A GREETING AND FAREWELL.

To the Members and Adherents of St. James Square Church :

A deep and tender interest is quickened within me as I pen this year a preface for the ANNUAL REPORT of the congregation : for I foresee that I am discharging this duty for the last time. In a few weeks, in accordance with the understanding arrived at when I became your pastor, the Presbytery of Toronto will take the necessary steps to release me from my charge, and a quite unexpected but most memorable episode in my life will have reached its conclusion.

I would be false to my profoundest convictions if I did not acknowledge the good I have received myself, during these years, while I have been seeking to serve others. I shall never cease to be grateful that an opportunity to labor among you was not only presented but accepted. I have not shunned to declare unto you all the counsel of God, and you have received the Gospel from my lips reverently and thoughtfully.

Perhaps it is not unfitting, in the circumstances, that I should indulge myself in willing retrospect. During the period of my pastorate, I have been cheered not a little by being permitted to receive into Christian fellowship 389 persons, of whom 117 united with us on confession of their faith in Christ. I have baptized fifty-one persons, of whom six were adults. I have performed the marriage service twenty-three times, and have conducted sixty-two funerals. The record is brief, but how condensed in meaning likewise! How much of hope and sorrow are wrapped up within these few bald statistics! And how many are omitted from this

enumeration, to whom I have often spoken of the Master, and for whose spiritual welfare I have earnestly striven,—perhaps not wholly in vain!

During the year that has just closed, our Communion Roll shows a decrease for the first time since I became your minister. How this unlooked-for result came about is fully explained in the report of the Session; nevertheless I profoundly regret it. If it should serve to draw attention to the fact that the thermometer of congregational life is exceedingly sensitive, especially in communities whence the residential population is steadily moving away, and that no church quickens its pace (or even merely maintains its pace) of its own momentum, some good will have been accomplished. During my pastorate, our roll has gradually risen from 529 to 915; but the unbroken stream of withdrawals has numbered, within the same period, no fewer than 340. Only by incessant labor has this constant leakage been met and overcome.

I congratulate you heartily upon the splendid financial showing of the past year; it is a long time since the measure of your abounding liberality reached the high level of 1899. It is true that the managers report a considerable deficit, but they had to include in their accounts this year items which aggregate over \$800 which do not properly belong to ordinary revenue and expenditure. In point of fact, your giving during the twelve months just past was larger than usual; but several extraordinary expenses had to be discharged. Happily you are not likely to confront any deficits in the future, seeing that your interest account is about to disappear. The Missionary Association's funds show indeed a real shrinkage during 1899, due chiefly to the uncertainty which has since led to the discontinuance of the MacGillivray Fund. And there is another explanation, not to be overlooked: several of the most liberal benefactors of the Association have lately been taken away by death, and some of these places still remain vacant! Who will volunteer to occupy without delay these honorable outposts?

And what shall I say touching the loyal help you have

just rendered to the Furnishing Fund and to the Century Fund? To commend your untiring efforts in words of honest praise is to say little. To have completed the re-fitting of your church building, to have removed the debt of \$15,000 that rested upon it, and to have provided \$10,000 for advancing the interests of Christ's Kingdom in Canada and the regions beyond,—and to have done all this within a year, and whilst meeting regularly, your ordinary obligations,—seems altogether too good to be true. Surely the courage and self-denial that faced, and so quickly resolved *this* problem, may look with confidence towards the future. It will ever be a joy to me to recall that, for six years at least, I was placed at the head of so indomitable a people. I am sure you will continue to carry forward this great Century Fund enterprise under control of the spirit which has inspired you since its beginning—until, passing considerably the goal of \$25,000, you shall crown your work with a success which in turn will inspire others.

With those of you who mourn I sincerely sorrow, as I am now about to say “good-bye.” How very often, of late, we have uttered that unwilling word! and how much that “farewell” has meant for very many of us, both then and since! Tenderest ties, joining us alike to the very aged and to the very young, have (often quite inscrutably) been severed: in two cases, *both* parents have been summoned away within the interval of only a few months; and, for some of us, the whole look of things now seems altered. God Himself comfort you, my people, out of His infinite compassions.

And now you and I are to part! It was my hope that, by postponing for a little my intended resignation, you might have secured my successor before I left you. This hope, unfortunately, has not been fulfilled: but, even whilst thus waiting, we have not been idle,—the mortgage on the church has been lifted. In this way, before I go to my new undertaking, an additional and most pleasant link of association has been forged, and will serve to strengthen our still-continuing unity. Helpers hitherto of one another, in many a work of

faith and labor of love, memory at least will contrive to keep us one. This closing year of the old century sees our different ways beginning to diverge, and its sunset will find us separated by a broad intervening sea; yet we shall remain one in Him! May He, from whom no one of us is to be parted, watch between us when we are absent one from the other. May He keep us in His love. In the coming century,—yonder, if not here,—we shall meet again.

LETTER OF RESIGNATION.

TORONTO, January 18th, 1900.

To the Moderator, the Presbytery of Toronto :

DEAR SIR,—The time has at length come when I feel free to place in your hands my resignation of the pastoral charge of St. James Square Church.

