

The history of the company as ne has written it is largely correct, but his conclusions lack the fairness that should lie in an unprejudiced appeal for consideration of the project named. No one expects that the company is building a railroad to benefit Bridge town, though a benefit may be derived from its establishment. Railways, when built by private corporations are, we believe, invariably built as speculations, and for the money that may be made out of them. The whole system of subsidizing railways may be wrong, but until governments disconmay be made out of them. 
