YORKVILLE ANNEXATION.

A Sub-Committee appointed to Ascertain the Financial Condition of Each Corporation.

The committees representing the city of Toronto, and the village of Yorkville in regard to the matter of annexation, met in the City hall on Saturday forenoon.

It was finally moved by A. D. Dawson, seconded by Deputy-Reeve Saunders, "That a committee of five be appointed consisting of the mayor, Messrs. Dawson, Clarke, Gibson, and Saunders to enquire into the financial position of the corporations of the city of Toronto and the village of Yorkville and report to the committee at its next meeting."

The sub-committee met immediately after, and arranged to meet on Saturday next at the same hour and to instruct the treasurer to meet and prepare information.

A service was held in the church yesterday afternoon. The pastor, the Rev. Anthony Bilkey, officiated, and the sermon was preached by the Rev. D. J. Macdonnell, who took for his text the words of Mark v: 17; "Think not that I am come to destroy the law, but to fulfill it."