It will be remembered that, prior to my acceptance of the call which brought me to Toronto, I declared very frankly to the Presbytery, as also to the office-bearers of St. James Square Church, that it was my fixed purpose to resume before long my studies in Comparative Religion. It was to secure opportunity for the better prosecution of these studies that I resigned the pastorate of Erskine Church, Montreal, in 1890: and it was only under the pressure of an unexpectedly urgent invitation that I was led to undertake again, for a time, the active duties of the ministry.

My experiences in Toronto,—alike as a member of Presbytery, as a pastor, and as a citizen,—have been so congenial, in every way, that I have been tempted to stay far longer than I anticipated; and so I am now found busy in my seventh year of service. But I realize fully that no plea for further delay ought to be entertained; and therefore, having sought to deal conscientiously with the responsibilities which were formally entrusted to me in 1894, I have now to request that I be released from my charge.

It should perhaps be added that the office-bearers of St. James Square Church are aware that this petition is to be laid before the Presbytery, and that they were made acquainted with my resolve fully three months ago, viz., about the middle of October.

I have only further to ask that my resignation be allowed to take effect on Tuesday, March 13th.

ACTION OF THE CONGREGATION.

Copy of a resolution adopted at a meeting of the congregation of St. James Square Presbyterian Church, Toronto, February 28th, 1900.

“The pastor of this congregation, Rev. Louis H. Jordan, B.D., having some months ago intimated his intention of resigning his charge, has now laid his formal resignation before the Presbytery of Toronto, which has cited the Session and congregation to appear at a meeting of the said Presbytery, to be held on the 6th March next.

“In view of the reason given by Mr. Jordan for his resignation, viz.: that he might resume his studies in Comparative Religion, which he relinquished when assuming this pastorate; while deeply regretting the severance of the tie which, for the past six years, has bound us together; and having in remembrance our pastor's faithful and edifying ministrations in the pulpit, his loving and sympathetic care of those in sickness and in trouble, and his earnest efforts in furthering all the interests of this congregation, we believe that, in taking this step, Mr. Jordan has felt it to be his duty,—that, by so doing, he might best serve the Master. Knowing Mr. Jordan's decision to be final, while we part from him with sincere regret, and will follow him in his future work with warmest sympathy and interest, this congregation does not desire to place any obstacle in his way. It therefore instructs its commissioners to offer no objection to the resignation, but requests that it take effect not earlier than the 27th of March next.”

THE ANNUAL MEETING.

Toronto, Wednesday, January 31st, 1900.

The forty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held this evening in the lecture-room.

After devotional exercises, the Pastor, the Rev. L. H. Jordan, B.D., took this his first opportunity of stating to the congregation his reasons for resigning his pastorate. The resignation would be laid before the Presbytery on Tuesday, the 6th of February, and would take effect the 13th of March.

Being anxious that no time should elapse between his departure and the settlement of a new minister, Mr. Jordan stated that if the congregation so desired, he would discharge the duties of Pastor for a few weeks after the above date.

On motion of Mr. Robert Carrie, the Rev. L. H. Jordan, B.D., was elected Chairman of the meeting, and Mr. R. A. Grant was elected Secretary.

Moved by Mr. John Paton, seconded by Mr. Wallace Anderson, that the minutes of the last annual meeting, having been printed in the last annual report of the congregation be taken as read. Carried.

The minutes of the meetings of the congregation held since that date were then read and confirmed.

The report of the Board of Managers and the Treasurer's statement was presented by Mr. Robert Carrie, who moved their adoption, seconded by Mr. R. M. Gray, and after a short discussion the motion was carried.

Ballots were then distributed for the election of Managers, the Chairman appointing Messrs. A. F. Rodger, Alan C. Thompson, F. Qua and R. B. Nelles to act as scrutineers.

Moved by Mr. John Gowans, seconded by Mr. Joseph Henderson, that a vote of thanks be given to the Managers, and especially to the Treasurer, for their services during the past year. Carried.

Moved by Mr. R. C. Steele, seconded by Mr. Wallace Anderson, that the congregation are indebted to the ladies for their successful efforts in behalf of the furnishing fund, and desire to convey their hearty thanks therefor. Carried.

Moved by Mr. George Laidlaw, seconded by Dr. K. C. McIlwraith, that a cordial vote of thanks be given to the Organist and the members of the choir for their services during the past year. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Thomas Woodbridge, seconded by Mr. T. R. Bain, that the Rev. L. H. Jordan, B.D., and Messrs. W. E. Long, R. M. Gray and R. A. Grant be appointed to attend to the publishing of the annual reports of the congregation. Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. D. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Robert Carrie, that Messrs. W. M. Douglas and W. A. Cameron be appointed auditors for the ensuing year. Carried.

The Scrutineers reported the election of the following as Managers:—W. D. McIntosh, Alexander Nairn, James Buik, T. R. Bain, John Paton, James Watt and John W. Kerr.

The report of the Session was presented by the Rev. Mr. Jordan:—

During the year there had been 41 additions to the roll, and 71 names had been removed for various causes, the number on the roll now being 578. The report made reference to the death of the Rev. Dr. King and Rev. Dr. Kellogg, and others, long connected with the congregation, and again urged an early increase in the number of the Session.

