THE V.C. WON BY NEW BRUNSWICKER

A New Brunswicker has won the Victoria Cross, the highest praise that a grateful nation can bestow upon a soldier. The proud winner is Leonard C. Hammond, son of A. B. Hammond, a native of Kingsclear, York county, and at one time an extensive lumber operator at St. Leonard's, N.B. He is the first man from this province to win the much coveted honor on the field of battle in this war. He is a cousin of J. W. Hammond, United States consular agent in Fredericton and was a member of the American Field Ambulance Corps.

Private Hammond went to the front in January, 1916, with the American Ambulance Corps and is still on the firing line. He was with his father, who is one of the largest lumber operators on the Pacific coast, when he enlisted. In the fall of 1914 Private Hammond visited his former home at St. Leonard's and soon after his return to California determined to go to the front with the American Ambulance that was being formed at that time. He was through the siege at Verdun and performed many gallant deeds with his corps, being mentioned in the despatches on several occasions.

The father of the winner of this great honor is well known all along the St. John river. He left New Brunswick in 1906, selling his farm in Kingsclear, and after spending some years at St. Leonard's, he returned to California, where he is now a multi-millionaire.



Jack Frost is not very far away. Yesterday the mercury dropped considerably and last evening it registered degrees above zero or only two points off freezing.

George Ramsey was yesterday injured by being hit with one of the hoisting buckets as it swung back from the ship's hold. He was standing on a staging on the dock. The accident was not caused by the rope breaking as reported.

SENDS MOTHER A KISS FROM DEAD SON'S LIPS

Lance Corporal William J. Sinclair Writes of Noble Death of His Brother

Couldn't Die Better—Many a Gallant Canadian Giving His Life Daily For Liberty

(Toronto Star.)
In a letter, splashed with the tears that fell as he wrote, Lance Corporal William J. Sinclair told his mother, Mrs. A. Sinclair, 69 Trinity street, of his younger brother, Melville's death in action on September 15th, and sent her a kiss, taken from the dead boy's lips when he fell mortally wounded by a German shell in the chest. This letter came before the fateful yellow telegraph form from Ottawa, so dreated those days by the mothers of fighting sons, and was the first intimation she had of Melville's death. So far she has not yet received official word, although he is in today's casualty list.

The letter is remarkable for the spirit of boyish manliness. Sorrow for his own loss and for his mother's grief is tinged with a pride in his own, his mother's and his comrades' deeds, and is full of a love and a faith that rises triumphantly above his brother's death. Perhaps his pencilled lines, blurred by another mourner's tears, was a gentle way of telling Mrs. Sinclair of her son's supreme sacrifice than the typewritten words of a telegram. The reading of this letter should give comfort to more than one mother.

"It is hard, mother dear," the letter begins, "to write you today, for, by the time this letter reaches you, you will know that your baby boy, my dear little brother, went to glory along a path for our God, and for our glorious Empire and Flag. I know he died in the way all soldiers want to die. He got killed by a big shell in a charge, which would have done credit to any troop of older soldiers, much less a party of green boys."

"We went over, mother, just the way you would have us do, but you know Melville was no match for me in a race, so in the excitement I left him behind and reached Fritz's front line, which we took and held until we were relieved."

"Lefty Boyce and I buried Mel. He had a funeral service which your own good Canon Dixon could not have improved on."

One of Seven Reached Huns.
"We were hit pretty hard in the way all soldiers want to die. He got killed by a big shell in a charge, which would have done credit to any troop of older soldiers, much less a party of green boys."

"How can men die better than facing fearful odds for the sake of his father and the temples of his gods? and for his mother, wife, children, and friends? This is the place to die, mother dear, if our turn comes. Men are dying here every moment, gladly dying because we fight that peace shall reign when we overcome our foes."

"When we went out under the fire of our artillery, I said to my section, 'Don't forget boys, mothers are praying for us tonight and we must win for them.' Most of the boys cheered."

"When I spoke to Mel he said that he was just twenty years of age now, and a boy no more. He was a man, mother dear. Remember him as a man, a great big man, who acted a man's part all through, and helped to win over two lines of Fritz's trenches. Good kid he was, and good kids get the rewards in heaven. We lost young Swan and Johnny Melhaly and hosts of others, but we will get all back again. When we attack again, God-willing, we will win in a walk."

"Good night, mother dear. Here is a big kiss from Mel and me. I took it from Mel. He was wounded over and above the heart, and never knew he was hit. Good night again."

Pte. Melville Sinclair was just twenty years of age on August 3. William and he joined the 51st together, and together were drafted into a regiment of the Mounted Rifles, so that his brother was with him when he fell.

BROTHERS DIE SAME DAY
One Leaves Wife and Three Children—Other Was Single.

Pte. Robert McGaffin was unmarried and 26 years of age. He came to Canada soon after his brother. Before enlisting he was employed by the Consumers' Gas Company. A telegram announcing the sad news of the death tragically arrived yesterday.

