

Before we can have these, we need to get rid of false ideas of economy in regard to roads, and reject the false philosophy of the man whose eye is filled with a copper cent, and who therefore falls to see the dollar within his reach. For a provincial system we can choose between the creation of a highway commission independent of political partizanship, as has been so successful in Massachusetts, or a department of the government with a deputy minister of highways, such as is doing good work in Ontario. Or we can improve on both

supplies, sewage disposal, unemployment, etc.; a department with skilled advice at the disposal of all municipal bodies working through and with them in perfecting municipal administrations."

The above is a quotation from the address of Mr. Thomas Adams before the Rotary Club. It shows how far behind we are in this province. There is no properly organized and equipped provincial organization to deal with the roads, and that is the very first step. There is no plan of provincial trunk roads—or any other roads—which can only be provided by a properly constituted and equipped provincial organization. There is no sound system of road construction, but an utterly unsound partisan system which wastes money for the benefit of political hangers-on. Whether we should have a highway commission, a deputy minister of highways or a department of municipal affairs, it is clear that we must have a provincial organization of some kind, divorced entirely from politics, and of such a character as will ensure that value will be received for the money expended. 



SENDS MOTHER A KISS FROM DEAD SON'S LIPS

Lance Corporal William J. Sinclair Writes of Noble Death of His Brother

Couldn't Die Better-Many a Gallant

In a letter, splashed with the tears that fell as he wrote, Lance Corporal William J. Sinclair told his mother, Mrs. A. Sinclair, 69 Trinity street, of his younger brother, Melville's death in action on September 15th, and sent her a kiss, taken from the dead boy's 'lips when he fell mortally wounded by a German shell in the chest. This letter came before the fateful yellow telegraph form from Ottawa, so dreaded these days by the mothers of fighting sons, and was the first intimation she had of Melville's death. So far she has not yet received official word, although he is in today's casualty list.

The letter is remarkable for the spirit of boyish manliness. Sorrow for his own loss and for his mother's grief is tinged with a pride in his own, his mother's and his comrades' deeds, and is full of a love and a faith that rises triumphant above his brother's death. 




