The Synod then took up an Overture from the Presbytery of Overture on sub London, of the following tenor, viz :-

Whereas applications are occasionally made for admission to this body of Ministers from Churches in the United States, that are more or less implicated in the sin of slavery; and whereas this Synod has, is the years 1851 and 1853, passed resolutions on the subject of slavery, which it is desirable to have fully carried out, especially in the admission into our Church of Ministers from the United States, it is respectfully overtured by the Presbytery of London to the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, that Presbyteries be enjoined particularly to examine applicants for admission on the subject of slavery, and to be satisfied, before receiving them, that their views accord with those of the Synod as expressed in said resolutions.

Mr. McPherson was heard in support of the Overture, and after discussion, the following resolution, moved by Rev. S. C. Fraser, seconded by Rev. Dr. Willis, was adopted, viz:-

The Synod approve of the overture, and in terms of its suggestions instruct Presbyteries, in dealing with applicants for admission into the Ministry of our Church from the United States, to satisfy themselves respecting the views of such applicants on the resolutions of 1853 anen;

The Synod took up a memorial from the Rev. J. McMurray, Rev. J. McMur- formerly Minister of Brockville, praying to be recognised as still a member of the Presbytery of Brockville, when the following resolution was adopted, viz :-

> The Synod, having taken into consideration the petition of the Rev. J. McMurray, declare that the admission of Ministers without charge to a seat in Presbytery, is not in harmony with the constitution of this Church; and, therefore, they do not deem it proper to grant the prayer of the petition.

> The Synod took up a reference from the Presbytery of Toronto with reference to the status of the Rev. James Rogers, at present residing within the bounds of the Presbytery, and labouring as a Missionary.

> The Synod sustained the reference, and quoad ultra agreed to apply to this case the deliverance given in the case of Mr. McMurray.

College Report.

Resolutions

adopted.

The Synod then called for the Report of the College Commit-The same was given in by Dr. Willis, Convener, and was read. The Synod, after lengthened deliberation on the Report, adopted the following resolutions, viz:-

1. That the College Committee be instructed to adopt measures for bringing the Bursary Fund before the Ministers and congregations of the Church, with the view of sustaining it, as a means of assisting young men in their preparation for the work of the Ministry.

2. That, as regards the tutorship, things remain as heretofore, Mr. Smith being retained for another year as head of the Boarding House, and as tutor; the Committee being empowered to make any other ar-

rangement, should this not be carried into effect.

3. That it shall be the duty of the College Committee to correspond with Presbyteries respecting their mode of superintending students, with the view of securing, as far as possible, the uniform observance throughout the Church of the Synod's arrangements on this head; to obtain from Presbyteries an annual report relative to the students under their inspection, and present a digest of these annually to the Synod; to attend the opening and closing of the Hall, and to receive, and lay before the Synod an annual report regarding the state of the Hall, including the report of the Professors of the means which they have taken to promote the improvement of the students under their inspection. In case, likewise, of the College Committee being satisfied, from the reports of the Professors or from other sources, that it would be unadvisable for a young man to continue to prosecute his studies with a vew to the min stry, it shall be the duty of the Committee to recommend such student to give up his Theological studies, and to betake himself to some other vocation.

That the Synod appove of the suggestions in the report, that, as a general rule, students at College should not be required to go out as catechists, till they have passed the first year of their Divinity course, leaving it to the College Committee to decide on any exceptional calls on their service, and that, during the session, no student should be required to do public Sabb also, any extra d of the Professors

The Synod further authorized the Foreign Mission Committee to take the necessary steps for having Mr. Stevenson's appointment put into his hands, and laid before the Presbytery of which he is a member, with the view of his being released from his Pastoral charge.

Nevertheless inasmuch as the Synod learns that no unfair restraint was laid on the complainant's liberty of speech-that he was refused his seat as a member of Presbytery, only when a finding affecting his own character was being arrived at,—and that no substantial violation of justice was committed in the manner in which the visitation

was conducted-find that there is nothing in the case, so far as it has been submitted to the Synod, which ought to vitiate the procedure of the Presbytery--and this especially, as the procedure itself comes under the review of this Synod by reference from the Presbytery of Toronto.

The Synod then proceeded to take up the following overture from the Presbytery of Montreal on the duties of Elders and Deacons:—

Whereas, it appears that the ancient and scriptural order of Deacons has been revived in this Church, and the formation of Deacon's Courts has been recommended by the Supreme Court. Whereas, also, it is necessary and expedient for the guidance of Churches and office-bearers as well as for the edification and peace of the Church at large, to define and regulate the duties of Elders and Deacons respectively, and to prescribe the powers of the meeting of congregational office-bearers for secular business; it is therefore hereby humbly overtured to the very Reverend the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, by the Presbytery of Montreal, to transmit to Presbyteries, for their consideration, the following rules of procedure:—

I. RESPECTING THE DUTIES OF ELDERS.

1st. That they sit in Session along with the Minister and assist in the administration of discipline, and in the spiritual government of the Church.

2nd. That they take a careful oversight of the people's morals and religious principles, of the attendance upon public ordinances, and of the state of personal and family religion.

3rd. That they visit the sick from time to time in their several dis-

4th. That they superintend the religious instructions of the young, and assist the Minister in ascertaining the qualifications of applicants for admission to church-membership.

5th. That they superintend and promote the formation of meetings within their districts for prayer, reading of the Scriptures, and Christian

fellowship among the members of the Church.

6th. That it belongs to the Session to determine as to the election of Elders and Deacons, whether as regards the time and circumstances where such election may be necessary, or the number of those office-bearers that shall be chosen, and to superintend the whole proceedings therein according to the laws of the Church. It belongs also to the Session to receive and accept the resignation of Deacons.

7th. That while it belongs to the Minister as pastor to summon the congregation together at other times than on the Lord's day, as he may deem expedient, for the purposes of Divine worship, or for edification, still it is necessary that all meetings of the Church for the consideration of congregational matters, should be summoned by authority of the Session, by citation from the pulpit on the Lord's-day previous to the day appointed for such meeting.

8th. The Session shall be convened by the Minister as often as he shall see fit, or at the requisition of two Elders. The citation shall either

be from the pulpit or personally to each member.

9th. Two Elders with the Minister shall be a quorum, and no meeting of Session can be held in the absence of the regular minister; or, in the case of a vacancy, in the absence of the interim Minister appointed by the Presbytery.