Morning News In Tabloid Form

Paris, Oct. 10.—The official statement announces that in the fighting south of the Somme river today the French troops captured the village of Bovenet, the north and west outskirts of Abaincourt and also the greater part of Chaules Wood. Prisoners to the number of 1,500 were taken in the operations. It is reported that excellent work is also being done by the aviators of the French army, especially south of the Somme.

Gains in Macedonia.
London, Oct. 10.—The entente forces continue to make advances on the Macedonian front. The Bulgars appear to be demoralized and are content to drop back before repeated onslaughts. British cavalry has occupied several important positions. The Serbs have crossed the Cerna river at two places and Shochivir is now in their hands with a large number of prisoners. In the Ruman theatre the allied forces have not been so successful and have been forced to withdraw from certain positions before numerically superior forces on the Carpathian frontier. The Italian report gains on both the Albanian and Alpine fronts. Canadians Fought Well.

London, Oct. 10.—A report given out in France says that when the first great attack was launched at 6.20 a. m. on September 15 the Fifth Canadian Infantry brigade was in divisional second reserve. The 22nd French-Canadian battalion did excellent work in the fighting and although in reserve the greater part of the morning of the fight, at 3.30 in the afternoon the order was given to go forward. The 26th N. B. Battalion did the "mopping up" and rounded up the prisoners captured and held them until escorted back to the stations in the rear of the lines. Many tales of great individual heroism are told of the engagement, and all the Canadians fought with the greatest valor.

Hearst Gets Quiet.
London, Oct. 10.—The Hearst syndicate, known officially as the International News Service, has received a quietus at the hands of the government, when the secretary of state was today directed that no representative of that organization be permitted the use of the official press bureau and that the agency be disbanded for the use of all other facilities for the transmission of news, until further notice. This action was taken when the government had secured evidence that despatches had appeared in American papers from time to time purporting to have been given out in London, and which had not had the centre of the empire as their source.

The directors of National Service assembled in Ottawa yesterday for their first meeting. Sir Thomas Dalt heads the conference and the conference is likely to last some days. The greatest prob-

lem which confronts the commission is some scheme whereby its ideas may be put into effect. Their work must depend largely on moral suasion, 'tis said. To purify cistern water put charcoal in a bag and hang it in the water.

MORE AUTO CASES

In the police court this morning several bye law cases were before Magistrate Ritchie. As the cases progressed it became evident that certain phases of the laws are still unknown to motorists. Questions as to what is really required in the case of autos in motion and autos standing, especially with respect to lights, were asked, and the magistrate inquired as to blowing of horns at corners.

Charles Jones was reported for allowing his double team to stand without a foot strap. It was brought out that the team was also on the wrong side of the street. Mr. Jones said that the concession was granted to drive double teams to stand on either side of the street, but delivering or calling for goods. This was unheard of by the court, but the excuse was accepted.

In a case against John McKeown, a penalty for allowing his horse to stand without a foot strap, was struck.

Leo Holland was reported for driving on the wrong side of Main street in passing a standing street car. Policeman Gorman made the report. Mr. Holland said that he had followed the signal of the policeman at the corner of Mill and Main streets. The penalty was struck.

William Allison was reported for coming on report of having his rear light not over the number plate. Policeman Corner said that he noticed about ten o'clock that Mr. Allison's car had the rear light on one mud guard and the number plate on the other. The defendant explained that he had two rear lights, one on each side, probably the only arrangement of its kind in the city, he said, and that the light over the number plate had gone out, but he had it readily repaired. The magistrate accepted the explanation and allowed a \$30 fine to stand.

Henry Appleby, reported for not sounding his auto horn at the corner of Wall and Paradise row, gave the excuse that the horn for the moment was out of commission. The matter was allowed to rest with the fine against him.

G. B. Addison was reported by Policeman McNamee for speeding in Waterloo street and for not sounding his horn at the cross streets. The magistrate warned the young man against the penalty. His explanation, that the horn was crippled, was accepted.

SUGAR UP 25 CENTS IN UNITED STATES TODAY

St. John dealers today received word of an increase of twenty-five cents a hundred in the price of American sugar. Up to this afternoon, this had not affected the Canadian markets, but it seemed quite likely, the dealers declared, that the reaction would be felt. It is the general belief of wholesalers that the price of sugar will undoubtedly be subject to further advances, and that it is almost certain that the price is up to stay.

When asked by The Times what was behind the upward trend in this essential food article one wholesaler said that he believed that like wheat, it was the result of the work of speculators inflating the markets. He also said that the dealer said, the scarcity of raw material has helped to boost prices.

U. convention this morning Mrs. Eagles, of St. John, gave a report on the work during the year in ministering to the sick and needy and caring for the comfort of soldiers. Mrs. A. C. M. On motion of Mrs. L. R. Hetherington, of Riverview, a resolution was adopted sending greetings to Mrs. R. McClellan, expressing appreciation of his stand more than sixty years ago, on prohibition and accompanying this with a bouquet of flowers tied with white ribbon.