The report of the Sabbath School was presented by the Superintendent, Mr. Wallace Anderson. The number on the roll is 134, of whom 41 come from families not belonging to this congregation. The school has 19 teachers, and gave \$170.21 for missions during the year.

The report of the Missionary Association, presented by the

Treasurer, Mr. Joseph Henderson, showed total contributions during the year of \$3061.89, of which \$500.24 was for the MacGillivray fund. After deducting what was specially designated, the report recommended how the moneys should be apportioned.

On motion of Mr. Henderson, seconded by Mr. W. D. McIntosh, the report was received, its recommendations adopted, the thanks of the congregation were given to the lady collectors, and the following officers elected for the ensuing year:—

The Treasurer of the Poor Fund, Mr. W. E. Long, reported contributions during the year of \$199.74. \$180.59 had been disbursed, leaving a balance on hand of \$19.24.

In regard to the Century Fund, the Chairman announced that the total subscriptions at this date were \$22,392.29, of which \$9,345 was apportioned to the common fund and \$13,046 to the debt fund. And there had been paid \$4,509.49, of which \$3,003.80 was for the debt fund and \$1,505.69 was for the common fund.

The Chairman also reported on behalf of the Ladies' Furnishing Committee. The balance on hand from last year was \$190.35. There was collected during 1899 the sum of \$1,075.95 and expended the sum of \$1,176.88, leaving a balance on hand

of \$89.42, which had been handed to the Treasurer, Mr. R. M. Gray.

The report of the Wayside Gatherers' Mission Band was presented by Mr. Wallace Anderson, who stated that the year had been one of much interest and useful work. The receipts were \$36.54, exclusive of the clothing sent to the North-West, valued at \$5.07.

Dr. Hume presented the report of the Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, which showed a good average attendance, liberal contributions, and an increasing interest on the part of the members. The total contributions had been \$210.50.

The report of the Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary, presented by Mr. W. E. Long, stated that the membership was 94, and that two new life-members had been elected during the year. The monthly meetings had been of special interest, and the total contributions had been \$337.52.

The Young People's Institute presented their report through Dr. K. C. McIlwraith. Several very enjoyable musical and literary evenings had been spent, and they expected to have several more during the present winter.

In the absence of the Organist, Dr. Anderson, Mr. W. A. Douglas reported for the Choir. The meetings for practice had been well attended, and all the members took a deep interest in their work.

After a vote of thanks to the Chairman and Secretary, and a few closing remarks by the Chairman, the business meeting came to an end, and those present were served with refreshments by the ladies.



THE SESSION'S REPORT.

At the close of another year, it is desirable to recall and record such incidents of importance as properly came under the review of the Session during the past twelve months.

THE COMMUNION ROLL.

The following statistics reveal, in the briefest possible form, the present numerical strength of the membership of the congregation.

It must be confessed that the foregoing exhibit is an unwelcome one. For the first time in the course of the present pastorate, a decrease in the membership has to be reported; and were it not possible satisfactorily to explain this decrease, there would be need indeed of much searching of heart. But this loss can be very easily accounted for. The number of names removed from the Roll during 1899 was unusually large,—due partly to unprecedented losses by death, but especially to the fact that the Session have erased from the Roll the names of a large number who for a considerable time have been irregular in their observance of the Lord's Supper. A living church demands a living, active, aggressive membership. On the other hand, while the additions by profession have been fully up to the average, the additions by

certificate during 1899 have been less than one-half the usual number,—one explanation being, no doubt, the prospective resignation of the Pastor of the congregation. For the reason just mentioned, moreover, some who live at a distance from the church have concluded to withdraw their certificate of membership, deeming the present occasion to be a fitting time at which to take a step which they had already contemplated. There is no doubt, however, that when the congregation secures its new minister, this temporary decrease will speedily disappear, and the Roll will begin to advance as heretofore by regular annual increase.

THE POOR FUND.

The amount placed in the hands of the Treasurer, as the result of the four communion Sunday offerings, has been \$105.59. There were, besides, some special donations to the fund, which brought the total up to \$165.59. If the suggestion made in our last report were but kept in mind, viz.: that this Fund could be made much more effective in relieving cases of need if the quarterly offerings were slightly increased, the Treasurer and the prospective beneficiaries would alike feel grateful.

RESIGNATION OF ELDERS.

Two members of the Session have felt constrained to send in their resignations during the past year,—Mr. William Gordon, who was inducted on April 15th, 1877, and Rev. W. D. Ballantyne, who was inducted on October 21st, 1894. In both cases, the distance of the Church from the homes of these esteemed helpers seemed to render such action imperative. But, "in labors abundant" whilst they were workers with us, these brethren are certain to be long remembered in the congregation generally, as well as by their former fellow-elders in the Session.

ELECTION OF ADDITIONAL ELDERS.

It was intimated in our last report that, for various reasons, the Session ought to be enlarged without delay.