II. RESPECTING THE DUTIES WHICH ARE COMMON TO ELDERS AND DEACONS.

1st. The Elders deliberate and vote equally with the Deacons in the Deacons' Court.

2nd. Both Elders and Deacons may receive the Sabbath collections of the people according to such arrangements as may be made by the Deacons' Court. llowing overture Elders and Dea-

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3rd. That for the better discharge of their peculiar duties respectively as well as with a view to increasee usefulness, both Elders and Deacons visit the districts assigned to them.

4th. That it is competent for Elders to discharge all the functions of Deacons, when a sufficient number of Deacons cannot be had.

III. RESPECTING THE PECULIAR DUTIES OF DEACONS.

1st. That they give special regard to the whole revenue and property of the Church.

2nd. That they attend to the gathering of the people's contributions for the support of the Ministry; and that they receive the donations which may be made for other ecclesiastical purposes.

3rd. That they attend to the poor of the Church.

4th. That they watch over the education of the children of the poor. 5th. That they assist the Elders with their advice whether in session rotherwise, when requested so to do.

IV. RESPECTING THE MEETING OF MINISTERS, ELDERS AND DEACONS, FOR THE SECULAR AFFAIRS OF THE CHURCH; WHICH MEETING MAY BE CALLED THE DEACONS' COURT.

let. That the Minister presides in such meeting when he is present, and in his absence any Elder or Deacon whom the meeting may appoint. 2nd. That the Deacons' Court shall take special heed that the ordinary evenue or funds of the Church be exclusively applied to the defraying of he ordinary liabilities and charges; and that for all extraordinary purposes, such as the erection or the repairing of a Church or manse, or the syment of debts on the property, special contributions shall be asked

5. That while the Church is solely at the disposal of the Minister for Il religious purposes, yet the consent of the Deacons' Court as well as the Minister, is necessary before any meeting, not strictly of a religious, celesiastical, or charitable nature, can be held in it

6th. That the said Court shall have one or more Treasurers, and a Clerk; and a separate record for the minutes of its proceedings.

7th. That the records of the Court with the Treasurer's account of rewith the records of the Court with the Freasurer's account of resipts and expenditure, after the same shall have been duly audited by

10th. That while it is inexpedient to sustain complaints or appeal against the ordinary administration of the Deacons' Court in secular and financial affairs, the said Court is nevertheless subject to the review of the Presbytery, in so far as it may take any step, or adopt any resolution which the Presbytery finds to be of a censurable nature, or in violation of any enactment of the Synod.

11th. In those Churches in which as yet there are no Deacons, the Synod would again recommend the Sessions to constitute, as soon as may be Deacons' Courts in their respective Churches. Also, in the meantime and until Deacons shall be elected, the Synod hereby appoints that the above regulations, in so far as they are applicable to Deacons' Courts shall equally apply to the Session, in its administration of the revenue and property of the Church.

12th. While it appears that in some churches it has been found both necessary and expedient, to commit to temporal committees, or trustees or proprietors, the administraton of the secular affairs of the Church yet as these have no place in the scriptural constitution of the Presbyte rian Church, they ought not to receive ecclesiastical sanction as permanent arrangements: nevertheless, in all cases in which Deacons' Court cannot be immediately substituted for such committees, the Synod advises that they conform their precedure to the above rules for the regulation of Deacons' Courts.

The Committee on the examination of students, beg to offer as dents.

their report the following recommendations:-

I. That Presbyteries be enjoined to give attention to the thorough examination of students; and that no student shall be admitted in any year of his Literary or Theological course, to attend the classes in Knox's College, without presenting to the Professors' Court the certificate of the Presbytery by which he has been examined; and further that before a student is examined by a Presbytery, with a view to his receiving the annual certificate, he must have resided for six weeks within the bounds of the Presbytery: unless his own Presbytery testify that he was necessarily prevented from appearing before them-in which case, it shall be competent for a student to be examined by another Presbytery.

II. That the Col ege Committee be instructed to draw out and publish for the guidance of Presbyteries a programme for the examination of students, indicating the attainments required from entrants, also from stu-

dents in the successive years of the curriculum.

III. That Presbyteries be required to report annually to the Synod through the College Committee, on the examination of students within their bounds.

It was agreed to sanction the report and enact according to its recommendations.

REPORT ON PUBLICATION AND COLPORTAGE.

In presenting their Report your Committee eve much pleasure in stating that active and alarged efforts have been displayed by some of he Presbyteries in the distribution of a sound Theological Literature. The Presbyteries of london, Montreal, and Hamilton have had olporteurs employed within their bounds to the umber of 20 and upwards. There are now in he field about 13—of whom several are students Knox's College, who are employing a part of he summer vacation in this good work. Thouands of families have been visited during this eriod, and with the most of these the Colporteurs ave held religious conversations. Books to the umber of many thousands have been sold; hiefly the publications of Nelson & Sons, Carr & Brothers, and the Presbyterian Board of ublication, Philadelphia. In this way much recious seed of the kingJom has already been attered, which may yet bring forth fruit thirtyold. But those more immediately engaged the work, feel increasingly the necessity of a General Board to superintend the conduct and stension thereof. It is however to be distictly nderstood that all the Colporteurs employed by he Board shall be under the direct ecclesiastical pervision of the Presbyteries in whose bounds by are labouring—they beg leave to submit the blowing draft of a Constitution.

raft of a Constitution laid before the Committee of Publication, and Ordered to be Printed and sent to the Members of Committee.

I. THE SYNOD of the Presbyterian Church of lanada, shall superintend and conduct the publication and circulation of religious books, designifor general diffusion among the Churches untrits care. The immediate superintendence of its work shall be entrusted to a Committee appointed for that purpose, to be called the "Board (Publication and Colportage," said Board to be intectly amenable to the Synod.

II. The Synod shall, at its present meeting, lect twelve Ministers and twelve Laymen as members of the Board of Publication and Colporge, who, at their first meeting, shall divide temselves into three classes: the first class of ight members shall serve for one year, the semud for two years, and the third for three years, whe vacancies occuring by the expiration of these terms to be filled up by election, at the annul meeting of the Synod.—Each class after the to first, serving for three years.

III. To this Board, under the direction and instruction of the Synod, shall be entrusted the superintendence of the publication of works pertaining to the History, Discipline, Government, Doctrine, and General Religious Literature of our Church. Also the circulation of similar religious works published by other parties, and shall superintend and conduct the diffusion of such books by Depositories and Colportage.

