

Canadians Made a Great Race for the 10-mile A. A. U. Championship.

Twenty-eight of the record entry of thirty faced the starter for the 10-mile championship of the American Athletic Union, at New York, on Thursday.

A few more years of Liberal rule in Ontario will give the people an experience of direct taxation. The machinery for raising funds by direct taxation has already been supplied by the Legislature. The Government is anticipating that the day is not distant when the people will have to pay Provincial taxes according to the same system as they now pay municipal axes. Clause 131 of the Assessment Act make the necessary provision. It reads as fol

lows:

131.—All moneys assessed, levied and collected, under any act by which the same are made payable to the Treasurer of this Province, or other public officer for the public use of the Province, or for any special purpose or use mentioned in the Act, shall be assessed, levied and collected in the same manner as local rates, and shall be similarly calculated upon the assessments as finally revised, and shall be entered in the collectors' rolls, in separate columns, in the heading whereof shall be designated the purpose of the rate; and the Clerk shall deliver the roll, certified under his hand, to the Collector, on or before the 1st day of October, or such other day as may be prescribed by bylaw of the local municipality.

CALIXTO ASSASSINATED NOV. 15.

pinos-Government Established Under U. S. Sovereignty.

Manila, Dec. 1 .- The steamer Salvador, Very of the United States gunboat Castine. Alvarez and Calixto, who left Luzon some ime ago, and, for the last seven months, had been stirring up the people and winercial depression and the lack of food re mercial depression and the lack of food resulting from the islands' blockade, set the people against the revolutionists, and culminated in the assassination, on Nov. 15, of Calixto, a firebrand and the real leader of the revolution, by Midel, Mayor of the town of Tetuan. Midel, under a pretext, secured Calixto's presence in Tetuan, and, when Calixto was within a distance of 30 yerds from a point where the Mayor's guards were stationed, the latter fired a volley, killing Calixto instantly. Midel at once repaired to the Castine and arranged with Commander Very for the occupation of Zamboanga. Commander Very asked that Datto Mundi, with 500 of his followers, stationed on a neighboring island, come to Zamboanga. The following morning, Midel raised the American flag over Zamboanga, the insurgents offering on resistance, and evacuating the town. The Castine was saluted with 21 guns, and Commander Very landed a hundred bluejackets and took possession of the town and fortifications. Datto Mundi's men arrived in the afternoon. They were armed with wooden shields and swords, and were used on picket duty.

On the afternoon of Nov. 20, Midel call-

on the afternoom of Nov. 20, Midel called a meeting of the local chiefs, who formally deposed Alvarez as leader of the revolutionists in the island, and elected Midel President of the Insular Government established under American sovereignty and con-




