

ference, says the ideal of an officially certified pure milk supply had not geen abandoned as impossible of at-airment, altho the figures were rather discouraging, yet the propaganda would be kept up, but in the mean time pasteurization, which all agreed renders milk fit for use and involves little labor, will be recommended.

Pasteurization simply means to submit the milk to 150 degrees Fanrenheit for 20 minutes, and then lowering it 40 or 45 degrees and maintaining Hastings says pasteurization should be carried out under official supervision. Toronto, he says, is merely a false security, and is no pasteurization at all. Pamphlets will be issued by the commissioners explaining pas-