IV. The Board, at its first meeting after the annual meeting of Synod, shall elect a Secretary, Treasurer, Agent, and Executive Committee, for the ensuing year; the Convener being elected by the Synod, and he, together with the Secretary and Treasurer being (ex-officio) members of the Executive Committee.

V. The Executive Committee shall consist of seven Members, and the duty of said Committee shall be to select books, to examine manuscripts submitted for publication and to superintend the publication of such as may be approved, making all contracts for printing, binding, &c.; to direct the work of colportage, and to take particular direction and management of the whole matters of publication and distribution, subject to the control and direction of the Board.

VI. All property, whether in books, fixtures, or permanent funds, shall be held by the Board, for the use and benefit of the Synod.

VII. The seat of operations shall be in the City of Hamilton, but the Committee shall have power to locate Branch Depositories at any other place which they may deem expedient.

VIII. The financial operations of the Board shall, in all cases, be conducted on cash principles.

MEETING OF THE BOARD.

The Board shall meet statedly on the first Monday of each alternate month, and shall hold an annual meeting on the first Monday of the, month succeeding the annual meeting of Synod. Seven members shall constitute a quorum. Special meetings may be called by the Convener, notice of such meeting to be given to each member of the Board. - § 4. Agent or Superintendent.-The Agent shall take charge of the Depository keeping all the property thereof in good order. He shall take charge of all the publications, receive orders from Colporteurs, Depositories and others, he shall lay before the Executive Committee, at each meeting, all bills and accounts against the scheme, and debts, and see that the books and accounts are properly kept; He shall also conduct the whole business correspondence of the scheme, and shall lay before the Executive Committee what purchases and arrangements are necessary, as well as what books and tracts are required-no purchases and arrangements being made by him without the sanction of the Executive Committee.
- § 5; Executive Committee .- This Committee shall meet on the first Monday of each alternate month, being these months in which there are no stated meetings of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum .-- The order of business shall be as follows:

The Executive Committee shall decide on all works for publication and distribution, and in order to read and revise such works as may be presented for publication, they shall appoint a stand-

They shall conduct all arrangements with pub lishers, authors, and others, in reference to th preparing and publishing of tracts and books, and to this end they may, if deemed necessary, ap point an editor to prepare such works for the pres and to attend to the correction of the proofs ..

The Executive Committee shall determine prices, style for binding, and other arrangment

connected with publication.

All books, documents, or periodicals ordere for publication by the Synod, shall be published under the supervision of this Committee.

The whole business of the Agent or Superin tendent shall be under the supervision and con

trol of this Committee.

The Committee shall elect all the Colporten of the scheme from nominations made by the Agent after trial and careful inquiry.

The Committee shall be empowered, if the see necessary, to elect from their number Stand ing Committees on Finance and Colportage.

The Committee shall keep a careful record their proceedings in a suitable book to be sut mitted at each meeting of the Board.

While the Board cannot in the mean time undertake any extended plan of publication, your Committee beg leave to submit to the Synod the following terms from Messrs. Nelson & Sons, Edinburgh and Toronto.

"When an order for 500 or upwards of any one book is given a reduction of 5 per cent. will be made; being in all one-third off retail price and 5 per cent. extra.

"And when an order for 1000 or upwards is given a further reduction of 5 per cent. will be made, being in all, one-third off, and 15 per cent.

"Thomas Nelson & Sons agree to publish any reprint of any existing book or original work desired by the Committee, on the lowest terms consistent with good work, and to hold for the Committee stereotype plates and engravings, or other property connected therewith, and to produce editions of such books when ordered in the same ratio as the specimens presented, or when such books are suitable for Thomas Nelson & Sons general trade, they will offer for the copy right and for permission to sell them.

Terms in many respects similar have been submitted by Messrs. Carter & Brothers of New York. The Committee respectfully recommend that the Board be directed and empowered to arrange fully with Messrs. Nelson & Sons as Synod's Publishers, and to secure a supply of such volumes published by Messrs. Carter & Brothers, and the Presbyterian Board of Publication Philadelphia, as the Board may agree to adopt according to the provision of the Constitution.

Your Committee would add here that the advantages resulting from obtaining such a quantity of books as a general Synodical scheme will render necessary, will go far to defray the expenses of the Depository and the Agent's stipend. The funds required from the Churches being thus applied to the purely Missionary work of the Board.

A reference from last Synod in regard to the American Tract Society was taken up by your Committee, and it was unanimously agreed that there should be no connection, under present circumstances, between that Society and the contemplated Board.

Your Committee further report:—That in accordance with the reference of the Synod last year, a book on the duties of the Eldership has been carefully prepared, and is now under the consideration of your Committee. They are authorized further to say in behalf of the Committee on Ministers Libraries, that the provision made in the Constitution for the discounts to Ministers will, in a great measure, attain the end designed by that Committee.

Your Committee would further direct your attention to the necessity of employing a Lay Agency in the evangelization of these lands .-Colportage is in the opinion of your Committee, the safest, most efficient, and economical mode of employing such agency. Those who have given themselves fully to the work, feel a growing conviction of its importance, as giving aecess to Romish and other families, where the door would otherwise be closed, as well as carrying the Gospel to the remote district of our land where preachers of the Gospel are seldom seen. Colportage is admirably adapted for counteracting the profane and demoralizing literature which is being scattered over our towns and hamlets, as well as for diffusing information as to

the doctrines of our Church, and in time stregthening the faith of our people in our great and characteristic doctrines. All these considerations give importance and value to the work, which the Committee earnestly and respectfully commend to the consideration of the Synod.

REPORT ON STATISTICS.

The Committee on Statistics in presenting their Annual Report have to observe that, notwithstanding the decided recommendation of Synod, the returns given in this year do not exceed those of last year, considering the increase in the number of settled charges. It was reported at last Synod that twelve congregations had omitted to send in their returns, and the Committee regret to state that, at least, an equal number are in detault this year; two of which were unrepresented last year. It is but an act of justice to all parties to record them for the information of the respective Presbyteries:—

Presbytery of Montreal; 6-Indian Lands, Osnabruck, Lingwick, St. Sylvester, English River, Leeds.

Brockville and Ottawa; 1—Osgoode and Gloucester.

Kingston; 3-Gananoque, Madoc, Roslin, and Melrose.

Cobourg; 3-S. Cavan, Cartwright, Percy. Toronto; None.

Hamilton; 2—Wellesly, E. Puslinch.

London; 1-Port Stanley.

Total, 16.

