Bear on the Plum Crop.

From the Dunnville Gaze A correspondent asks : "What will prevent p'ums from rotting on the trees when about three-quarters ripe or grown?" The about three quarters ripe or grown?" The Country Centleman says the rotting is from three gauss wet and warm weather, unfavorable varieties and the sting of the curculio. But we say the curculio has nothing to do with the rotting of the plums, as all that they sting drop off long before they begin to ripen. The mischief is done by large flies, who nite the plums for a sweet morsel, thereby causing them to rot. The only remedy is, when your plums begin to ripen hang a dish of common molasses in each tree and the flies will go to that instead of the plums to sweeten


