



N. Y. STREET RAILWAY SCANDAL.

Justice William J. Gaynor of the New York State Supreme Court, indulged in some plain speaking at Prospect Hall, Brooklyn, on Thursday night over the traction situation in the City of New York. The street car lines are now run by federal receivers, transfers have been withdrawn and the plan is set up that five cents is not a paying rate and that fares must be increased. The justice declared his good set terms that the rapid transit situation in New York has become a crying infamy. "Here in this city," he said, "we have the most valuable street car franchise in the world yet for more than two years our railroads in Manhattan and the Bronx have been in the hands of receivers."

Justice Gaynor denounced the traction financiers who year in and year out for over a generation piled up millions on top of millions in watered stocks and bonds, "until the graft total of such pyramided securities, raised up with the connivance of public officials, reached the astonishing total of \$700,000,000. Think of it," commented the speaker—"600 million of street railways at a cost of \$150,000,000. Why I know trolley roads that are built at \$50,000 a mile. Allowing even \$100,000 a mile and the total cost of reproduction would not exceed \$60,000,000." He cited the Third Avenue Road with its thirty-four miles of track, which is bonded and stocked for \$1,700,000 a mile. And the worst of it is that these stocks and bonds have been unloaded on the public. "Estates have them, widows and orphans have them, but not these avaricious traction barons," declared the plain spoken justice.

It is surprising that in face of disclosures of this kind there should be a steadily growing movement for public ownership and operation of public services. For the New York street-railway scandals are not alone. They are paralleled in their various degrees in every city on the continent which has given its franchise into private control. Over-capitalization created to make a few multi-millionaires at the expense of the people and at the expense of "innocent investors" is the cause of the bankruptcy of the New York street railways and is the reason why the cost of public service is never lowered, no matter how the volume of their business grows. Yet there are public men and there are newspapers that tell the people that the amount of a public service company's capital is of no consequence and has no bearing upon the quality of the service or the price charged for it. What would the street railways of New York be to-day had their capitalization been limited to legitimate expenditure? As Justice Gaynor said if honestly managed they would be making vast profits out of a far lower fare than five cents.

CHEAP HOUSING. About a year ago, Mr. Edison, of electrical fame, promised to enable cheap concrete houses to be supplied and it is now announced that the plans on which he has been engaged are complete. If the results conform to the statements that have been made, houses which cost \$10,000 when built of stone, can be put up in blocks at a cost for each of \$1200. As contemplated by Mr. Edison, each house measures 25 by 30 feet with eight foot front porch and three-foot back steps, will have six rooms and bath, with cellar under entire building provided with boiler, wash tub and coal bin. Walls, roof, porches, bathtubs and laundry tubs will all be of reinforced concrete—only the doors, windows and frames will be of wood and there will be no plaster finish.

According to Mr. Edison, houses of this kind can be finished in a fortnight. It will take four days to set up the moulds, six hours to pour in the concrete, four days for the concrete to harden, and four days to remove the moulds. This is a remarkable feat in the way of housebuilding and if the project stands the test of actual operation, it will come as a boon to masses of the people who find houses with reasonably complete accommodation beyond their means. Experience will show whether the problem of housing the poorer classes can be overcome by this plan and no doubt if so, arrangements will be made providing for the work of construction. This is necessary since the iron moulds required for extensive building cost \$25,000 and the concrete plant \$10,000 more.

The annual tour of inspection by the members of the York County Council to the Industrial Home at Newmarket was made yesterday. The county commissioners, Messrs. Paterson and Hill, acting as chaperons.

The Metropolitan Railway placed one of their large cars at the disposal of the members and Mr. Livingston, representing the railway company, looked well after the comfort of the county members.

The trip up thru the embryo city of North Toronto with its many beautiful residences and air of anticipatory grandeur, and on to the Industrial Home, Aurora and the outskirts of Newmarket was a revelation to them from the south and east. The many expressions of admiration, the condition of the crops on the many magnificent farms skirting the route likewise greatly interested the members. The general consensus of opinion was that while somewhat delayed beyond other years, the outlook generally was all that could be desired fair for an abundant harvest.

Arrived at Muskoka's Corners the party detained and walked up to the Industrial Home, a distance of half a mile. Here they were met by Manager Armitage and Mrs. Armitage and began over the institution. Everything was found in splendid order and the clean comfortable appearance of the inmates, some 70 in number, bears evidence to the efficiency of Mr. and Mrs. Armitage and their staff of attendants. The party afterwards looked over the grounds, some 30 acres in extent, where everything bears the impression of order and thrift.

At the present time 30 inmates are at the home, 23 men and 7 women, since Jan. 1 the death number was 10. The grounds surrounding the buildings present a fine appearance, and altogether the commissioners, Mr. Paterson and Mr. Hill, have just cause for congratulation in the successful and the working of the institution.

The Red Dining Room

THE idea of red for a Dining Room will strike some people as a little trite. So many dining rooms have been treated in reds. But there is such a welcome feeling of warm hospitality about red! It is a human color, so to speak, a hearty, whole-souled color. A red Dining Room is one of our ideals.

The Red we have in mind is not the red you see on so many of the street posters—it is not the red proverbially notorious for enraging cattle or inciting war amongst nations. It is a low-toned red, such as you will see oftenest in the secondary tones of an Oriental Rug. If you have seen the pigment painters call Dragon's Blood you will know the red we mean. Some of the dark red carnations suggest it exactly.

With this red as a basis we transform a cold, bare room into a centre of family life and hospitality. The furniture and the woodwork can be good every-day golden oak. Mahogany would not do, because it could not hold its own with the abundance of red in the decorative treatment. The lines of the furniture may be old-fashioned if you like, or curves and carving to a moderate extent. The walls are to be covered with a small figured, closely-knit pattern running from base board clear to ceiling or cornice. No plate rail this time. The rug should be preferably an Oriental in our stipulated shade of red. You can get the same shade in an Axminster or an approximation in a domestic Oriental. The curtains next the glass might be a red-appliqued net stretched tight against the pane, a pair of ecru Arabian net curtains coming to the floor. Over curtains on brass pole of old-English repp or velvet or velours or Monk's cloth, but of the same red we have described. Contrast other than that which the white table cloth and accessories affords would be inadvisable in this room. Even the table dome for the lights should be of ruby glass.