It is to be noted that vacant congregations are not included in the above list, that in the case of the Presbytery of Kingston, the minister of Gananoque is absent from the country, and that the other places mentioned have since become vacant. Cartwright and Percy in the Presbytery of Cobourg are vacant.

(It will be seen from the statistical tables that returns have since been received from English River, Gananoque and S. Cavan.)

MEMBERSHIP.

The Committee report with great satisfaction an increase in the membership, although the returns do not nearly embrace all the congregations. It is delightful to note progress in any department of the Church's great work; but it is still more pleasing to record improvement in the spiritual element. The silver and the gold do not constitute the strength of any Church—its efficiency and permanency depend on the purity and spirituality of its members. It may a secreted with confidence that if all were in-

cluded, the tabular statement hereto annexed would present even a more pleasing appearance than it now does. Still, an increase in one year of 2,531 members is matter of great thankfulness:—

It thus appears that there is an increase in all the items save the increase of members on the year, while the total increase of the membership, as already noted, approaches nearly 3000. This apparent discrepancy arises from the changes in the congregations reported and not reported.

It is gratifying to notice the increase in the number of Congregational Libraries, and likewise of Manses and Glebes. The Committee would renew their recommendation that congregations would pay particular attention to these matters, with a view to subserve their own improvement and the comfort of their pastors.

By referring to the report of last year, it may be seen that the material property of the Church amounted to between £60,000 and £70,000; this year it reaches to within a trifle of £90,000, and if the other congregations were reported it would exceed £100,000.

STIPENDS.

It thus appears that there has been a considerible rise in the amount paid to ministers. It is to behoped that another year will present a still more pleasing state of things in this respect.

KNOX'S COLLEGE.

It was reported last year, that 13 congregations had failed to contribute to the funds of our Theological Institute; and notwithstanding the earnest appeals made on that occasion, 17 are eported this year with this column blank-an acrease of 4 in the wrong direction. The deiberations of Synod in connection with this Institution have already, no doubt, superseded the necessity of pressing on the churches the duty of being more than usually liberal. An increase in the expenditure, calls for an increase in the domions of the people.

The congregations who have failed are :-

Presbytery of Montreal; 3-St. Therese, Lathute, St. Louis and Durham.

Brockville and Ottawa; 4-Dalhousie, S. Gower, Wakefield, Alymer and Nepanee.

Although the number in default is greater than last year, yet the amount reported, as will be seen in the subjoined table, exceeds considerably the contributions of that year.

(In point of fact the contributions for the ordinary College Fund are rather less than last year, the apparent increase arising from the circumstance that two or three congregations have included their contributions to the Building Fund in their returns.)

F. C. MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Only 4 congregations are reported this year, to 8 last year, as not having taken up the Synodical collection for this scheme, viz: Nassagaweya, Paris and Blenheim, in the Presbytery of Hamilton, and N. Easthope in the Presbytery of Lon-

BUXTON MISSION AND SYNOD FUND.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The recent decision of Synod has given this scheme a new and increased interest. We have a Foreign Mission of our own, and there is little doubt that the contributions of the people will respond to the act of faith of the Synod in God and in them. Only 7 have failed to collect for the last year, and the committee believe, that next year's report will present few or no blanks.

The 7 who have not reported contributions are Metis, Trenton, Chinguacousy, Streetsville, King, Wellington Square, Ingersol.

WIDOWS' FUND.

The contributions to this deeply interesting scheme are upon the whole encouraging, although there are still eleven congregations who are unrepresented. They are the following :-

Impressed with the necessity of seeking Divine nidance in every step towards a Foreign Mission, e Committee immediately after the last Synod nse, came to a resolution agreeing to spread this use before the Lord in simultaneous prayer on very Saturday evening. It is the humble perasion of the Committee that the favorable espect of an efficient Mission, which now opens fore the Church, is given in answer to prayer. The work of the Committee has hitherto been ne solely of preparation and inquiry. No Mispoary has yet gone forth from the Church to athen shores. For two years a great purpose lowed by the Synod has remained unfulfilled. his has arisen from the difficulty experienced finding laborers for this work who could be ared from the exigencies of our home field, and ould command the confidence of all the brethren iso responsible an undertaking as the establishent of a Foreign Mission. To the search for the laborers the Committee have turned their teful attention during the past year. They held correspondence with a Missionary

They held correspondence with a Missionary merly in India, now residing in the United ates, and very highly recommended. But this wher while personally anxious to return to Infound himself precluded by the dealings of with his family.

Correspondence was then opened with an esteemed Missionary Minister of the Free Church of Scotland. Two circumstances suggested his name. (1.) He is known to have felt a strong bias to Foreign Missionary work for many years, and on one occasion would have gone abroad had he not been hindered at the time by medical advice. (2.) He visited this country as a deputy from the Free Church, and possesses the high esteem of all who formed his acquaintance, or enjoyed the privilege of his ministry. The Committee tendered to this brother the offer of an appointment as a Missionary to India from this Church ; and, after time for reflection and prayer, he has expressed his willingness to go for us to the work. It appeared doubtful to several members of the Committee whether sufficient power had been granted by the last Synod to conclude the arrangements; and the whole question of the appointment is now reserved for this Synod to determine. The name of the Missionary in view is at his own request not to be mentioned, until the Synod resolve that an appointment shall now be made. If the Synod so resolve, he is willing to accept their call, and go to India in their service.

Another ordained Minister, a member of this Synod, whose name if mentioned, would at once command the approval of the brethren, has also communicated to the Committee his willingness to go on this errand of salvation to those that are ready to perish. It is believed by the Committee that the two brethren in view, the one from Scotland, but no stranger to Canada, the other from Canada directly, would secure to the enterprize the immediate confidence of the Church at large, and by the blessing of God, organize and conduct a judicious and zealous Foreign Mission.

A third name, that of one of the probationers of the Church is also before the Committee; but they do not ask the Synod to contemplate more in the present year, than the appointment of two ordained Ministers to found the mission. When the foundations through God's goodness are laid, the Church may reinforce the ranks of the laborers either from this country, or from among the native Preachers and Catechists already to be found in India, in connection with the Free Church or other Missions.

The present Report differs from that presented to last Synod in this important particular. Then there were no available missionaries at the service of the Church. Now the men appear to be ready, and men suitable for the work. The time also seems favorable. The only question that remains is this:—Is the Church ready to proceed heartily with the work? And this is a question.