Accordingly an election was held on April 16th, and five persons were duly chosen; but unfortunately no one of these found it possible to comply with the wish of the congregation. A second election was held on October 1st, and six others were chosen; but, of these, only one consented to serve. Mr. William M. Douglas accordingly was ordained and inducted into the eldership on Sunday, November 26th, and has since rendered excellent service in the district which has been entrusted to his care. It is manifest, however, that, before many months, a new election must be held. Two (and possibly three) of the present elders are likely soon to withdraw, as they find themselves unable any longer to fulfil the duties of their office. It is hoped therefore that, in view of the imperative demand for helpers, no trifling reason will be deemed sufficient to warrant any of those who may shortly be chosen to decline this call to service.

REV. DONALD MACGILLIVRAY, B.D.

At the last General Assembly, which met recently at Hamilton, Rev. Mr. MacGillivray was released from his post in Honan, and was permitted to accept of the invitation he had received from "The Society for the diffusion of Christian and General Knowledge among the Chinese." Becoming one of the agents of that Society, Mr. MacGillivray has now removed to Shanghai. This step had been foreshadowed for some time. Hence at a congregational meeting held on May 31st, it was resolved not to oppose Mr. MacGillivray's desire to enter this larger sphere of work; but, at the same time, it was concluded to be wisest to discontinue Mr. MacGillivray's support, and to transfer the payment of the \$800 per annum (which had hitherto been provided for him) to the maintenance of mission work in the field which he was about to leave. As the result, however, of fuller consideration of the matter, and in terms of a recommendation which was adopted at a congregational meeting held on January 31st, 1900, it has been resolved to abandon the MacGillivray Fund altogether, and to add this "special offering" in future (or, at least, as

much of it as may be forthcoming) to the ordinary revenue of the Missionary Association of the congregation. At the same time Mr. MacGillivray is certainly not forgotten in our prayers. It is our hope that his labors, begun with so much enthusiasm, may be crowned with abundant blessing as regards both himself and others.

THE SABBATH SCHOOL.

This department of the congregation's work has been maintained with vigor during the past year. The former Superintendent, Mr. C. S. McDonald, has found a worthy successor in Mr. Wallace Anderson, who has left nothing undone to promote the best interests of the school. The adult Bible Class,—owing to the inability of the pastor to resume charge of it in September, and the impossibility thus far of securing some other teacher,—has not been in operation for some months, a fact which is sincerely to be regretted. Teachers are also much needed in the Intermediate Department, where those who are willing to devote an hour each Sunday to practical Christian work can be assured that they "will in no wise lose their reward."

THE CHOIR.

Dr. Norman Anderson and the members of the choir continue to render the congregation a service which is rightly held in the highest esteem. The devotional exercises of praise have of late reached a standard of merit which cannot be easily surpassed. The Session, accordingly, count it a pleasure to put on record this expression of their sincere appreciation.

THE TWENTIETH CENTURY FUND.

One of the notable and most pleasing events which distinguish the year just ended has been the launching and practical completion of the Twentieth Century Fund, an undertaking which has been crowned with most encouraging success. A brief history of the inception of this enterprise, and of the way in which it won the ready sympathy of the whole congregation, will be found on a subsequent page of this Report;

but the movement, together with the financial relief which it has secured for the congregation itself, will always be recalled with unmingled satisfaction.

REMOVALS BY DEATH.

After all, however, the outstanding thing,—and the saddest remembrance of the year,—is the series of losses by death which fall to be recorded. In preparing the list which is given elsewhere, some of the most memorable days of the dead year seem verily to live again! It is a list unparalleled in several ways,—not only for its length, but equally for the length of life to which many who are included in it had attained. One, the first mentioned on the record, had reached ninety-six years; another, ninety-one years; another, eighty-eight years; another, eighty-three years; five were taken away at ages lying between seventy and eighty years; seven were found at a point lying between sixty and seventy years. Then several of those whose names come under review were men who had helped to make St. James Square congregation what it is. Not only had they long stood identified with its history, but the offices which they respectively held reveal the rare measure of confidence which they were privileged to enjoy. Following closely upon the death of MR. JOHN Y. REID, (to whom reference was made in our report for 1898, and who served for thirty-seven years as a member of the Session) we read the names of MR. STOBIE, MR. YOUNG, MR. CLARKSON, MR. KERR, MR. ROBERTSON and others. We read also the names of REV. PRINCIPAL KING, who ministered to this congregation as its pastor for twenty years; REV. DR. ORMISTON, who served as Ruling Elder in the first Session that was constituted; MR. ALEXANDER GEMMELL, who was also a member of our first Session, and who served as Ruling Elder for twenty-six years; and REV. DR. KELLOGG, who filled the pastorate of this Church for six years. Is it any wonder that, while we extend sincerest sympathy to the many who mourn these sad and calamitous losses, we ourselves also sincerely mourn!

IN CONCLUSION.

At the close of our last report, allusion was made to the fact that our Moderator had just completed his fifth year of service; it was not then foreseen that his pastorate was so soon to reach its end. Other uncertainties, likewise unforeseen, doubtless await us in the not remote future. May the hope then be expressed, and affectionately urged, that a sentiment of loyalty to Christ and His Church be at this time specially cherished and cultivated; that every member of the congregation strive to come into closer touch with God, with His Word, and with His Spirit; and that prayer be made without ceasing that the great Chief Shepherd may so fulfil the desires of the people of this flock that, before many days, they may be permitted to welcome the face of a pastor whom He would choose,—a wise under-shepherd who shall feed the flock, and lead them through green pastures unto living waters.

