther and East Garafraxa for aid to repair the road between said townships.

From the Secretary of the Guelph Y. M. C. A., for liberty to conduct religious services in the County Goal on Sundays. Referred to County Property Committee.

The Reeve of Mount Forest presented a copy of a resolution passed by that Council, authorizing him to apply to the Council for a grant of \$150 to improve the road between Wellington and Grey, the Grey County Council having signified their willingness to grant a like amount; also, a copy of a resolution authorizing the Reeve to petition for a grant to improve that part of the gravel road running through the village.

The Warden read accounts from the Deputy Master in Chancery; also, application for a safe to be used in his office.

The Warden read the report of the Commissioners on the Elora and Sauguenay road in the Township of Minto, stating that the bridge at Harrison is in a very unsafe state.

The By-law authorizing the County Treasurer to sell non-resident lands in arrears for taxes was read a third time and passed.

Mr. Chadwick asked if there was any specified time in which the old toll gate houses had to be removed. He referred more particularly to the one on the Guelph road on the town line.

Mr. Darby said it had been sold eighteen months ago, and should have been removed a year ago on the 1st of this month. The Commissioners were instructed to notify the person who bought the building to have it removed forthwith.

The Council then adjourned until tomorrow morning.

Death of an Italian Statesman

London, June 4.—Despatches from Vienna contain no allusion whatever to the reported illness of the Czar near that city. The statements in the special despatch from the Austrian capital to the Standard, previously sent, are, probably, false.

Rome, June 4.—Urbano Rattazzi, the Italian statesman, is dangerously ill.

Richmond, June 4.—Jim Brown, the alleged murderer of the two old ladies, Mrs. Johns and Mrs. Dosier, was captured last night. To-day he confessed the crime. The feeling against him is intense, and it is more than probable that he will be lynched.

St. Louis, June 4.—Mrs. Fore, who was assaulted by her husband to-day, will probably recover.

London, June 5th.—It is reported that the ex-Empress Eugenie is in Paris, and has been there two days.

Madrid, June 4.—The Carlists, by continually interrupting communications between France and Spain, thus rendering it difficult to obtain authentic information, seek to make it appear that they have complete control of the frontier provinces. On the creation of this false impression abroad they base their hopes of successfully launching a loan of one hundred millions. It should be understood that no faith can be placed on their representations in the markets of Europe.

London, June 5.—The London Times urges the immigration of the Chinese to East Africa as a means of bringing about the abolishing of the slave trade.

New York, June 3.—A rumor prevails that the Court of Appeals has given decision adverse to application of Stokes for a new trial.

New York, June 4.—Mr. George McDonald, the Bank of England forger, was taken from Fort Columbus to the Mims, a vessel which sailed at noon. He is in charge of two London police officers.

Penang, Straits of Malacca, June 4.—One of the Dutch men-of-war cruising off the northern shore of Sumatra fired into three British merchant vessels as they were leaving the harbour of Achen.

Fire in Morriston.

The Ontario Bank.

The annual meeting of the Ontario Bank was held at Bowmanville, on Tuesday. A large number of shareholders from different parts of the country were present. The meeting was a most harmonious one. The report of the Directors for the last year was very satisfactory, showing that, after providing for all contingencies, \$75,000 are added to the best account, making the amount at the credit of that account \$375,000. A resolution was unanimously adopted asking the Directors to take steps to obtain by legislation a change in the law providing for the removal of the headquarters. It is generally thought if a change is made Toronto will be the place selected. The following are the Directors for the ensuing year:—Hon. Mr. Simpson, T. N. Gibbs, M. P.; His Excellency Lieut.-Gov. Howland; D. A. McDonald, M. P.; C. S. Gzowski, W. McMurtry, and J. I. Lovekin. At a meeting of the newly-elected Board, Mr. Simpson was elected president, and Mr. Gibbs vice-president.

On the 21st of April a new signal light, placed in the clock tower of the House of Commons at Westminster, was exhibited for the first time. The light was invented by Mr. Wigham of London, and it is said that Professor Tyndall has recommended it for lighthouses. Seven of the same kind are now in use on the Irish coast, and one on the coast of Norfolk.

Common coal gas is burned, but no chimney is needed. The oxygen of the air is brought in contact with the incandescent carbon, which usually passes away in smoke, but which is completely burned by this renewed contact with the oxygen. A smokeless white flame of intense brilliancy is produced. The light is of peculiar whiteness and of great penetrating power. The flash is caused by passing a dioptric lens in front of the light, and thus concentrating it into a single beam. The beam once in a minute traverses an arc of 180°.

One of the advantages of this light is that it expels a permanent light with a dash. The light intensifies for an instant, but never disappears. The inventor proposes that the lantern shall be so constructed that it may be taken in by day, and only pushed out at night through an opening. It is said that this system is not expensive, and that the light can be easily managed.