The subject of ways and means is one which the Committee have not neglected to consider. The collection made for Foreign Missions has been more liberal than that of any former year, amounting to £651 9s. 3d. Of this sum, £75 have been remitted to the Treasury of the Free Church of Scotland, at the express request of one of the contributing congregations. But there still remains in the Treasury a balance of £575, which may either be invested as a safety fund for contingent expenses, or be drawn upon to defray the expenses of the outfit and passage of the ministers and their wives.

The expectation seems to be no more than reasonable, that when a definite mission is organized, the liberality of the congregations under this Synod will be moved in a much greater degree than could be looked for when a general and comparatively indefinite object was presented for

their support.

Communications have been addressed to the Moderators of the Synods of New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia, informing them of the views of the Synod of Canada towards a Foreign Mission, and suggesting that their Synods should combine with this in such an undertaking. No answer has yet been received, probably because the Synods mentioned have not yet met. But it is pleasing to know that in the Free Church of Nova Scotia a warm interest has recently been evinced in favor of a Foreign Mission.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COM-MITTEE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF CANADA, FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st MAY, 1856.

The work entrusted to the care and oversight of your Committee, is one of great extent and importance, and its magnitude is growing from year to year. Several settlements have taken place within the bounds of the several Presbyteries, to which more special reference will be made in course of the Report. But while these settlements have taken place, lessening at some particular points the spiritual destitution, the pressure of which we have so extensively experienced, the field calling for missionary agency is on the whole as large as ever; indeed, in consequence of the advancing settlement of the country and the opening of new mission stations, its extent has increased rather than diminished. At the same time the Committee have the pleasure of announcing to the Synod, that at the last meeting of the Home Mission Committee, pretty full provision was made for meet ng the existing destitution, at least much more a mple provision than on any former occasion, the demands of most of the Presbyteries having been met by the Home Mission Committee. At the meeting of the Committee in the end of October, there were only eighteen missionaries for distribution among all the Presbyteries of the Church. These were distributed as equitably as possible, but the supply was very inadequate, five being the largest number assigned to any Presbytery, while twice that number would have been a meagre enough supply. At the meeting in the end of April, the Committee on making up its list found at its disposal, forty-six labourers in all,-sixteen preachers and thirty students.

It is gratifying that so many labourers were available for supplying the special desiration so convened through sade being undertaken against the Sabbath in parent country, your Committee would reparent country, your Committee would reparent community. Joining with the friends of the Sabbath in any point the community of ministers. A pretty constant correspondence has been kept up by the Convener of the Committee with the Rev. Mr. Bonar, and the Rev. Mr. Mc-Lure. Both of these excellent friends hold out the prospects of a larger supply of labourers than we have hitherto received. But while we gratefully acknowledge our obligations to these churches, it is right to notice that the supply has been mainly from our own College. As stated above, thirty of the missionaries are students of Knox's College, and of these eight have just completed their curriculum, and will forthwith be admitted to their public probationary trials. Of the students now employed as catechists or missionaries, some are at a comparatively early stage of their course, although none have been employed who are not regarded as suitably qualified for the important work. But the Committee believe that very soon now it will not be found necessary to press into the service any of the students except those of the most advanced class, for, while there are some advantages, there are also disadvantages affecting the students themselves, connected with their employment as missionaries at an early stage of their Theological course.

The Committee would now advert briefly to the condition of each of the Presbyteries, beginning in the East with the Presbytery of Montreal. In this Presbytery three ministers have been settled during the past year, namely Messrs. Crombie, Kemp, and Currie. There are at present three vacant Congregations, viz., Martintown and Williamstown, St. Eustache and Grand Freniere, and Laguerre. There are also three mission stations where the congregations are fully organized, viz., Lingwick, Kenyon, and Port Neuf; and four stations requiring supply but where the congregations are not as yet organized, viz., Grenville and Harrington, Finch, and Chateanguay Basin. Six missionaries are at present labouring within the bounds of this Presbytery, supplying these various stations.

2. Presbytery of Brockville and Ottawa.-In this Presbytery there are at present three vacant congregations, viz, Brockville, Pembroke, and Edwardsburgh. There are seven organised congregations requiring supply, and one station not yet organized. To this Presbytery six mission-

aries have been assigned.

3. Presbytery of Kingston .- In this Presbytery there are three vacant congregations, viz., Demorestville, Melrose and Roslin, and Madoc. Besides these there are two stations in the neighbourhood of Kingston, viz., Storrington and Ballinahinch. One settlement has taken place, during the year past, viz., Mr. Pearce, who succeeded Rev. R. F. Burns, as Pastor of Chalmers' Church. Three missionaries are labouring within the bounds of this Presbytery.

4. Presbytery of Cobourg.—In this Presbyter there has been one pastoral settlement during the year, viz., Mr. Thomson at Trenton and Murra There is at present only one mission field, viz Percy and Alnwick, where Mr. Tait, Proba

The Committee would put in view of the Synod, to recommend strongly to the several Presbyteries to use all diligence in looking after the new stations, organizing them as soon a possible, and ordaining Elders where it is practicable. In some cases loss has been sustained by a want of timely attention to these things. Indeed, in the larger Presbyteries, it is a question whether a general or travelling Missionary might not be advantageously employed in visiting stations, organizing, and dispensing the sealing ordinances.

2. The Committee would suggest the desirableness of the Synod soon giving its attention to the re-arrangement of the bounds of Presby-

3. The Committee would suggest to the Synod, the propriety of recommending to Presbyteries to raise the allowance hitherto given to students employed as Missionaries. Hitherto the allowance has been £25, with Board, during the summer vocation. The Committee agree in thinking that £30 would be now little enough for the Students. The Committee also would suggest to the Synod to recommend to Presbyteries to transact with congregations on the one hand, and with Missionaries on the other, so as to save them from any loss, and from being placed in an awkward, and unpleasant position.

4. The Committee, adverting to the circumstance that at the meetings of committee some of the more distant Presbyteries are scarcely ever represented, would suggest that Presbyteries should consider it their duty to defray, out of their Home Mission Fund, or otherwise, the expenses of those whom they may depute to appear for them at the meeting of the Committee, so that every Presbytery may be represented.

5. The Committee recommend that, while correspondence should still be kept up with the view of obtaining Preachers from the parent churches, attention should specially be given to the seeking out of young men for our own College, which must be regarded as essentially connected with the right cultivation of our Home Mission Field. With God's blessing on this institution, and with his blessing on the labors of his servants throughout the church, may we not look for the time, when the wilderness and solitary place shall be glad, and when the desert shall rejoice and blossom as the rose?

