

GOAT EATS THE TOWN FUNDS.

Jamestown, Mich.

Grand Rapids, Mich, April 2.—Some time ago John Combs, treasurer of Jamestown, Ottawa County, decided the safest way to keep the township cash was to place it in an iron pot and put it under his house. He thus stowed away \$400 in bills and \$100 in silver. The house, however, had no walls surrounding the wooden supports, and the family goat crawled under and atte the township's entire stock of greenbacks. One of the children saw him in the back yard gibbling at a silver dollar, and gave the addrm. Acting upon the advice of his bondsmen, Combs killed the goat. The entire \$400 was found, sadly mutflated. The bills were sent to Washington for redemption, and the Treasury Department has succeeded in identifying about \$130. The bondsmen will have to pay the rest.

The Japanese and Opium.

The Japanese, unlike their Chinese neighbors, have a horror of opium smoking. In Japan it is a crime, punisiable by a heavy fine and a long imprisonment. It is a crime to sell opium or smoking apparatus, and the only piaces where the drug can be purchased, or where a person may smoke, are on the foreign reservations under the protection of a foreign flag. The opium dens in Yokohama, Kobe, Nagasaki and other cities are all found in the German, French and English concessions, where the Japanese have no jurisdiction. When the Japanese how no jurisdiction. When the Japanese took possession of Formosa, which was ceded by China to Japan as a part of the price of peace, they found a serious problem in the prevalence of opium smoking among the natives and Chinese residents, who are numerous. After the trial of various methods, the Government has finally adopted a rather novel policy to repress and regulate the vice. It requires every opium smoker to purchase a license from the Government by the payment of a fee, and permits indulgence in the vice within certain limits of the city, which will result in the colonization of opium smokers. Physicians and druggists alone are permitted to buy and sell the drug, and they are required to take out licenses and pay heavy fees for the privilege. Any violation of this law is punished by imprisonment with hard labor for a term not exceeding 5000 yen. In the districts set apart for indulgence in the vice opium smoking houses may be opened for the accommodation of strangers or persons who do not care to smoke on their own premises. These houses are subject to strict regulations, and every time they harbor a customer who does not have a permit to smoke opium the proprietor is liable to a fine of 3000 yen and imprisonment for eleven years.

The Arena on the Catholic Question.

Mr. F. Clement Brown, M.A., of this city, has an interesting article in the April number of The Arena on "The Catholic Question in Canada." Mr. Brown comes to the conclusion that the people of Quebec are ranging themselves on two sides, one for progress and individual freedom, and the other for retrogression and intellectual slavery. A struggle sooner or later is bound to come, and Mr. Brown predicts for Canada "a long period of strife and religious animosity." unless the Roman Catholic authorities abandon their contention of the supremacy of the clurch over the State. Mr. George Stewart also contributes an article on the same subject.


A Noble Missionary.

Work of Diplomatists. The diplomatists of Europe have laid their plans in cold-blooded disregard of two important factors—human nature and national sentiment; and in this unfortunate line of conduct they have been encouraged by the overwhelming metfority of the foreign newspaper correspondents in Athens. I impute no bad faith to these centlemen. Some of them, to my personal knowledge, have pot had a free hand, and have actually been admonished from headquarters to say nothing against Turkey; not to write foo gravely of the situation, not to exaggerate the intensity of public excitement, and so forth. But the result is the same; the foreign public is only just beginning to understand that the Hellenle uprising is something far beyond the control of the Greek King or Government, even if the King and Government dared to make any attempt at its suppression. It is not the outcrop of spasmodic agitation. It is a formidable growth fostered by years of bitterness. Ever since Greece was declared a sovereign and independent kingdom by the Second Protocol of London, in the year 1830. Turkish misrule in Crete has been an eyesore to her people, and Cretan troubles have been a cruel drain on her resources. Even the Mussulmans of Crete are largely the descendants of lapsed Christians, who embraced Islam for wordly objects; but the Cretan Christians are bound to the Greeks by every possible kinship of race, language and religion.

A Terrible Record.

For the seventh time, within about 30 years, thousands upon thousands of Cretan Christians have flown for dear life and honor to the shores of Greece—and it has been once too often. A leading banker in Athens has assured me that the Greek money subscribed during those 30 years for the relief and protection of the Cretan Christian hearts. At the invitation of Mme. 

AT OSGOODE HALL. A Suit Over the Proposal of Kingsville Council to Bore for Gas—No Contract

With Mr. Simpsen. The corporation of the Village of Kings ville is quite an honorable one. Unlike the Mayor and Corporation of Hamlin, who refused to pay the pled piper, the corpora tion of Kingsville is quite willing to carry out its contract with Mr. Simpson to pay him \$1700 for boring for natural gas part of lot 7, in the first concession of the Township of Gosfield South. Mr. Simpson has bored down 300 feet, and if gas in sufficient quantity is struck the Village lighted village on earth. But Mr. Wigle, a ratepayer of the village, objects. In his action for an injunction he alleges that the council passed bylaw No. 141 to raise \$18,230 to mine for the gas to supply the village, but, as that is the whole scope of the bylaw, there is no authority to contract with Mr. Simpson. Mr. Justice Ferguson has given judgment upholding his contention. The learned Judge decides that under sections 282 and 288 of the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1892, a councillor can only act by properly executed bylaw, and that the resolution of the council, subsequently passed, to enable the corporation to contract with Mr. Simpson, is not a bylaw, nor does it profess to be one, nor is it properly executed, and, as the contract with Mr. Simpson is not within the scope of bylaw 141, it is invalid, and the injunction asked for should be made perpetual.