THE MANAGERS' REPORT.

While regretting that the past year closes with a considerable deficit in the ordinary revenue, the Board of Managers wish to state that this is accounted for very largely by some items of extraordinary expenditure. During the year the Managers paid the sum of \$326.13 in connection with the heating and recarpeting of the church, in addition to the amount collected by the ladies' committee; and the sum of \$229.60 was paid for renewal of the fire insurance.

The Managers wish to congratulate the congregation, and particularly our pastor, on the success of the Century Fund in St. James Square. It will no doubt soon be in such a position that the interest on the church debt will no longer be a charge on our ordinary revenue.

The Managers also congratulate the congregation on the recarpeting of the church, and express their appreciation of the invaluable assistance given by the ladies' committee in that regard.

It is with the deepest regret that the Managers look forward to the early resignation of Mr. Jordan as minister of this congregation. His efforts to promote all the interests of the congregation have been untiring, and the Managers would

make special mention of the Century Fund and the Furnishing Fund. Both of these have to a very large extent been made successful by his energy and generous assistance. In the pulpit and in every department of congregational work the loss will be deeply felt.

The Managers who retire this year are Messrs. Nairn, Paton, McIntosh, Macdonald, Buik, Bain and Watt, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

There has been much of encouragement, and something of the reverse, in the experience of the Sabbath School during the past year.

Chief among the encouragements, we would note with great gratitude that some of our number have been led to

make decision for Christ and to join themselves to the Church by public confession of Him. It is always a joy to superintendent and teachers to see these evidences of growth.

The faithful allegiance of the older boys and girls is also a matter of satisfaction, and we are glad we have been able to retain their interest.

The superintendent, like his immediate predecessor, has had occasion to regret the loss of good and useful teachers, and at times the efficiency of the school has been impaired by vacancies in our staff which necessitated doubling up classes temporarily,—a step which it is always desirable to avoid. During the year, no less than eight good teachers, from one cause or another, have withdrawn from the work, and their places were not always easily filled. Just at this moment our staff is complete, but it would be of great encouragement to the superintendent did he know of those in the congregation whom he could call upon at brief notice to fill a vacancy, either in a temporary or permanent capacity.

The enrolment of scholars is not large, nor, as it seems to the teachers, is it what it should be. Moreover out of 134 boys and girls in attendance, 41, or nearly one-third, have no connection with this church, nominal or otherwise. Where at all possible, the teachers would appreciate further additions to the classes from among the boys and girls in our own congregation not yet connected with us.

From our financial statement printed elsewhere, it will be seen that the givings of the school for missionary purposes were \$167.20, being \$26.93 more than last year. In addition to the regular collections, two special collections in behalf of the Children's Aid Society and Upper Canada Book and Tract Society were taken up, amounting to \$12.55 and \$6.07 respectively, making the total contributions for all purposes amount to \$185.82.

For certain valid reasons, no picnic was held during this summer; but this departure from precedent may be regarded as quite exceptional.

The annual school festival, however, was celebrated with

the usual enthusiasm on the evening of Friday, 5th January, in the present year.

The library, which is presided over by Messrs. Walter Steele and Edwin Long, continues to be well patronized, despite the age of many of the volumes. The addition of a good selection of new books is highly desirable at the present time.

The superintendent and teachers regret that our Pastor was unable to continue the bible class after April, and that owing to the great difficulty in finding a successor this class has not since met. As a part of the teaching department of our church's work, we deplore the absence of such a class, but hope the ensuing year may see it resumed.

The Missionary Committee have pleasure in presenting their report for 1899.

The amount received by the Treasurer from all sources was \$3,061.89. Of this sum there was received for the McGillivray fund, \$500.24.

After deducting the collections for special purposes and the amounts specially designated, there remains for allocation by the Missionary Association the sum of \$2,047.10, which the committee recommends should be distributed as follows :—

Owing to the fact that Rev. D. MacGillivray had, with the approval of the Foreign Mission Committee, decided to engage in work connected with the Diffusion Society, and had withdrawn from the work in Honan, your committee asked that a meeting of the congregation should be held to consider his future relations to them. At this meeting a resolution was passed, withdrawing from the pledge to contribute \$800 for Mr. MacGillivray's support, but asking the congregation to continue to contribute the sum of \$800 as a special amount towards the funds of the Foreign Mission Committee without designating it for the support of any one missionary. The committee have to report that they have only received \$500 for this special fund.

In view of this, they have been led to again consider the matter, and have decided to recommend to the congregation that the special fund should be discontinued, and that those who have hitherto contributed to it should be urged to increase their regular missionary contributions by the amount formerly given to the MacGillivray fund.

The Committee desire to express their cordial thanks to the lady collectors for their valued services during the year.