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COLLEGE REPORT.

In presenting their Report for the year, your Committee may be expected to advert to the change which has occurred since last meeting of Synod, by the transference of the seat of study to Elmsley House. We believe that the transaction which was gone into for the purchase of that building and the adjacent ground, has met with general approval. A departure from the noisy, and now altogether unsuitable locality in Front Street, had become necessary; and the premises recently secured, if not possessing all the adaptations of a new structure, had the adwantage of providing, at once, accommodation for the lodging of Students, in combination with a tetired and very healthful position. The site chosen is also most eligible by its proximity to the University College, at which so many of the Students attend for the sake of their preliminary education. The far greater number of the young men reside, as before, under one common roof. A certain proportion provide themselves with lodging elsewhere; but the advantages of such a central domestic establishment are so appreciated by the Students generally that your Committee do not hesitate to recommend such additions to be made in the building as may provide for the accommodation of a larger number of inmates; and suggestions with this view will be submitted by the Building Committee of the Synod. It must be manifest to all that the com torts of a home during their winter terms of study cannot be easily found on the more priva e or dispersed system, at a rate suited to the means of our young men; and it was satisfactory to the Committee to be able, though not without help from the Bursary fund, to arrange with the head of the College Boarding House, for terms of admission that may be regarded as economical in these times. That fund they drew upon, for this purpose, to the extent of one hundred pounds.

Passing from more external matters to the state of the Seminary itself and the business of the late Session, it may be mentioned that the number enrolled in all the classes amounted to lifty-six, including. Theological Students proper, and a larger proportion in the under-graduate list. A few are also included, who as yet attend only on classes at the University College, though announcing themselves prospectively as Theological Students of Knox's College.

The arrangements of the classes, and the distribution of the work of teaching, are known to many of the members of the Synod; very full information on these particulars having been given through the *Record*, so generally read by

the ministers and congregations. It may be stated however, for the information of all, that in the preliminary classes superintended by Mr. Smith, the students were exercised in English Grammar, and grounded in the Latin and Greek languages and Mathematics Professor Young conducted the third year's students in the study of Logic and Metaphysics; and the students of the fourth year, or first year of Divinity course, in the department of the evidences of Revealed Religion. The Divinity Class, in the two latter years of the six years' course, were conducted by Dr. Willis over the field of Systematic Theology. He also superintended the studies in Biblical Criticism, and Hermeneutics, and in Church History (as to the Text books, &c., several particulars in the Report being already published in

the Record for February last, are omitted here.) It is only necessary to advert to the great variety of duties assigned to each Professor to make manifest the necessity for some addition to the professorial staff, as soon as means shall be found for it. The existing Professors undertake for so multifarious a charge, only while no other provision is made; but the Committee continue to anticipate as highly desirable the circumscribing of the duties of each chair—a thing not more reasonable towards the Teachers in respect of their comfort, than in respect of their efficiency, or their power of concentrating their energies on their special departments.

The result of the Session, of most immediate interest to the Church, is, that eight students are reported to have finished their curriculum, and have been certified to their respective Presbyteries to be taken on the usual trials for license; and, that, in addition to these, the services of twenty students as Catechists, have been placed at the disposal of the Home Mission for the present summer.

One student, recently from Scotland, had joined the senior Theology class, with the view of completing his course, which he had been prosecuting at Edinburgh, but had to leave College, early in the Session, from indisposition. The delicate constitution of another, who, after an in erruption of some years, had thought ofresuming his studies at our Institution, was found not to admit of his close application to the work on which his heart was bent. With these exceptions, both Professors and Students were favoured by Providence with general good health.

Your Committee have still to renew the expression of their desire, that ministers and other friends of our Seminary would continue to interest themselves in its welfare and the extension of its usefulness. One means is by exciting plous and talented youths to devote themselves to the

Another is, by stimulating congregations or individuals whom God has blessed with larger worldly substance, to assist young men who are worthy of encouragement in meeting the expenses of their education. During the years of their attendance on the classes they necessarily abandon the opportunities of acquiring worldly gain, or if capable of doing something towards their support by engaging in the work of Teachers or Catechists, still such engagements seldom place them entirely beyond the need of aid from other sources. Cases occur in which, to the loss of the Church, young men, honourably desirous of maintaining themselves, either interrupt their attendance at the classes, or suffer in their health by their multifarious While, therefore, aware how desirable it is to cherish the spirit of laudable independence in students as well as others, your Committee but accord in the sense of the Church in all ages, and assert the result of all experience, when they remind their fellow Christians addicted to good works, that no offering of Christian love is more called for than the proffering of aid to young men struggling with narrow circumstances, yet with honest purpose, choosing, from love to Christ and to souls, a vocation yielding no present temporal return, however rich in the prospect of spiritual returns in due season.

In this conviction your Committee have much pleasure in acknowledging the continued liberality of individuals and congregations to the Bursary fund. Some congregations have charged themselves with the entire support of one or more students, whom they may be said to have sent to the College. It may not be too much to expect that some others may be induced to follow their good example, and if they will put themselves in communication with our Treasurer, he will be happy to supply them with all information on the subject. Parties thus charging themselves with the support of a particular student from their own locality, may possibly take a livelier interest in his progress, and may be able to estimate more precisely the result of their benevolent appropriations. But whether by thus individualizing their aid, or contributing to the fund generally, we feel that in whole or in part, a considerable class of students must look for encouragement to other sources than either their own scanty means, or those of their immediate relatives; and we know few ways, in which Christians whom the Lord has prospered, can better manifest interest in the prosperity of the Church,

It now remains that we should indicate briefly

the points to which the Committee would suggest that the attention of the Synod should be turned.

First, in immediate connection with what has been last mentioned, it may be well to consider if any thing definite could be effected to increase the Bursary fund, or to enable students to meet the expenses of their education without harassing anxiety. In reference to the same subject the question of increasing the allowance to those employed during summer as Catechists will no doubt be considered.

Secondly, provision being now made at University College for the preliminary education of the young men, on a plan that meets the case of our entrants more than heretofore, the time seems to have come, when it is unnecessary to embrace in the internal plan of Knox's College, arrangements for giving instruction to students in the first year of their literary course. Thus what has all along been in view, the making of our own College a purely Theological Institution, is so much nearer to being realized, and the wishes expressed at last meeting of Synod gratified.

But, though the office of a Tutor is thus superseded, yet on the supposition that some one is still required to head the boarding establishment, it has been suggested that in addition to the duties of that department, Mr. Smith, or the party undertaking that charge, might still render valuable supplementary service under the direction of the Professors' Court, in the capacity of a private Tutor to such of the students as may require his assistance, from their having enjoyed less advantage in their particular localities for making the usual preparation for College. This instruction, however, will not be understood by the students as constituting any part of the required curriculum, or as superseding attendance at same time at University College; nor as being meant by us to encourage students to neglect to take advantage of grammar schools, where provided, previous to their coming up to the College seat. The Synod will feel it right to consider on what terms the present Tutor may still be retained in these capacities in connection with our Insti-

Another subject to which we respectfully call attention, is the examination of students: First, as regards the respective shares of responsibility which should be borne by the College Committee, and by Presbyteries; secondly, as regards the proposal of a Central Board of Examiners.

In connection with this, a desire, it may be stated, is felt that the relations of the College Committee generally to the Theological Institute, should be more precisely defined.

Again, it may be necessary to pass more specific rules, defining the limits within which students should be required to act as Catechists or Missionaries, while yet in the course of their education. Especially, the demands on their services during the College Session have, it is felt, been carried to a degree injurious to their progress Considering the larger number of preachers now available for the work of the Church, it becomes a question whether any other than the senior students should be called on for such service at all; and as to them, it seems expedient that the amount of service to be expected, or even permitted to be undertaken by them, should be distinctly understood. A rule existed in former years by which students were not expected to go out to supply churches more than six Sabbaths during one session. This has been greatly exceeded. Indeed, during last winter, some students were engaged preazhing every alternate Sabbath, or still more frequently. The long journeys occasionally lost them opportunities for receiving valuable instruction at the classes; and labours in the city or its vicinity also deducted from their time and power of applying their minds to their appropriate studies. A considerable addition to their distractions in this way arises from applications being often made to them directly, which the young men are averse to decline, rather than convinced that it is their duty to comply with them. It seems essentially necessary that there should be an end of such interferences; and that, besides re-establishing some such rule as formerly existed, it should be understood that all applications for extra service by any student, in the way of supplying pulpits of Ministers, should be first submitted to their Professors, and only allowed with their approbation and consent.

The Committee anticipate on another point the ready assent of the Synod; that is, as regards the change required in the time of commencing and closing Session term. In order to accommodate our arrangements to those of University College, it has become necessary to substitute 1st October for 1st November; and by substituting 1st April for 1st May, the students will still be available for the same proportion of the year as before, for the work of Missionaries or Teachers during vacation. Of course, the present summer is an exception, the recess being shorter for this time by one month, on the supposition of our re-opening on 1st October next.

It only remains to advert again, in the close of this report, to the proposed improvements on the College premises. Plans will be laid before the Synod by the competent parties. In addition to enlarged accommodation for the students, it has

of the vacant ground, now the property of the Church, for the erection of dwelling houses for the Professors. The great advance in the rate of rental on houses in Toronto, as well as on the expense of living generally, will recommend some such proposal; and the Committee doubt not that the whole question of College repairs, or buildings. will be entertained with the same spirit of liberality which has already called forth such prompt compliance with the proposal to purchase a College property, instead of continuing to depend on leased premises.

If at length, a call is made on the Church, for exertions on a larger scale in behalf of its Theological Seminary, it will at least be allowed that the parties more immediately interested forbore, from year to year, to press the claim for better accommodation than those leased premises afforded; deferring to the convenience of the Synod, and to the other objects of common interest which seemed to have a prior claim on the Church's attention. The exertions now expected have not been asked till after the means and resources of the Church have been greatly increased; it being not too much to assume that our congregations have been sharing in the general prosperity of the Province. And, finally, it is satisfactory to your Committee, that all these suggestions come before a Synod now largely composed of former pupils of the Collegiate Institute for which we are now reporting; who know its desiderata, as well as appreciate its value, and who will not fail to sustain it by their active exertions and prayers.

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the schools. Pupils have not made the same progress, that they otherwise would have done. The teachers who have been hitherto employed, have mostly been students, who were under the necessity of leaving every six months, for the putpose of attending classes in the College. It would add much to the efficiency of this branch of our missionary operations, to have permanent teachers. We trust that, ere tong, we shall be able to obtain them. The number enrolled, in both schools, during the past year, has been one hundred and thirty, and the average attendance fifty-eight. There are two classes,-one in Latin and the other in Greek; those reading Greek will be ready to enter College next November. The Sabbath-school has been well attended during the past year, there are at present one hundred and twelve on the roll, and the average attendance is fifty-two. We still feel the want of permanent teachers in this department, although we are beginning to supply the deficiency in some measures by the aid of scholars who have received instruction in the Sabbathschool. The Juvenile Missionary Society, organized twelve months ago, by the scholars, has been regularly kept up. At the Anniversary in February last, on opening the missionary box, it was found to contain eighteen dollars, which was voted by the scholars to the Calabar Mission, on the Coast of Africa. The Sabbath-school, and Congregational libraries have received, each a valuable donation of books from friends in Glasgow, through the personal exertions of Dr. and Mrs. Willis, one hundred volumes have been added to the Sabbath School, and seventy-five to the Congregational Library. The attendance at Church is about the same as last year, varying from one hundrded and fifty to two hundred according to the state of the road and weather. We have had two communion seasons since our last report-one in July, and one in March. On these occations, six members were added, two on certificates, and four by examination. number on the communion roll is fifty. One of these is a young woman, who had been educated at the Mission School, and for many years was a pupil at the sabbath school. She was the first, that has been recived unto the Church from the Mission Shool. Her knowledge of the scriptures was clear, and she gave satisfactory evidence of her having experienced a saving change This is only the first fruits, but we trust it will followed by an abundant harvest. The Mission is only in its infant state, still it is an object of peculiar interest, and well calculated to call forth the good wishes of our own Church, and of al who feel an interest in the social and moral improvement of a long neglected and deeply injured race. It is only the day of small things, but we have good reason to thank God and take courage, for the measure of success, which has already attended our efforts. The school connected with the mission is progressing; and we trust the voice of its pupils, will one day be heard to advantage, from one end of the Province to the other. Nay, the time we hope may not be far distant, when they will vie with other, and more highly favoured lands, in carrying the lamp of eternal truth, and planting the cross on the remotest shores of Africa. Although I do not pretend to lift the veil, which hides futurity from the eye of mortals, yet I do most solemnly believe that, when Ethiopia stretches forth her hands to God, her own sons will be the honoured instruments, in the hands of God in carrying religion and civilization to their benighted countrymen. Encouraged by the past, we would look for greater triumphs in future, but above all we would slook for the Divine blessing, without which a solemn mockery awaits all our efforts.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF RELIGION.