In closing our work for another year, we look with grateful, loving hearts to our Heavenly Father who has sustained and guided us, and enabled us to work in faith and labor in love for the advancement of His kingdom. While we have to confess many shortcomings, lack of love to perishing souls, indifference and carelessness in the Master's service, yet we rejoice in many tokens of His goodness towards us as an auxiliary, and as individuals. Our meetings have been held monthly, but were omitted during July and August, as so many of our members were absent from the city. At our

June meeting, Mrs. Knight gave us a very interesting account of work in China; and in November Mrs. Henderson gave a pleasant and graphic description of her visit to the halls of the McAll mission in Paris, France.

The thank-offering meeting in October, which is *the* meeting of the year to many of us, was not so well attended as usual, owing to the wet day; but those who were hindered from coming sent their offerings. Mrs. Smith's address was about work among the women of India, and was much enjoyed. The thank-offering amounted to \$120.65. The total amount contributed by the auxiliary during the year, is \$337.53. Our membership is 94, and two life-members have been added to our roll, Mrs. George Laidlaw and Miss Jessie E. Thornton (Whitby) a baby niece of our late loved President Mrs. Kirkland, the youngest member of our auxiliary and probably of the general society. Four scattered helpers have contributed \$8.10. The decrease in contributions for the Northwest is very noticeable. Last year they amounted in goods to \$21.25, and in money \$3.00. This year goods valued at only \$7.00 were sent in and no money. Twenty-six members have taken part in the programmes of the meetings, and much interest has been shown in the work. We gratefully acknowledge the help given by Mrs. Douglas and Mrs. Woods in leading the service of song. The homes of many of our number have been shadowed by sorrow and bereavement. To three of our members has come the Master's call, and they have gone to be with Him for evermore.

The members of the Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, in reviewing the work for the year just closing, feel that they have cause for gratitude. There have been some discouraging features in the work, but these have been more than compensated for by the encouraging ones. We have lost from various causes several of our members, but those who remain have endeavored to make the loss as small as possible by their work. The good average attendance in a membership of 38, the liberality of the contributions by envelope, and the fact

that twenty of the members have taken part in the meetings, may be cited as proofs of the continued interest in the work.

The regular meetings, of which there were nine, were similar in character to those of previous years. Interesting and instructive papers were read, dealing with Mission work in China, Corea, India, and the New Hebrides. At four of the meetings, part of the time was devoted to making quilts, which with articles made at home comprised a donation for the North West valued at \$56.75.

At successive meetings Miss Gowans, on furlough from China, Mrs. Ross, lately of the Ewart Training Home, and Mrs. McMurrich spoke to us. We are most grateful to these ladies, and also to Mrs. Douglas and Miss Hobson who sang for us.

Two special meetings were held during the year. In October a birthday "At Home" was given, at the residence of Mrs. McCord. In December, at a meeting held at the residence of Mrs. Reid, we had an opportunity of testifying to our love and esteem for our President.

Our thanks are due to all those who, though not members, have so kindly assisted in making our meetings a success, and to the ladies of the Auxiliary who in many ways have helped and encouraged us. To Mrs. McCord and Mrs. Reid we are especially grateful for entertaining the band; and we desire also to thank Mr. and Mrs. Jordan, who have given many proofs of their interest in the work. Mention must also be made of the kindness of "A former member," who sends each year a liberal donation. We regret deeply the loss of Miss Macalister who has held the office of Treasurer for two years. By her removal from the city we lose a very active and faithful worker.

As always, we feel our success to be in large measure due to the efforts of our President, Mrs. Watson, whose devotion to the work, and interest in each member, stimulates us to greater activity.

As we turn the pages of the "Record" of work done during the past year, we cannot but feel grateful for what has been accomplished, inasmuch as not of ourselves alone have we been permitted a measure of success, but by the Spirit of God leading and directing us in study and work.

The year is noted as one of many changes in the membership of our band; and, although almost as strong numerically, we are now wholly a juvenile band, President and Vice-Presidents excepted.

The change is due in part to a number having outgrown juvenile study and work, others to congregational change, and still others were temporary scholars in the Sunday School,

and their interest in the band was also temporary. While regretting the loss of former members, we are glad to report a membership of fifty-eight, being but four less than the preceding year, and all, excepting one, are connected with our congregation.

Such a membership we find to be much more satisfactory,—as it is almost impossible to retain, for any length of time, the interest of those who are not connected with the congregation.

The work done during the year has been chiefly educational, as being pre-eminently the essential part of juvenile missionary work. Therefore, rather more than half of the hour of meeting is given to devotional exercises, business and a study of the subject set apart for each month. In this way the girls are prepared for the senior band, and later for the "Auxiliary." When these items are concluded, all join in some useful work, in which the girls feel they are helping to brighten the lives of distant heathen children in the hospital and home.

Ten meetings have been held with an average attendance of fifteen. The thank-offering meeting was held in June, at which Miss Caven gave a most interesting address; and in December the annual meeting was addressed by Mrs. Stayner, of the Jarvis Street Baptist Church.

A considerable decrease in funds will be observed as compared with the previous year; but, as an exclusively juvenile band, we could not hope to attain to a high financial standing.

In conclusion, we very earnestly ask for the interest and assistance of parents, that there may be regular attendance at each monthly meeting, and that the "Mite Box" at home may be frequently remembered.

The meetings are held on the third Saturday of each month, from 2 to 3 o'clock.



HISTORICAL NOTES.

The first printed ANNUAL REPORT of the Congregation covers the history of its life and work during 1865. An effort was begun some years ago to collect a few complete sets of these REPORTS, in order that they might be bound and preserved for reference when necessary. Almost two full series, thus far, have been secured, but several numbers in each case are still missing. The history of the Congregation, prior to 1865, must be sought in the official *minutes* of the Session and of the Board of Managers.

The Congregation of St. James Square was formed by act of the U. P. Presbytery of Toronto, June 23rd, 1853. This step was the outcome of a Petition, already favorably considered at a meeting of the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church, whereby the Presbytery was urged to organize a second U.P. Congregation in Toronto. The Presbytery granted the prayer of the petitioners, and at the same time it agreed to sanction the invitation extended to Rev. John Taylor, M.D., to act as stated supply of the new Congregation. Dr. Taylor afterwards became the minister of this promising charge, the call addressed to him being signed by thirty members and about fifty adherents.

At the beginning of its history, the Congregation was known as the "Gould Street U. P. Church." For about twenty-five years it worshipped in the structure now occupied by the adherents of the Catholic Apostolic Church, corner of Victoria and Gould Streets. In 1877 the original property

was sold for \$10,000,—which sum, by the way, was exactly the amount paid for the Gerrard Street site. The present structure was at once commenced. On November 17th, 1878, the new Church was formally set apart for the worship of God, Rev. Dr. Taylor, of New York, and Rev. Dr. Jenkins, of Montreal, preaching the opening sermons.

The following ministers have served in the pastorate of the Congregation. The dates set after their respective names indicate the period during which each held office:—

 Rev. Louis H. Jordan, B.D.† Mar. 27, 1894—Mar. 27, 1900.

The Rev. Dr. Taylor spent his later life in Edinburgh, Scotland, where he died October 30th, 1880, in the eightieth year of his age. The Rev. Dr. Burns died in Toronto, August 19th, 1869. The Rev. Dr. King, a tried and trusted leader in our Church in Canada, and who held the important post of Principal of our College in Winnipeg at the time of his death, passed hence, after a brief illness, on March 5th, 1899. The Rev. Dr. Kellogg returned to his missionary labors in India, where, at the same time, he assisted in the re-translation of the Scriptures into Hindi and Urdu. As the result of an accident, just on the eve of his accepting a Professorship in the United States, he was suddenly called away on May 3rd, 1899. The Rev. Mr. Jordan will resign his pastorate in a few weeks, that he may devote some years to making fuller and more exact research in the field of Comparative Religion.

* Dr. Burns, strictly speaking, was not pastor of the congregation, for he was never inducted. He, nevertheless, for a time, discharged the duties of the pastorate, in addition to his professorial work in Knox College.

† Before accepting the pastorate, Mr. Jordan served the Congregation as stated supply from December 3rd, 1893, to March 27th 1894.

ORDINARY REVENUE.

“ Upon the first day of the week, let EVERY ONE of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him.”—1. Cor. xvi. 2.

The Managers derive no revenue from the pews. All the sittings are free, no pew rent being charged to any one.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF ORDINANCES IN ST. JAMES SQUARE CHURCH may be made in one of three ways:—

(1) Weekly Offerings, enclosed in special envelopes and placed on the collection plate each Sabbath.

(2) Quarterly Subscriptions.

(3) Open Contributions, placed upon the collection plate.

The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation; it ought, if possible, to be adopted by all.

The necessary envelopes are given out at the beginning of each quarter, as well as upon the allocation of sittings. Any one not now receiving envelopes, but desiring to contribute in that way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers: and the matter will at once be attended to.

All who occupy sittings are expected to contribute, according to their means, towards meeting the current expenses of the congregation. All alike derive the benefit which accrues from the expenditure of the congregation's funds; ALL, therefore, should aid in raising these funds. All cannot give amounts equally large,—this is neither asked nor expected; but all can give *something*. EVERY ONE who is *in receipt of a regular income*, be it small or great, is in a position to dedicate a portion of it to the Lord. “ Let each man do according as he hath purposed in his heart; and not grudgingly, or of necessity, for God loveth a cheerful giver.”

A record of what has been so quickly accomplished in St. James' Square congregation, in connection with a loyal effort to promote the interests of the Twentieth Century Fund, cannot fail to awaken the enthusiasm of all who read it. Possibly, also, it may be the means of inspiring courage on some future occasion, when other exacting enterprises fall to be undertaken.

When the General Assembly which met at Hamilton in June, 1899, resolved to ask the Presbyterians of Canada to provide a special fund of \$1,000,000,—suggesting that three-fifths of this amount constitute a "Common Fund," and be used in advancing the Church's rapidly increasing work in connection with Missions and Education, while the remaining two-fifths might be devoted to the removal of church debts,—it was never doubted for a moment that St. James Square would cheerfully consent to do its full share in helping to secure these two very desirable ends.