The Committee on the State of Religion regret to report, that they have no statements of much interest to lay before the Synod. They have laboured under the disadvantage which indeed impedes the action of almost all the Committees appointed by the Synod-the difficulty of obtaining a meeting of the members, who are scattered over all the Presbyteries of the Church.

In obedience to the instructions of the Synod the Conveners prepared a pastoral address which was duly published in the Record, with the late Moderator's signature; calling the attention of the Church to the chief points raised in report of last year-and generally to the whole subject of the State of Religion within our borders.

The Conveners have not thought it expedient to repeat so soon the queries sent to Ministers, and reported on to the Synod of 1855-and they have felt it the less necessary to prosecute their inquiries, as they have had reason to believe that some of the Presbyteries have undertaken an inspection of the flocks under their care, which must involve an examination into the state of religion-its progress or decline.

The Committee are of opinion, that in ordimary circumstances it will be found best to commit this subject to the conscientious and responsible attention of the Presbyteries of the Church.

They would now humbly recommend. 1st. That the Presbyteries of the Church be encouraged to acquaint themselves by visitations,

by preaching deputations, and in all other competent ways with the state of religion within their respective bounds, and endeavour after its revival.

2nd That this Committee on the State of Religion shall have a ministerial member in each Presbytery-whose duty it shall be to collect and prepare information regarding the state of religion within the bounds, which information shall be furnished annually through this Committee to the Synod.

3rd. That, inasmuch as the state of vital religion in the hearts of the Ministers and other Office-bearers of the Church is found ever to affect and regulate its condition among the people at large, the Synod issue a recommendation, that on the first meeting of every Church Court, whether Deacon's Court, Session, or Presbyteryafter the 1st of October, the members observe a special season of brotherly conference, that they may unite in acknowledgment of sin, and in supplications for the outpouring of the Holy Ghost-and may, with the divine help, impart to one another some spiritual gift-and may have their brotherly love increased, and their hearts mutually refreshed and stimulated to a higher christian consecration than before.

4th. That a series of papers on topics of practical religion be prepared under the care of this Committee-and widely circulated in the form of a monthly fly-sheet, or in such other form as to the Synod may see fit.

In carrying out the resolution of last Synod, to submit the scheme to an Actuary, queries were addressed to all the Ministers contributing to the fund, not long after the meeting of Synod. It is to be regretted that returns were not made more promptly to these queries, it being pretty late this spring before all the returns were received. Of course, until all the statistics were received, it was impossible to submit the scheme to the opinion of any Actuary. All the returns having at last been received, a meeting of the Committee was held at . Hamilton, when it was resolved to submit the scheme to Hugh C. Baker, Esq., of the Canada Insurance Company. A statement from him, with reference to the fund has been received, an extract from which statement is as follows.

Hamilton, June 10, 1856.

MY DEAR SIR,-

The questions submitted to me by you in reference to the Widows' Fund Scheme of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, have had my attention so far as to enable me to reply generally, and probably with as much accuracy as may serve the present purpose.

1st. You ask as to the present position of the Fund, will it justify you in continuing the present rate of annuity to future claimants?

Your memorandum represents 6 claimants receiving £30 a-year each, irrespective of the sums allowed for children under 14-at their respective ages a capital sum of £2107 is thus already pledged (this being the tabular value of the Annuities) deducting this from your accumulated fand, the sum of £2,353 remains, the income from which is.....£141 0 0 Your revenue from 93 Ministers at

Deduct Expenses of Management

Leaving 589 10 10 which represents your available income to meet the constantly accruing liabilities from 93 Minis-

ters. of whom 67 are now married.

My only guide by which to estimate the probable number of claims is the experience of the scheme in the Established Church of Scotland which I have before referred to, this would lead as to expect one year with another 2 widows, and, taking the average of the 6 now on the fund in regard to age, £715 13s. 4d. yearly additional charge; showing that the fund is not quite sufficient to meet the widows, annuity, while no provision is made for the children's allowance.

There are, however, circumstances which in judgment may justify a continuance of your present scale ; the ages of your Ministers are certainly of a less average than in the scheme. I mention, inducing an expectation of a diminished mortality in the earlier years, and, I presume your Congregational collections may be expected to increase. On the other hand, the ages of your Ministers' wives are also less, while as large a proportion as nearly one-fourth of the whole, are more than 10 years junior to their husbands, thus creating an excess of liability, by the expectation of a lengthened survivorship.

I have not attempted any valuation of the sums allowed for children, the gross charge on this account, will not be very important as it ceases at fourteen, and it would be a very tedious

question to value or investigate. 1. You ask would it be safe to give up the

annual collection in congregations! The proceeding remarks will show that to do so would at once destroy the scheme, as these

form one-half of the current future income.

3. Would an increase in the rates, payable by Ministers to £3 or £4 be very desirable or important?

A moderate increase of income, from whatever source, would of course tend to render the scheme itself so far, and more reliable in the future, but knowing how small the incomes of the Clergy of this Province generally are, I would rather suggest the propriety of urging greater zeal on the part of the congregations.

During the year twelve new Ministers shave become contributors, there are still a few of the Ministers in the various Presbyteries, who do notcontribute. But the number is small, and is becoming less every year. It is to be regretted, that any should not see it to be a duty to connect themselves with this fund now, it is to be hoped, on a permanent basis.

During the past year, one additional claim has come on the fund, viz., Mrs. Bethune, the widow of the Rev. N. Bethune, for a short time Minister at Thamesford. Mrs. Bethune has one child.

The Committee grateful for the prosperity which has hitherto attended this benevolent scheme, would urge on the Synod the propriety of seeking to keep up the annual collections, and endeavoring to draw forth the interest and liberality of such congregations, as have never yet done justice to this scheme. There are not a few in this position. And it is but fair, that the burden should be divided, and borne by all according to their ability.

The collection has been pretty generally attended to; but, still there are a good many congregations for the various Presbyteries, from which no collection has yet been received. The Committee recommend that the Synod should enjoin such congregations yet to make, and remit a collection, so that there may be no defaulting congregations.