Hence, as soon as the summer vacation was over, the Moderator of Session invited his co-Elders and the Managers to meet together, so that these two Boards might take counsel touching the whole situation. This initial conference occurred on Friday evening, September 15th. It was decided that it would be wise, before passing any tentative resolutions, to feel carefully the pulse of the congregation, and to hold a second joint-meeting at an early convenient date. Accordingly, on Tuesday evening, October 10th, the Provisional Committee of office-bearers met again, when it was reported that three persons had been found who were ready to subscribe amongst them the sum of \$5,250. At a third joint-meeting, held on Monday, October 16th, Rev. Dr. Campbell, General Agent of the Fund, was present by invitation, when various details of the project were more fully explained, and the congregation was formally requested to aim at (at least) \$10,000 for the "Common Fund" section of the Fund. Dr. Campbell then retired; and, after a short further conference, the office-bearers framed and adopted a carefully-worded recommendation. In the terms of this resolution, the plea of Dr. Campbell was con-

curred in; but it was unanimously agreed to ask the congregation to contribute, *in addition*, the sum of \$15,000, so that the debt on the church might be entirely extinguished at the same time. Some felt strongly that so large an undertaking was not likely to result successfully, and should therefore not be attempted; but the majority were yet more strongly persuaded that the occasion was opportune. A Congregational Treasurer was selected, and a small Executive Committee was appointed to make preparations for a general canvass of the congregation; while, in view of the proposed apportionment of the \$25,000 which it was hoped to secure, it was resolved that all *undesigned* subscriptions should be divided on the basis of allotting three-fifths to the Debt Fund and two-fifths to the Common Fund.

The real campaign, however, began on Sunday, November 5th, when the Moderator of Session preached a sermon on the text: "God had prepared the people, for the thing was done suddenly" (II. Chron. xxix., 36). The General Assembly's project was carefully outlined, and the recommendations which the Session and Managers had adopted were recited and emphasized. On the following Wednesday evening (November 8th) a meeting of the congregation was held, and the resolutions of the office-bearers were most cordially passed. On Sunday, November 12th, the weekly leaflet announced that \$9,387.29 had already been promised! The very next evening the Executive Committee met, added considerably to its membership, and appointed several groups of active district canvassers; and from that day to the present, literally *every week* has seen the subscriptions steadily grow, until now—less than four months having elapsed since the movement began—almost the entire amount aimed at has been contributed.

Had this result been achieved within a year, there would have been ground for abundant congratulation; but, in view of the fact that other special appeals, made simultaneously, evoked a generous response, the action of the congregation cannot be too warmly commended. Indeed, the most gratifying features of the whole enterprise have been the marked

spontaneity and liberality which have characterized it from its very inception. The various committees have been painstaking and vigilant. In such ways as seemed desirable, the Fund has been kept constantly under the attention of the congregation. But plainly the people have been a "prepared" people, for they have had a mind to work and to give.

And the end is not yet. Although \$24,100 have thus far been promised, and \$6,300 have been already paid over to the Treasurer, the Fund is not to be closed till May, 1901. Doubtless in this interval, it will be very considerably increased. Some have not found it convenient to make their offering as yet; for they are devising liberal things, and so they have preferred to postpone taking action. Some intend to add to the gift they have already made—possibly to double it—provided business should be as prosperous next year as they at present anticipate. And some, temporarily out of the city, will hasten to contribute their quota as soon as they resume their place and work amongst us.

The list of subscribers to this Fund, herewith annexed, contains also a statement of all *payments* which have been received up to March 8th, 1900. The action of those who have thus early begun to discharge their "promises" is to be strongly recommended. If, in cases where the amount subscribed has not been paid in full, each contributor would comply with the suggestion that instalments be sent regularly each quarter to the Congregational Treasurer, it would insure that remittances could be sent forward at stated periods to Rev. Dr. Warden, the General Treasurer of the Fund.

It is hoped that EVERY MEMBER OF THE CONGREGATION who has not as yet taken some part in this memorial thank-offering to God, in recognition of His abounding mercies to His Church during the closing century, will gratefully embrace the present opportunity before this Century Fund effort shall have been completed. It is very pleasing to note how, in some families of the congregation, every member of the domestic circle, down to the youngest child in it, is included in the list of contributors. This is as it should be, and the

example thus set might well be universally imitated. Moreover, it is desirable that every active organization of the congregation,—the Sabbath School, the Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary, the Mission Bands, the Young People's Institute, etc.—should in some way secure a special offering for this Fund, and so be in a position to make towards it a special grant before the Nineteenth Century reaches its close. The results of such action, both directly and indirectly, it would be impossible to overestimate.

The interests of this Fund will not be neglected, it may safely be predicted, during the coming year. What has been achieved already is encouraging indeed, but past achievement can never be accepted as a substitute for present duty. Now that the debt upon our building has practically disappeared, and the scale of our giving as a congregation has been distinctly increased, the claims of the Kingdom of Christ must be aggressively advanced; and, seeing that all contributions *in excess* of the \$25,000 originally aimed at will be placed at the credit of the "Common Fund," a sufficient incentive to united and large-hearted action is certainly not lacking. It should never be forgotten that the highest happiness is to be found, not in what we accumulate, but in what we willingly bestow upon others. There are other riches, and better riches, than those which are found in the abundance of our temporal things. To deny self is often to win something that self-gratification could never have yielded. To deny self for Jesus' sake is emphatically the Master's commandment.
